Santa Makes Annual Visit to the Union Mission Party

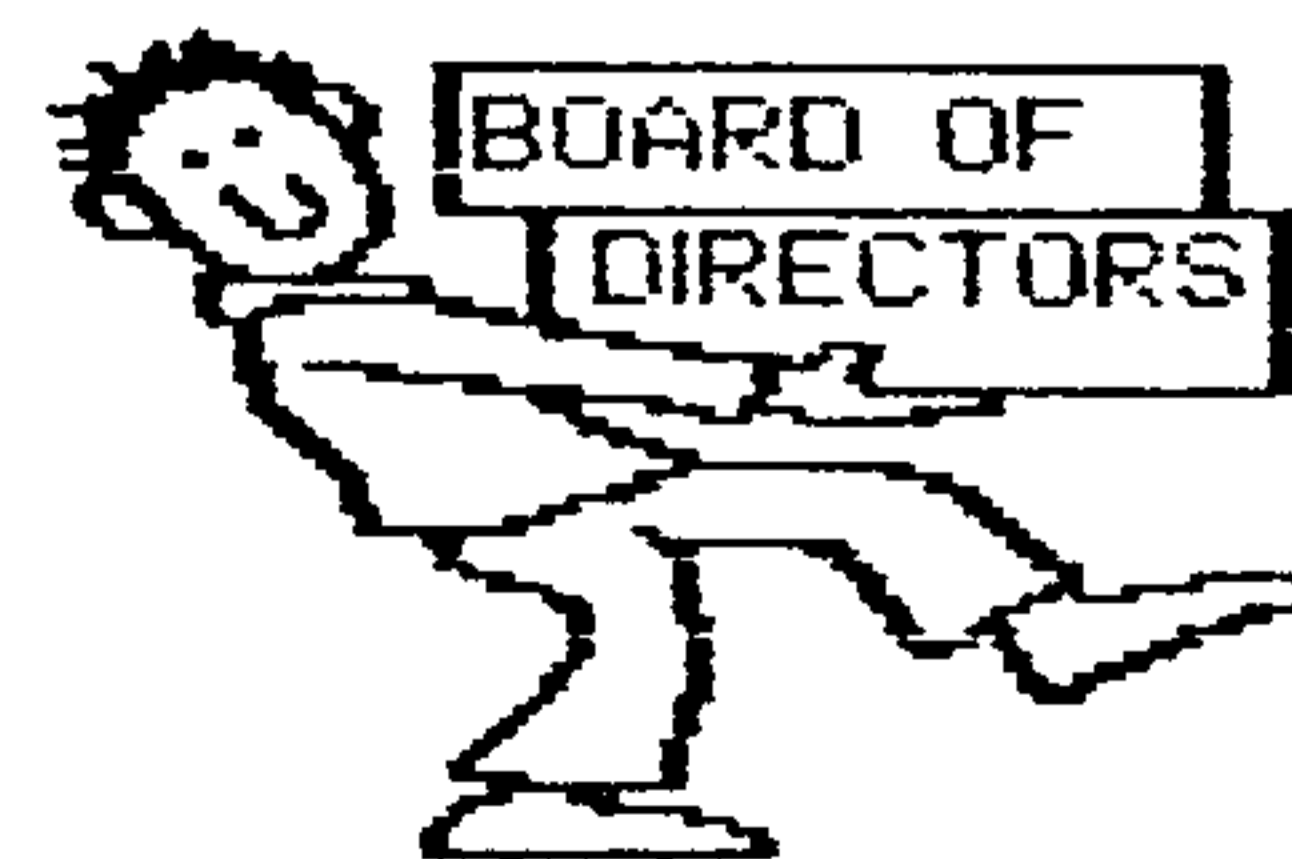

We have fifty-five members in the club and according to our secretary attendance stood at 50% in November.

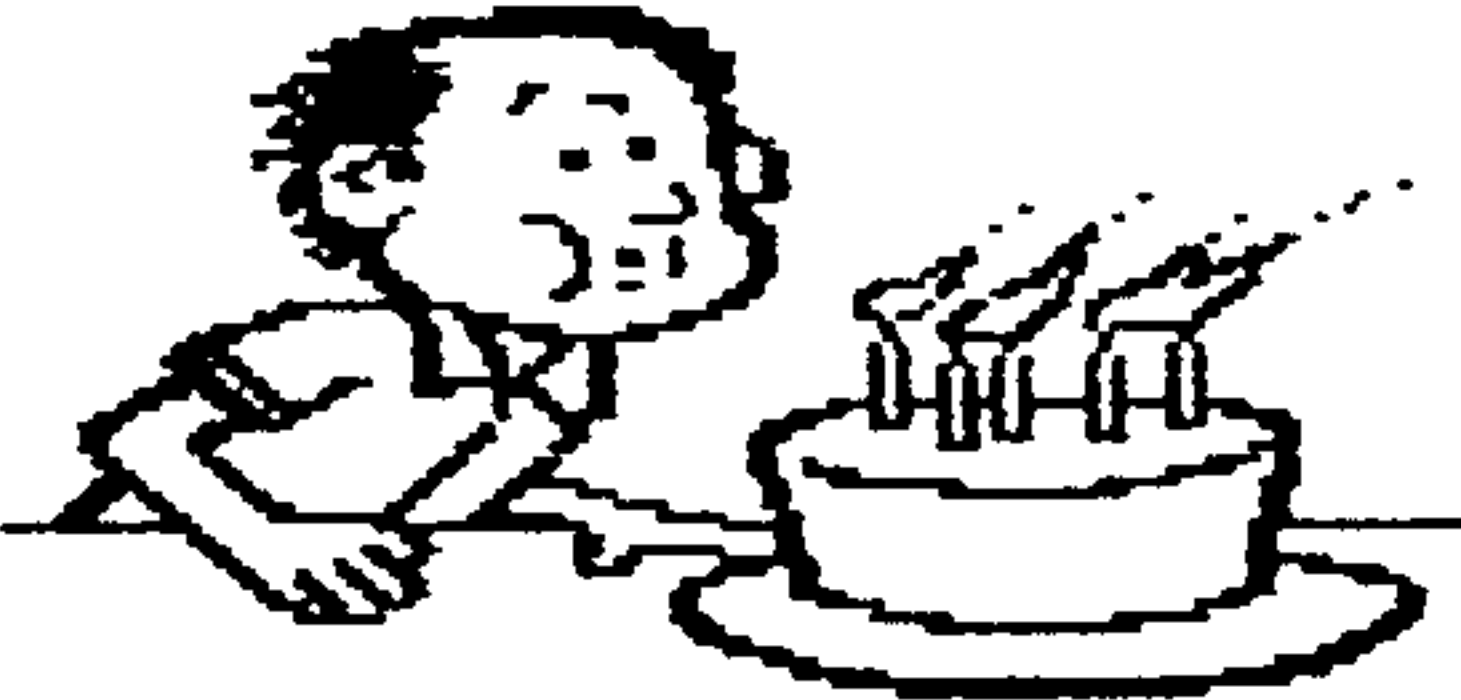
The initiation of new members was set for January 19.

At the close of December Bill Conrad was dropped as a member for lack of payment of dues and lack of attendance.

