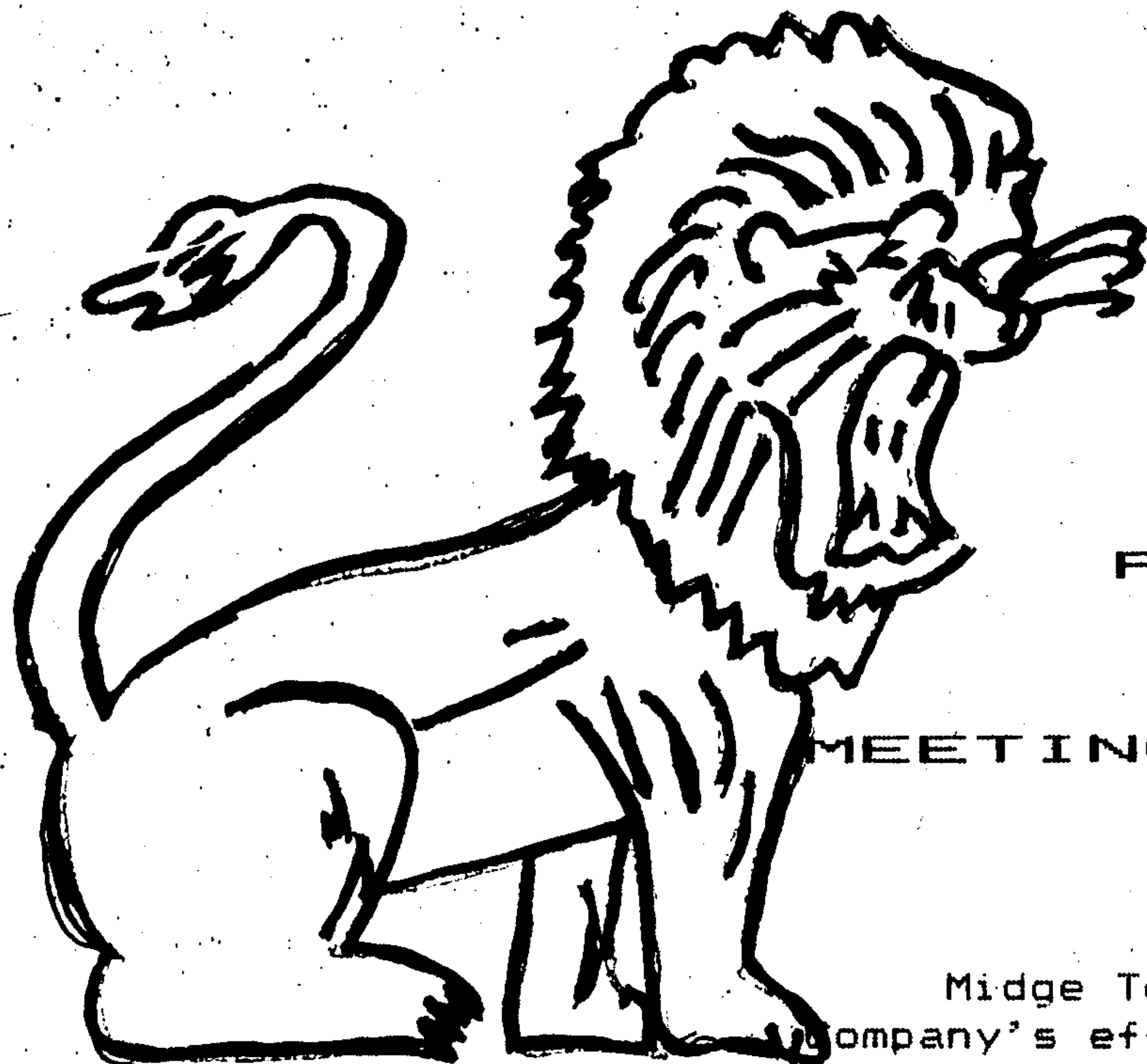

Midge Teahan of the Monongahelia Power Company's effort for Economic Development was our program on Feb. 6. We are all aware that our area has lost much of our industrial ability in late years because plants have either moved away or else have gone out of business. According to Mrs. Teahan, the power company is working to reverse this trend. A film entitled "Growing" was shown in which a community in Mississippi is also trying to reverse the exodus of its industry and to attract new industry. She mentioned that one big reason why our state lost the G.M. plant was the condition of our schools. She emphasized that there are positive things on the horizon. She favors casino gambling. (see commentary below)

There have been some legitimate grumblings off and on about our eating place. Some complaints may be dismissed as the usual army kind. Lions Terry and Claude have had a talk with the people at the Field Club and let them know about our gripes. This way is a good first step to resolving differences. One gripe has been the fact that the place settings have been too close together. Another was that there was not enough coffee. The two Lions were informed that the cost of the meal would be raised to \$6.00. Everyone at the February 6 meeting noticed that we received better service. The meal was better. There was a greater variety of salads, the waitress served coffee and there was a large coffee maker in the room.