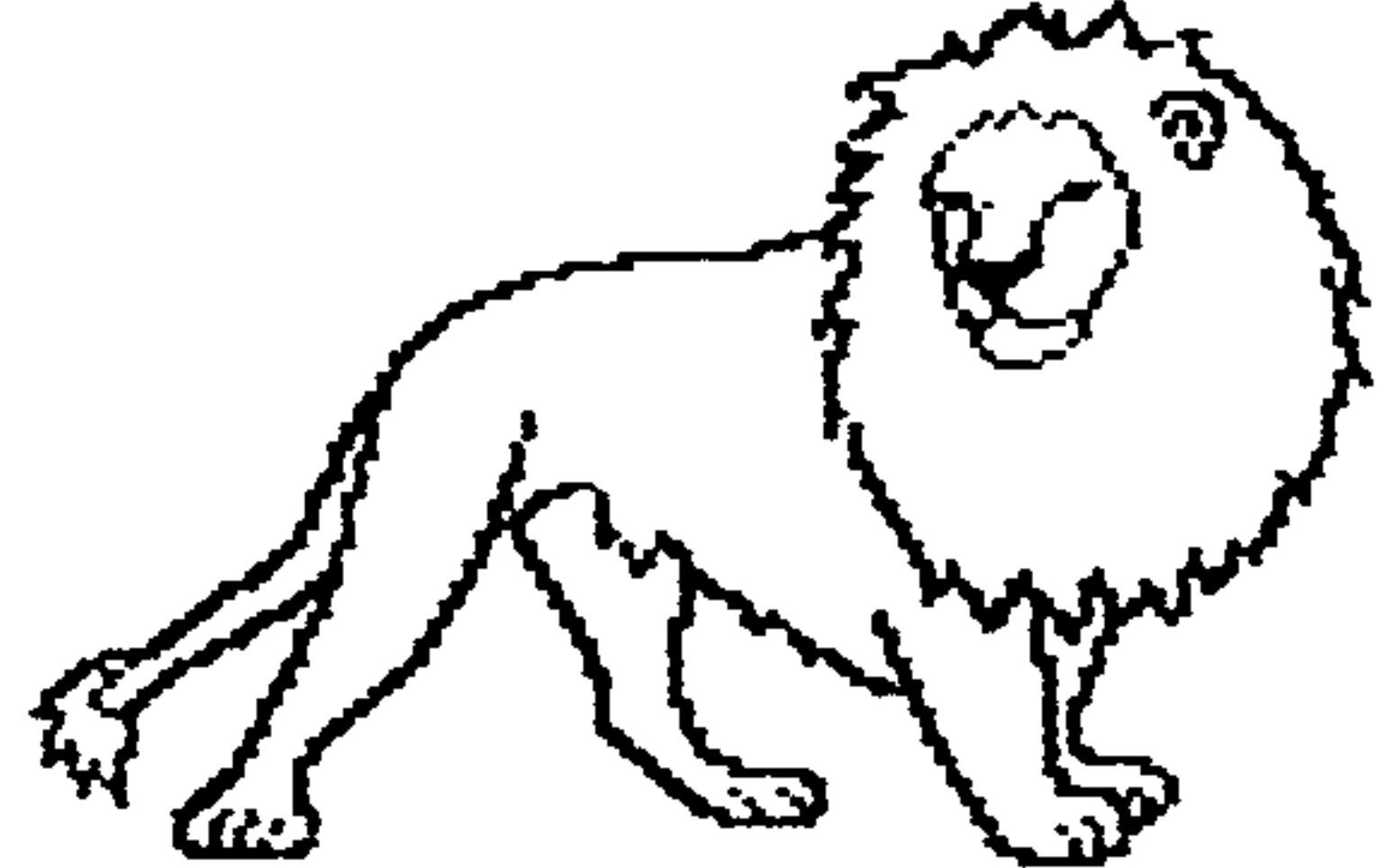

Claude Springer has had to stay with his wife who has some paralysis of her legs.

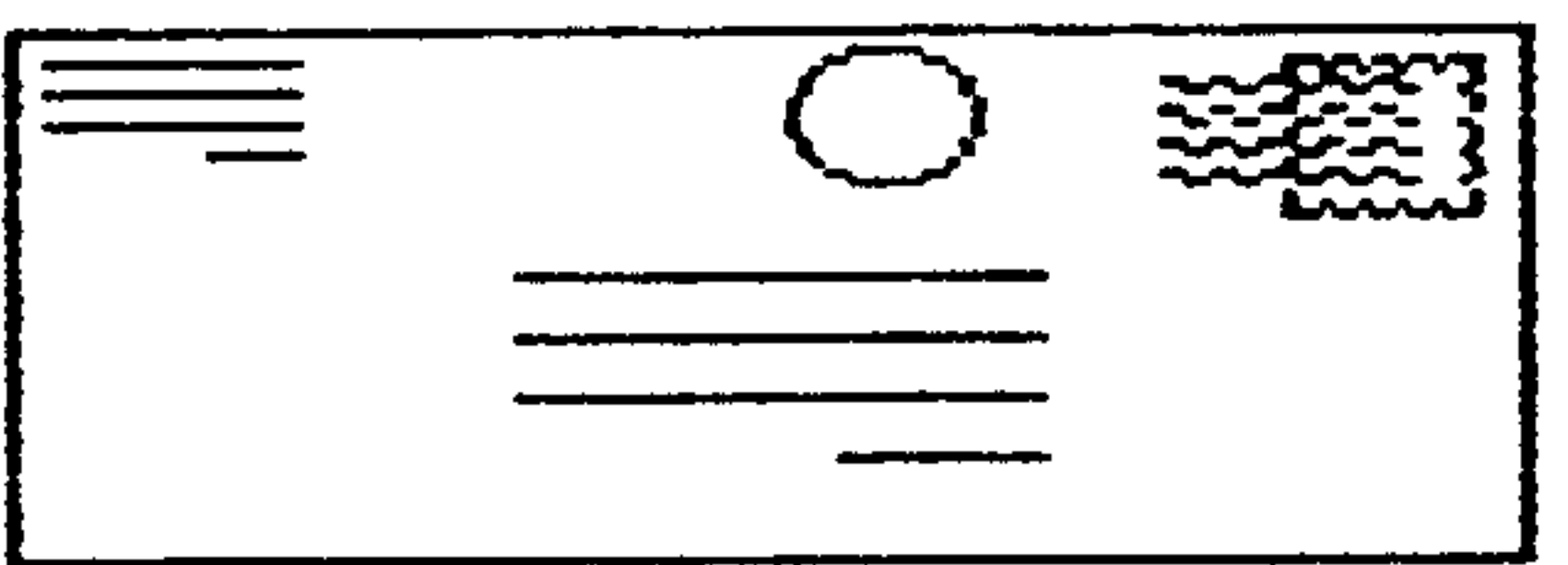

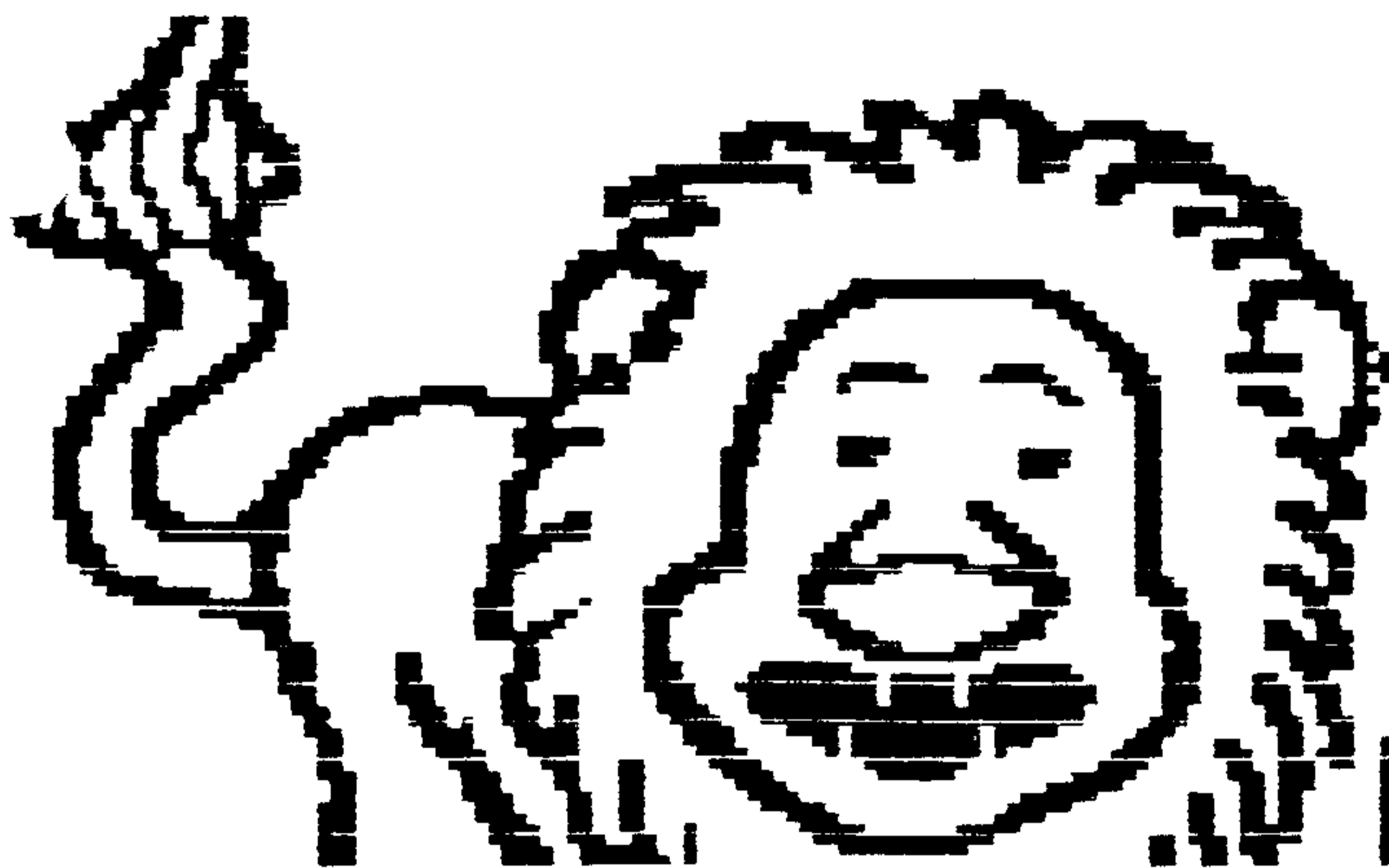

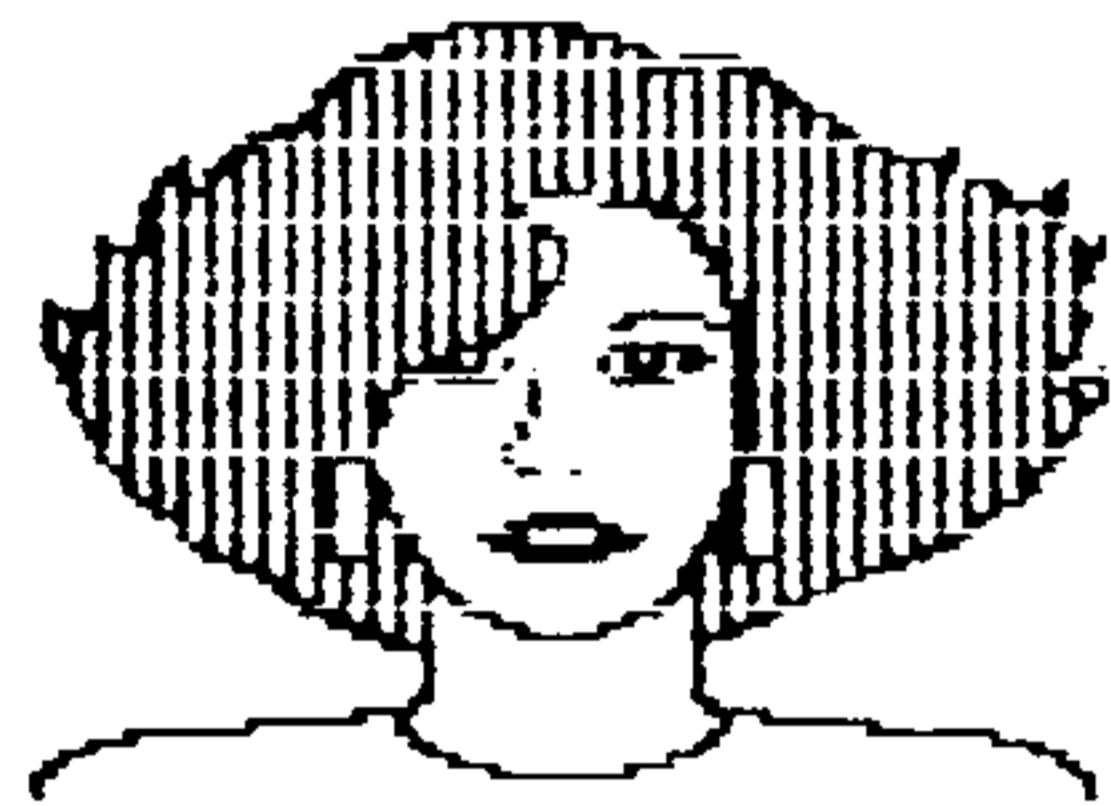

Collection of eye glasses at the mall has fallen off so all you Lions be sure to collect and turn in used eye glasses for future projects.