We didn't understand what had caused all this until Lion Terry made his report. The service, etc. was a sample of what the \$6.00 charge would give when the increase went into effect. A motion was made and seconded that the Field Club be asked to start the increase on February 20th. Motion carried. \$1.00 of the cost of each meal pays the rental on the room.

Lion Springer recommended that five applications for adult glasses be approved. They were. The committee is doing a good job of holding down the cost of glasses by using the services of several optometrists.

There were two notes of thanks - one from Rev. Guggenheim of the Mission for our donation toward the purchase of a piano and the other from District Governor James Bell which went out to all the clubs thanking them for almost \$10,000 for flood relief.

Lion Bill Conrad, Nominating Committee Chrm., read the list of nominees for office for 1986-87. The election will be on March 6.

The Board of Directors did not meet on Feb. 13 because of the weather.

Lion Woodrum introduced Mrs. Peggy Twyman, local Magistrate, to the club on February 20th. She gave the background of the court and talked about the kinds of cases the Magistrates handle. 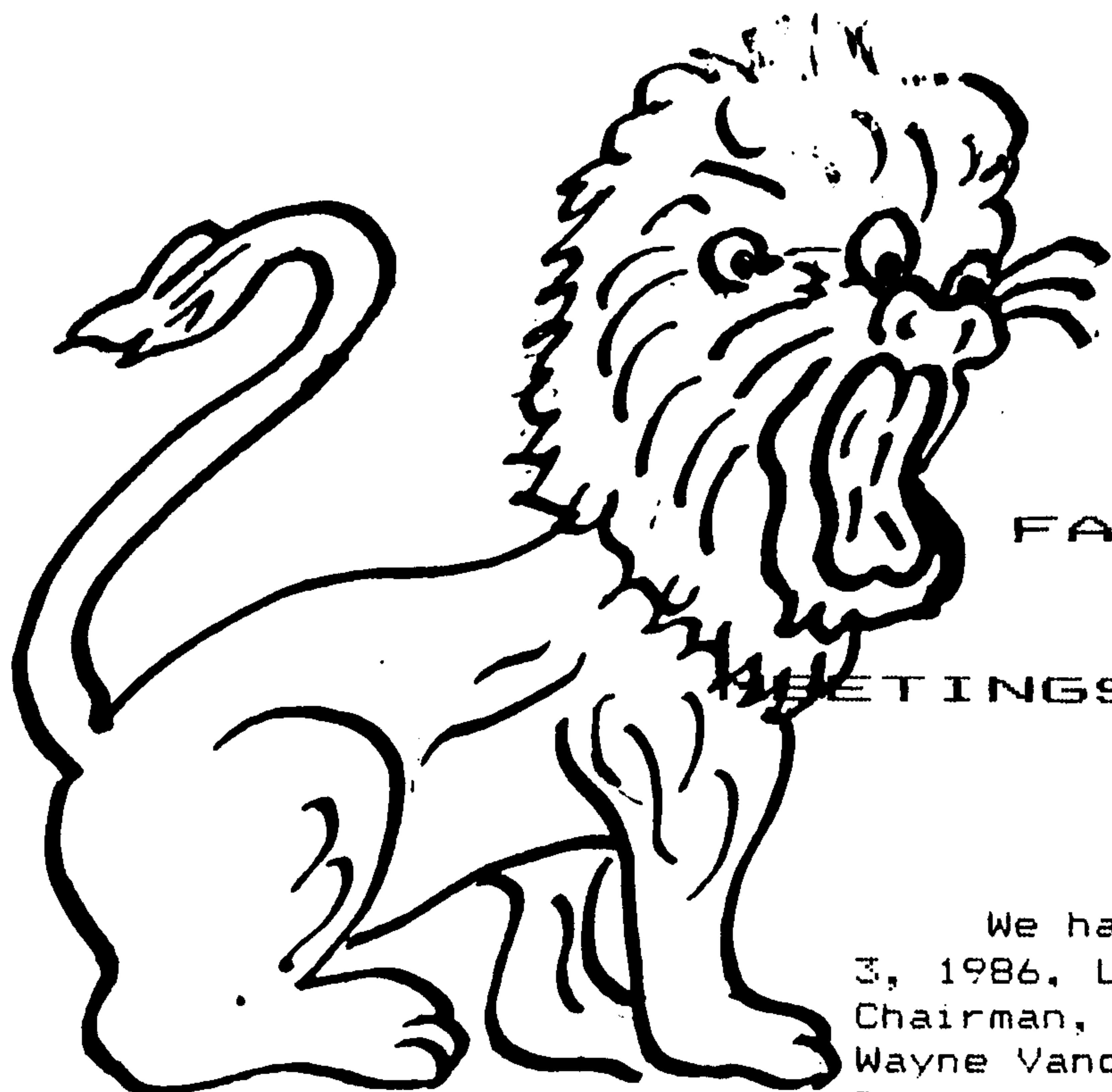