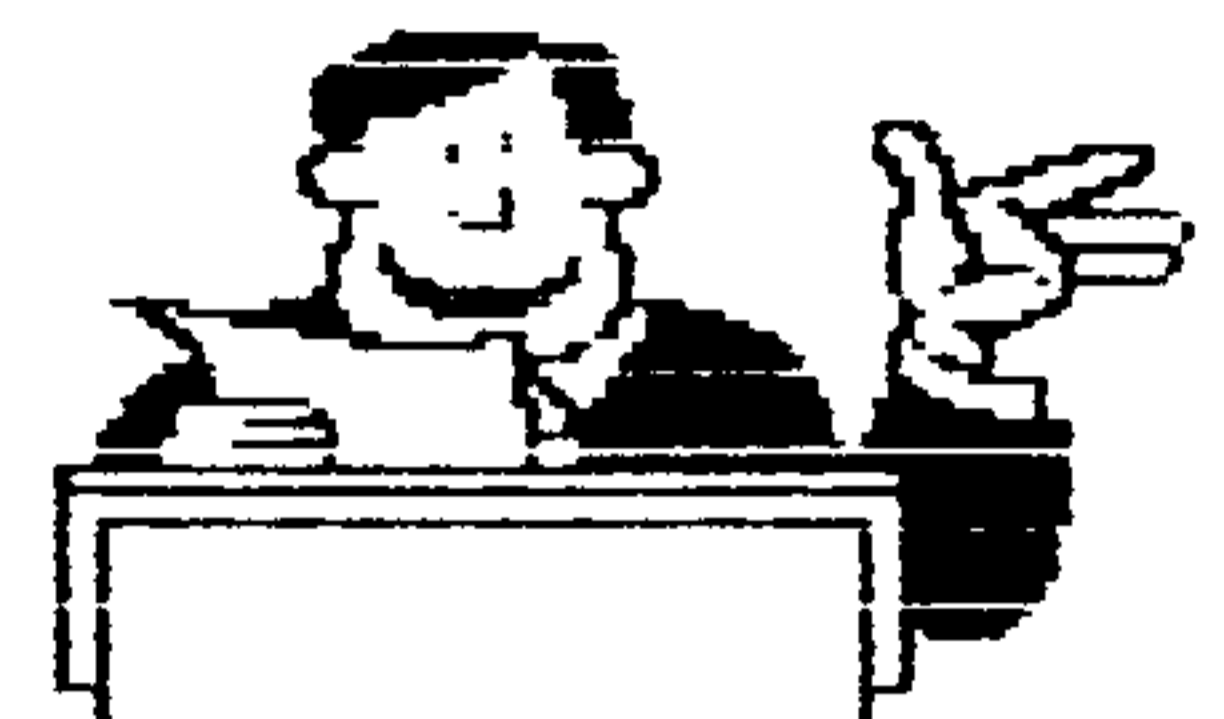
Eye Glass Report


From President Butch

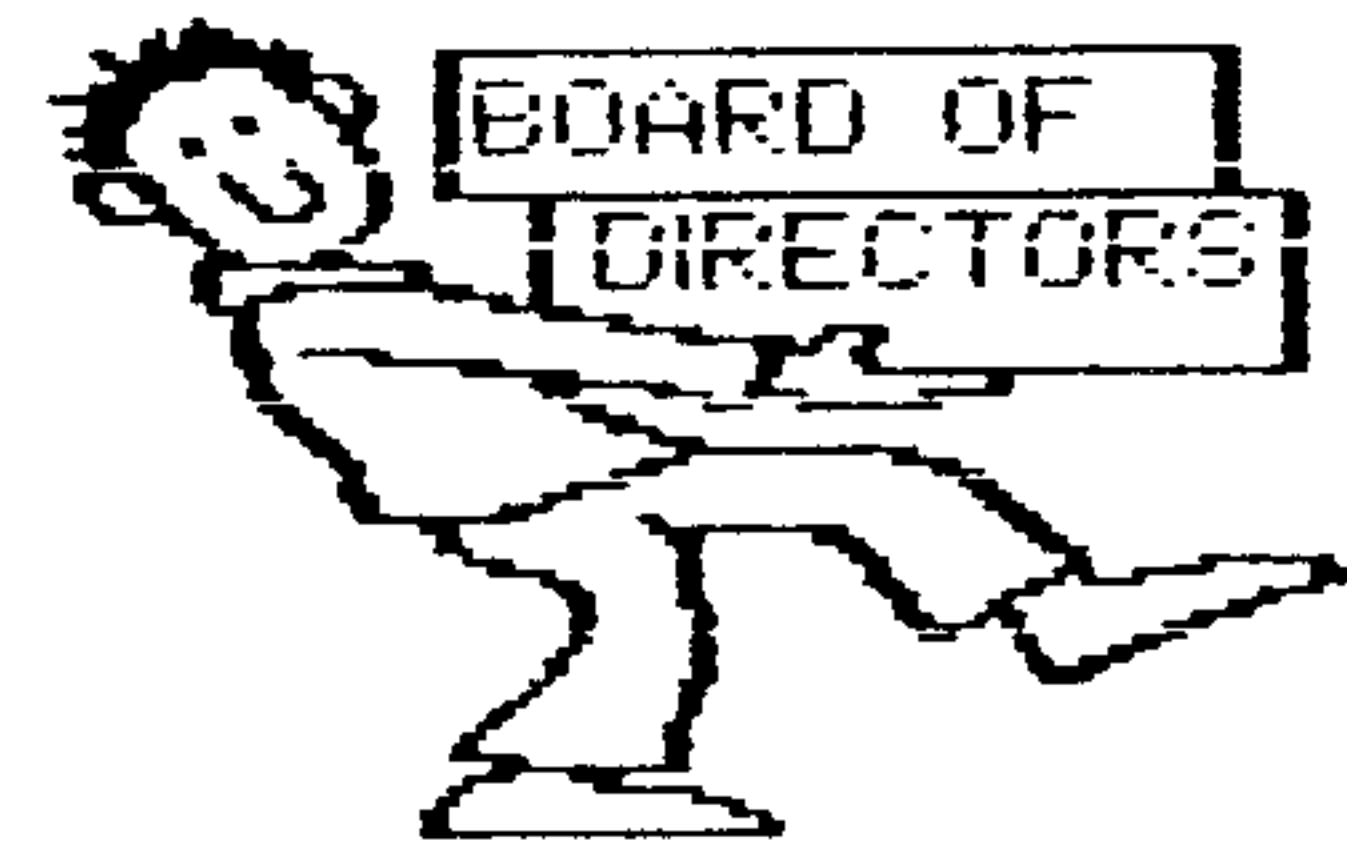

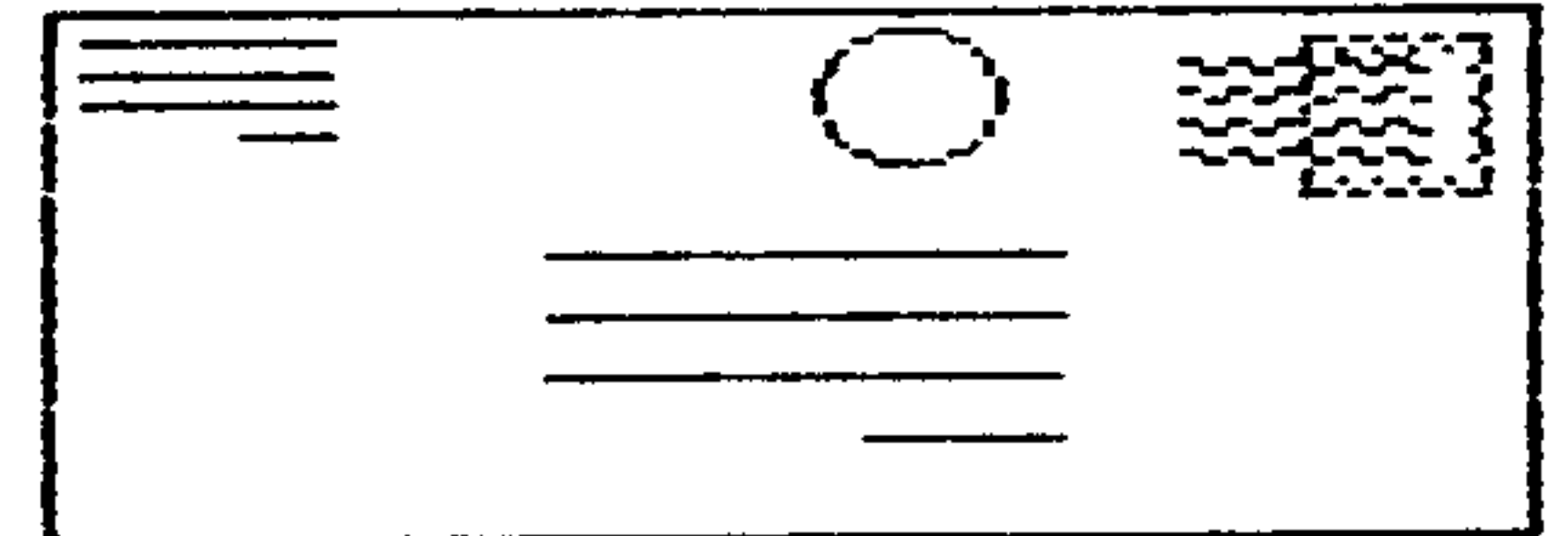

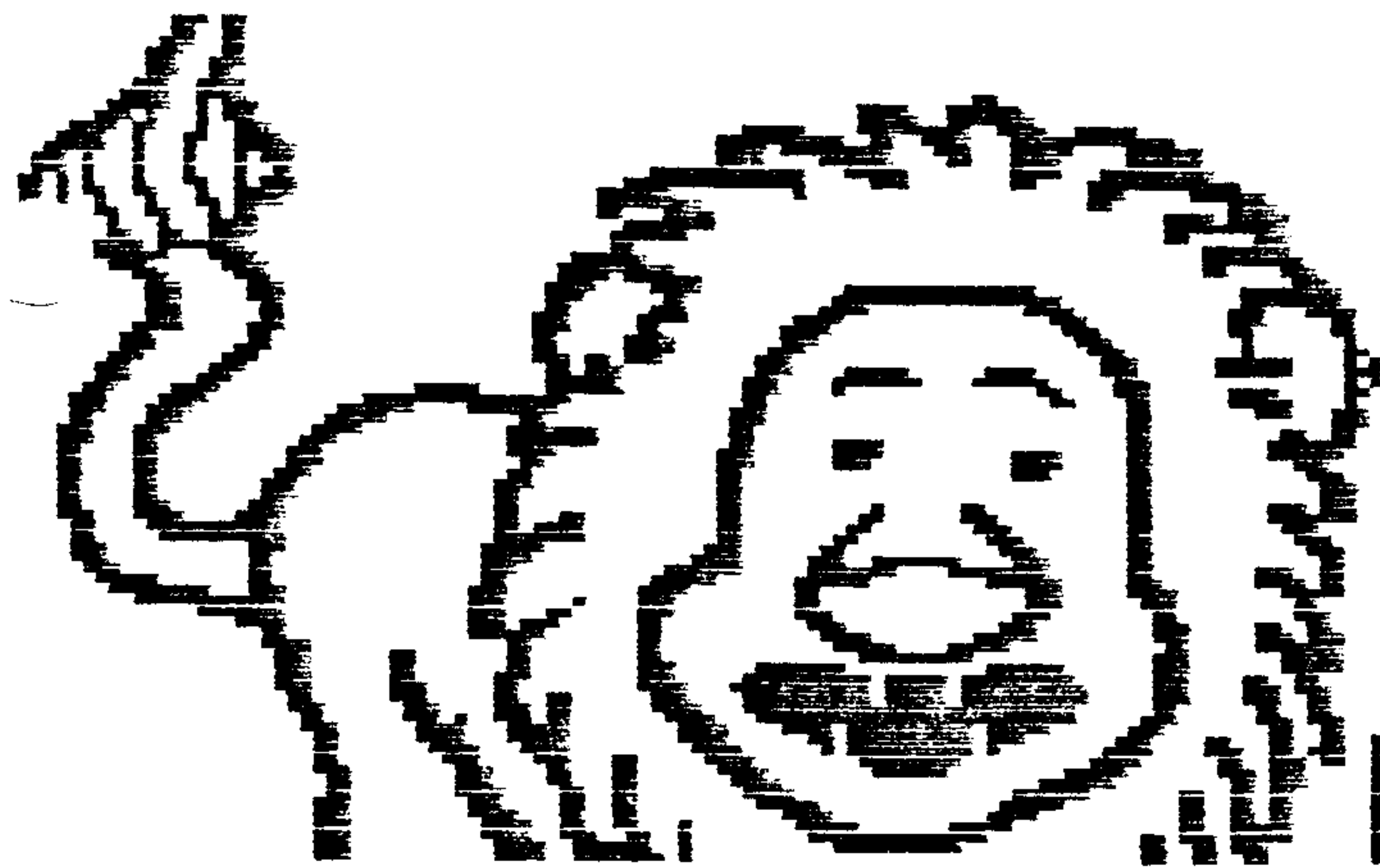

If you are planning to go to the Lions International Convention please contact the secretary. He has delegate tickets which should be used.



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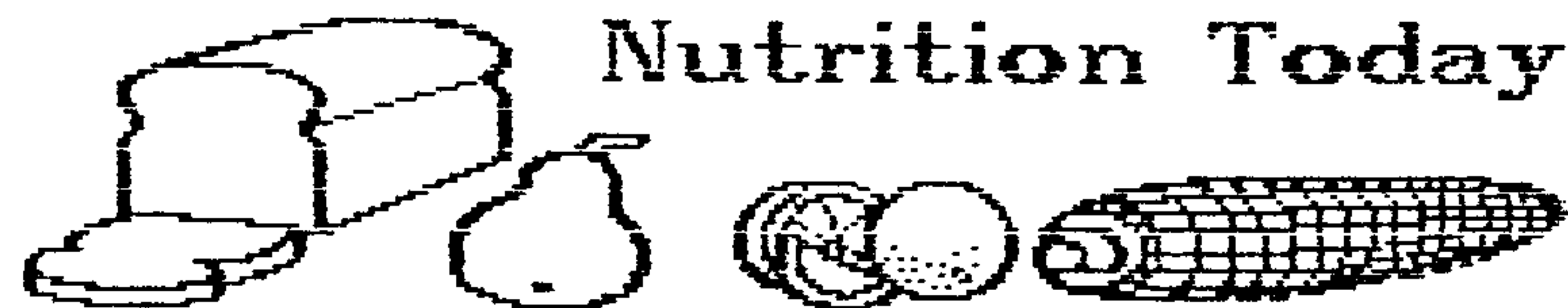


A Festive February 2nd

It was good to see Lion King back with us.

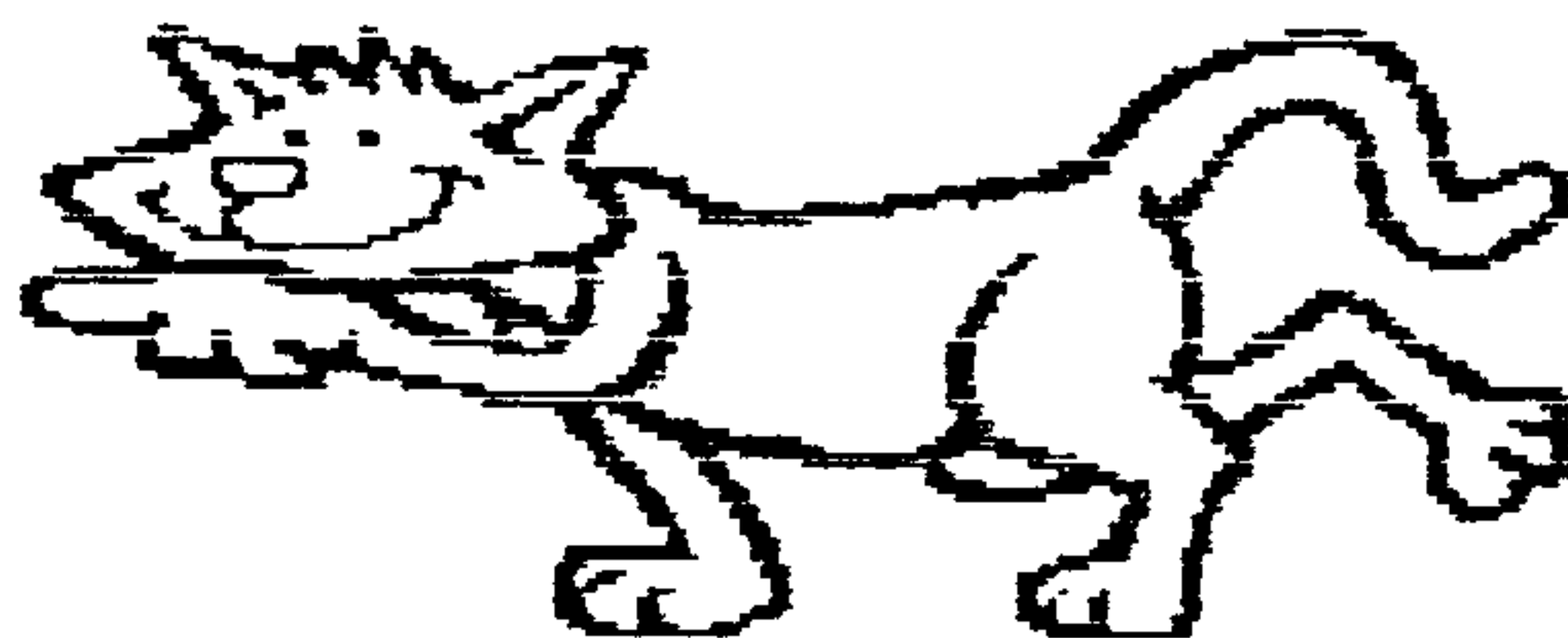


Nutrition Today

Club Evaluation

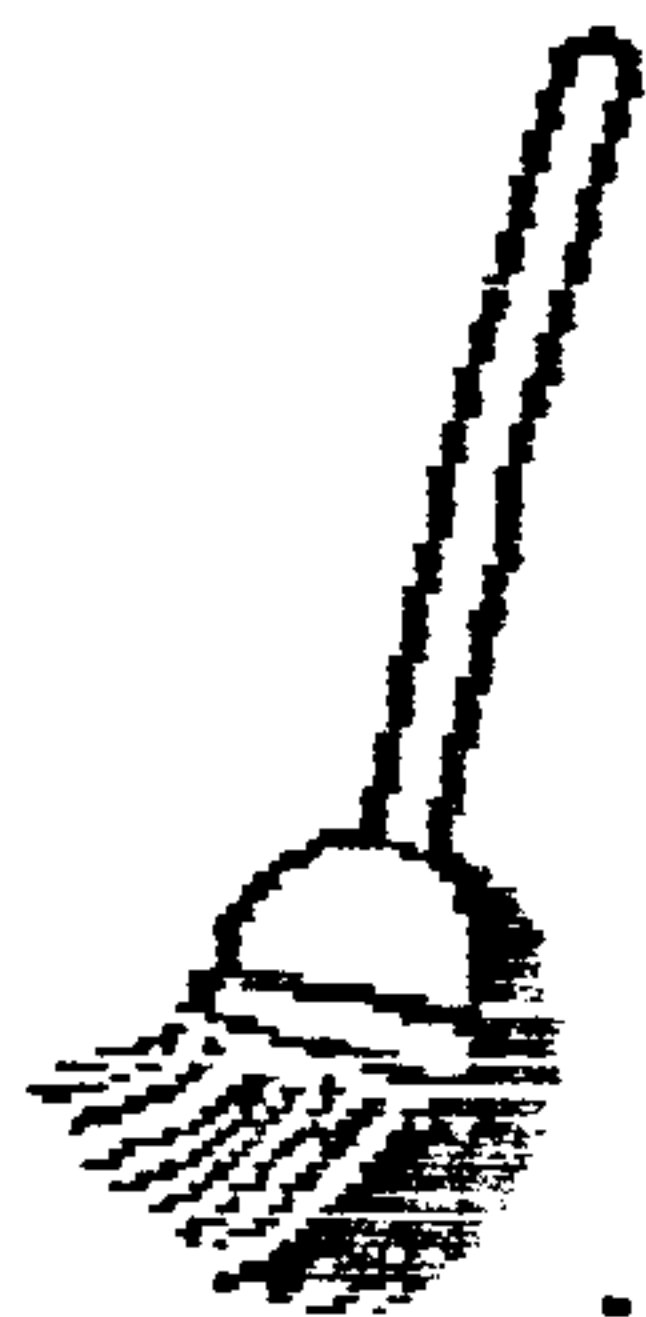
Some weeks ago Lion President "Butch" passed out a survey form to find out what members thought about the club. Twenty-five responses were returned. Below is a summary of the answers received:

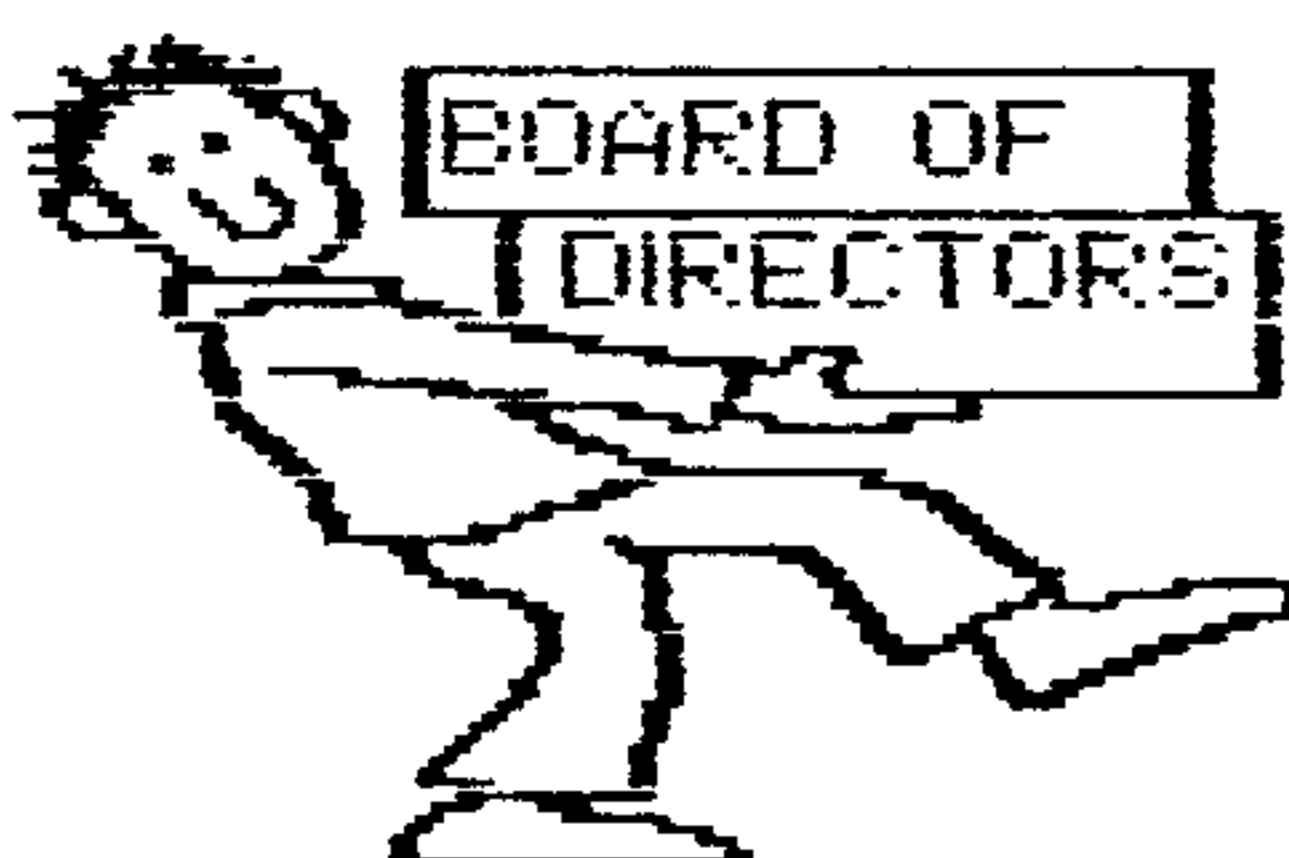


The Search Continues !

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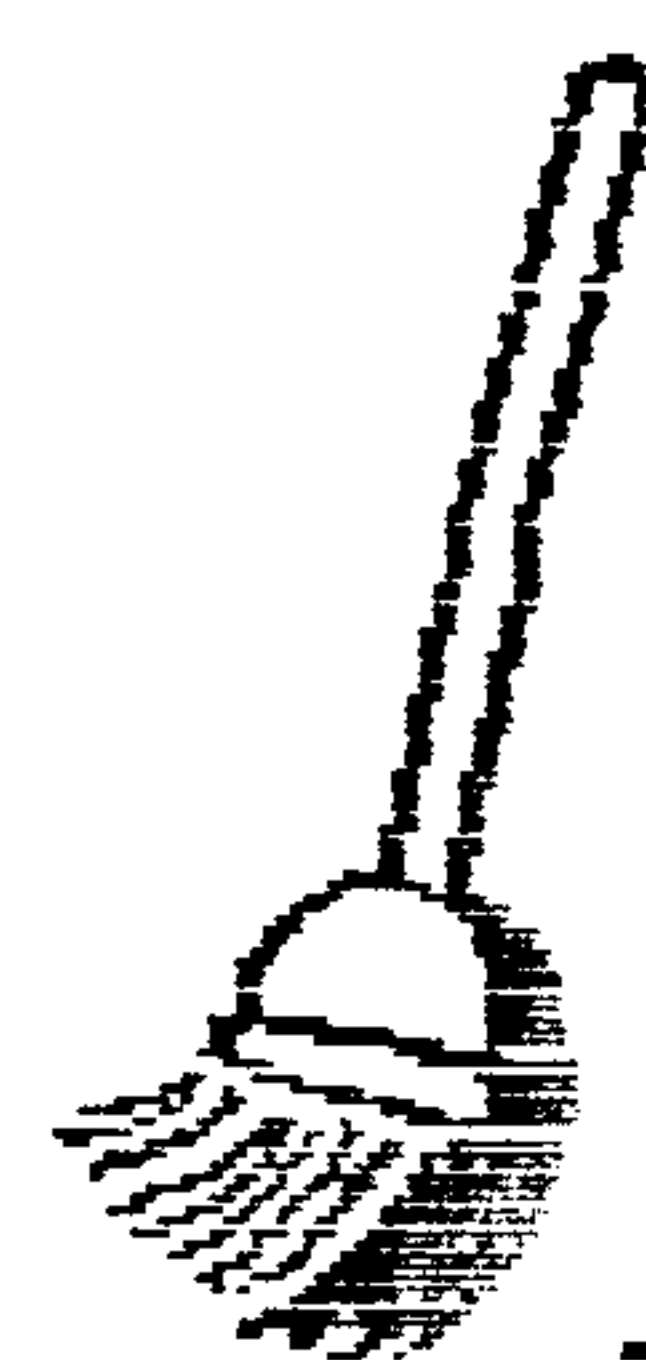

On March 15, President Butch reported that the Mannington Lions Club had formed a Leo Club at North Marion High School. This will be the only Leo club in the area.

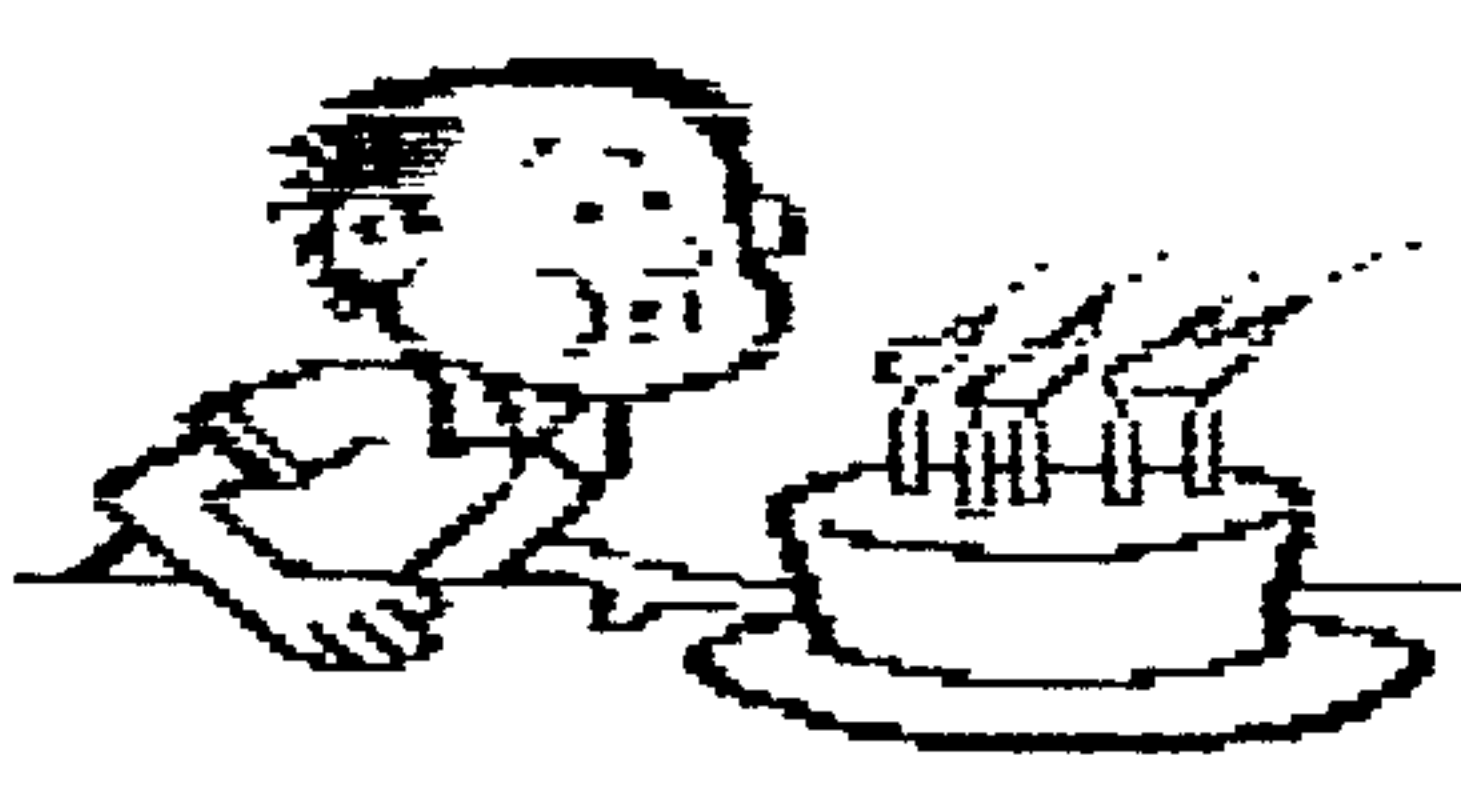
(At least for the time being.) Our club has always made a donation to new clubs and it would seem appropriate that we do so to this club. These are young people who will be future Lions.