The film pointed out such causes of accidents as: stairs, bathrooms, electrical outlets, throw rugs, kitchen appliances, medicine cabinets, bed room, living room, outdoor power lines, trimming trees, etc. Most of these danger spots we know about but we become so familiar with such common things that we become careless. It's good to be reminded.

We learned that Lion PDG "Chuck" King is improving. (See Note below)

The Past Presidents Night is being planned for April 17 at Staud's. As usual it will be a ladies nite.

Lion Brake reminded us of the broom sale on April 5th at two locations - Hecks and Shop n' Save. Originally there were to be three locations but because the Worthington Club was having its White Cane Day at Krogers on the 5th, we sold only at two locations.

Lion Stanton announced that the Bellview Club will hold its tenth anniversary night on May 30 at 6:30 at the Highland Ave. United Methodist Church. The cost per person is \$6.50.

Lion Vandergrift said that if elected Dist. Governor, he would work for membership.

You have heard it said that when a man invents a better mouse trap that the world will beat a path to his door. Well, sir, a certain man invented what he considered to be a better mouse trap. He took the trap to President Lincoln hoping for the President's endorsement. After examining the trap, Lincoln said, "The sort of people who want this sort of thing will find this to be the sort of thing that that sort of people want."

Lion Lee reported to the Board of Directors that we have spent just over half of what was budgeted for glasses for this year. The committee is doing a good job in going to several optometrists and getting lower prices.

The glaucoma clinic was held on April 13 at Hunt-Haught Hall. We had Dr. Melgarejo and his wife doing the examining for glaucoma. We had nursing students under the direction of Lionesses Moffett examining the children and checking blood pressure. We had Lions and Lioness to do the other jobs. What we lacked were people to be examined. There may be several reasons why the crowd was small but two seem to be most prominent. One is that the schools are screening children for amblyopia and the other is that several other organizations are screening for glaucoma.

If memory serves it is estimated that 3% of the population has glaucoma. If that figure is correct, our tests ran almost 3 times as high. Keep in mind, though, that not all of our referrals may have the disease. Below is a summary of our clinics over the years.