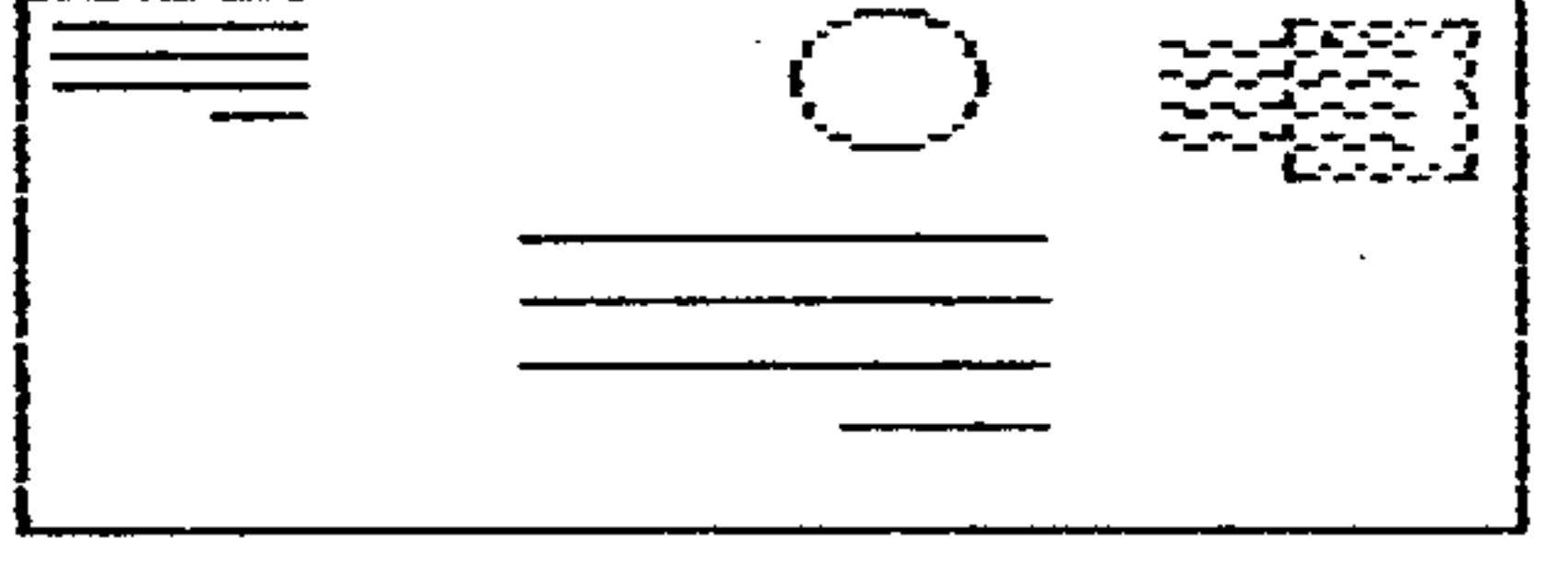

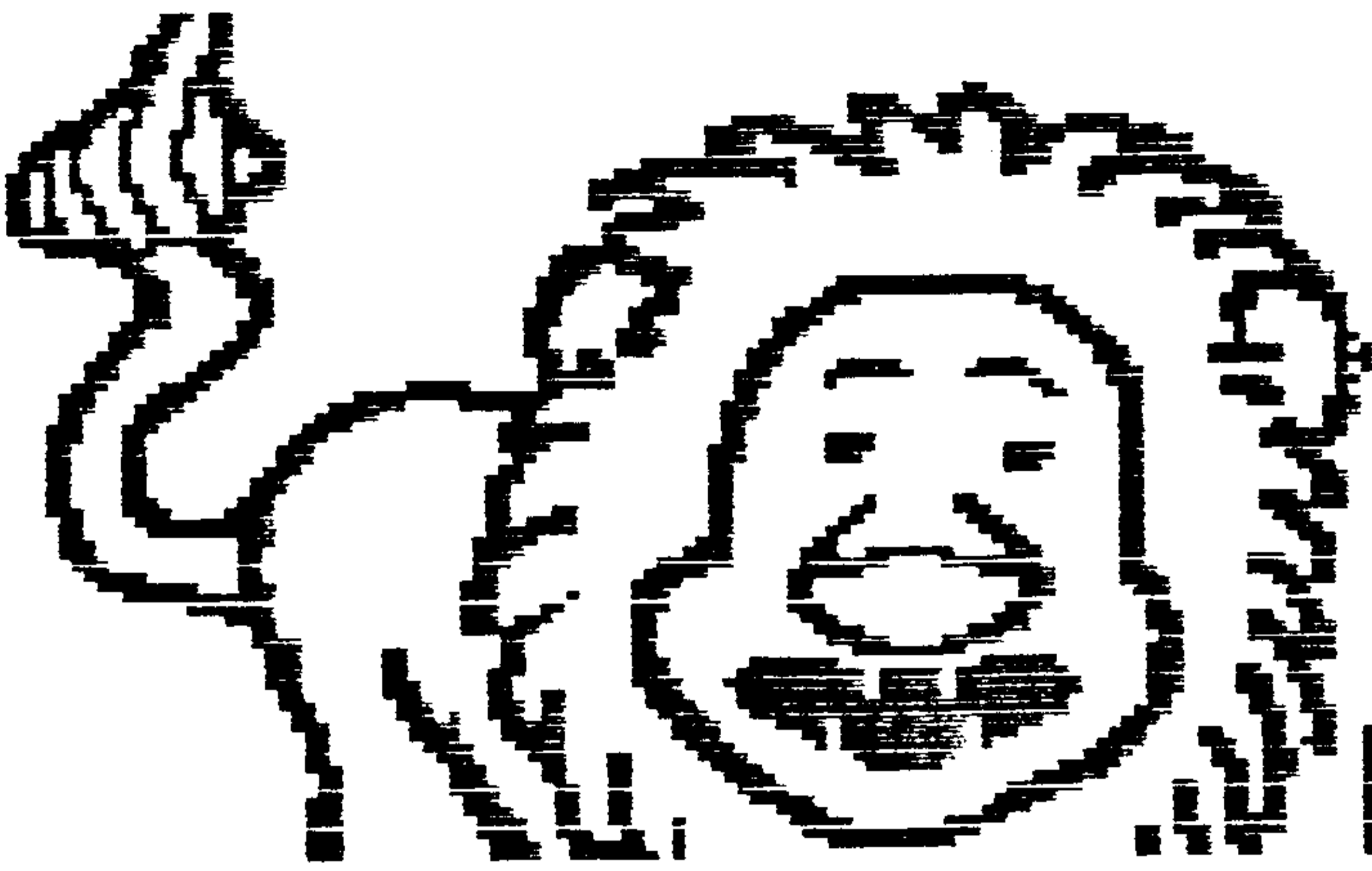
Lion Bill Martin has been in the hospital with pneumonia. He is home now, but cannot get out yet.