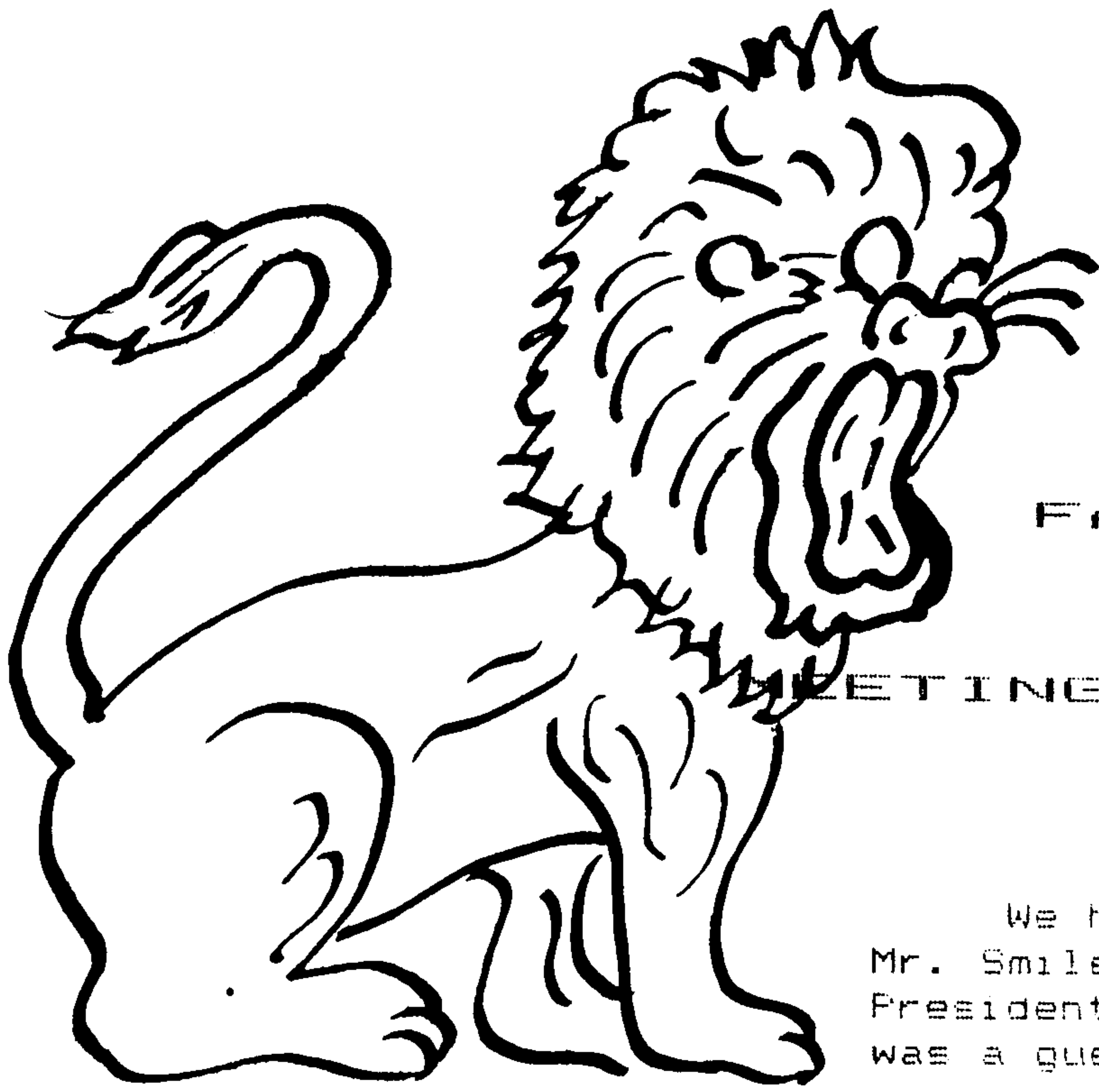
If we can save the sight of even one person, we can feel successful.

He mentioned that only about one tenth of the bills that are introduced are actually passed. He had three recommendations to make the legislative process more workable: 1. Every delegate vote publically instead of a show of hands. 2. Allow no conference vote on the last day of the session. 3. The governor must present a balanced budget.

Lion George announced that Lion Tom Orgill was a patient in Fairmont General Hospital. Lion Tom underwent surgery.

Chevrons were presented : 20 year chevron to Lion Tom Robinson and a 30 year chevron to Lion Earl Carpenter.

Lions Jim Coleman and "Chuck" King visited Art Cunningham with Lion "Chuck" Rawlings and Lion George Corder. Lion Pres. George present Lion Art with his 50 year Monarch Award. They had a good visit. Art is still very much a Lion even though unable to attend. Art presented a check to the club to be used in the Sight Fund.

Lion Terry reported on the fund raising effort we had on April 5. Twenty-four of our members participated. 109 regular brooms sold, 20 shop brooms, 11 whisk and 50 mops. A profit of \$52.00 was made but later Terry sold \$800.00 worth of inventory to the Barrickville Club. We still have inventory that is paid for so that members can sell "still yet" and whatever is sold is profit.

It was announced at the May 8 Board of Directors meeting that new officers would be installed on June 19. The meeting will be held at Bonanza. (see below)

The need for new members was discussed at the Board meeting. There was a motion that Membership Chairman Clyde Judy would pass out membership application forms to each Lion at the May 15 meeting. The motion carried. Lions are reminded that membership into Lions Clubs is by invitation.

These are the proper steps for getting new members:

1. Invite a prospective member to attend a meeting.
2. Have him fill out an application.
3. The application is turned over to the Membership Committee Chairman to be considered by that Committee for or against approval.
4. The Board of Directors consider the application for or against approval.
5. If approval by the Board is obtained then the prospect is then invited to become a member. The Lion who followed steps 1 and 2 above is the Sponsor of the new member and he is responsible for guiding the new Lion.

If any other procedure than the one above is used, embarrassment could follow, especially if the application is not approved. Our good treasurer, Lion Lee, has reported that through April the club had spent \$1327.00 on glasses. We had budgeted \$2200.00. The Sight Committee is to be congratulated for keeping down the cost of glasses by spreading the business among several optometrists. Lion Lee also said that to date the cost of the Glaucoma Clinic was \$167.50.