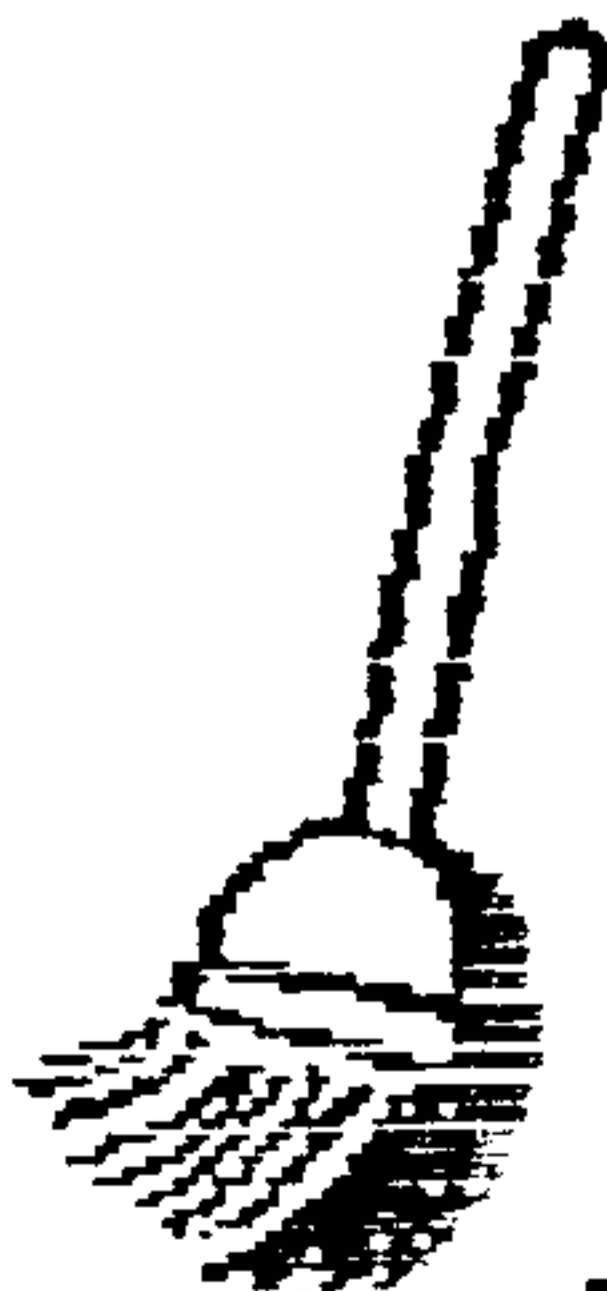
A Bad Break

Clinic Reviewed

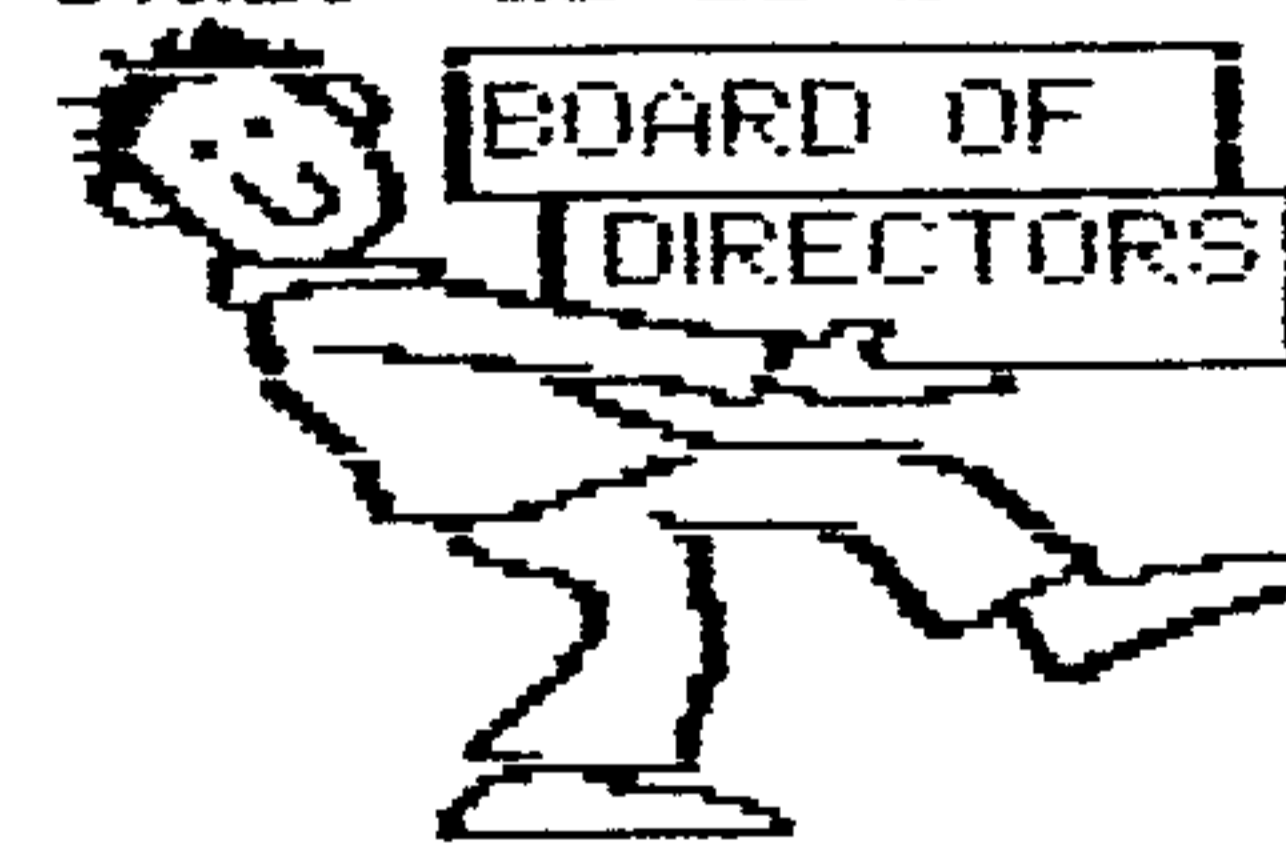

The total merchandise sold was: 23 warehouse brooms, 104 regular brooms, 4 whisks, 82 mops and 115-2 packs of 100 watt bulbs. An interesting breakdown in the revenue should be noted: \$399.25 at Shop-and-Save, \$390.74 at Apples and \$684.91 at Giant Eagle. Also the location at Giant Eagle was worked only 7 hours while the other two were open for 12 hours. Lion Terry also has paid-up inventory of 14 warehouse brooms, 61 regular brooms, 1 whisk, 1 mop and 419 - 2 packs of 100 watt bulbs.

Lion Terry complimented all the Lions who took part in the sale and gave special note to: LIONS Tom Koon, George Hummel and Bob Brummage who each worked two shifts; LIONS Bill Woodrum and Jim Coleman who each worked 1 1/2 shifts; LION Smiley Caldwell who put in extra hours phoning, working a shift, and helping get the merchandise to one of the stores; and LION Lee Meadows who did likewise and helped to pick up merchandise at the end of the day and help count money until 11:00 P.M.

The sale was a success on two counts, money made and members participating. Lion Terry recommends that any future brooms sales be handled in this fashion and suggests that we might have two per year - spring and fall.

The Eye & Health Clinic

The annual Eye & Health Clinic was held on April 22 at Hunt-Haught Hall. It was very disappointing from the standpoint of crowd. In this reporter's opinion, as much or more real planning went into this clinic as went into any in the past.

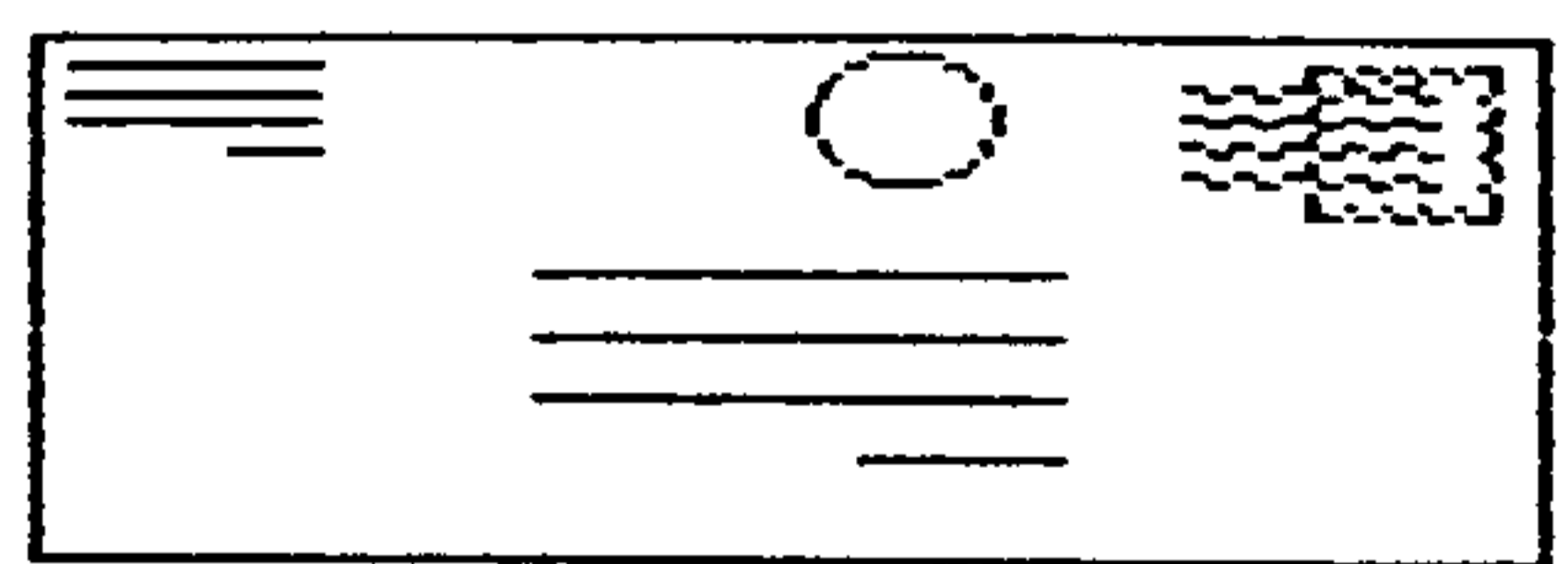

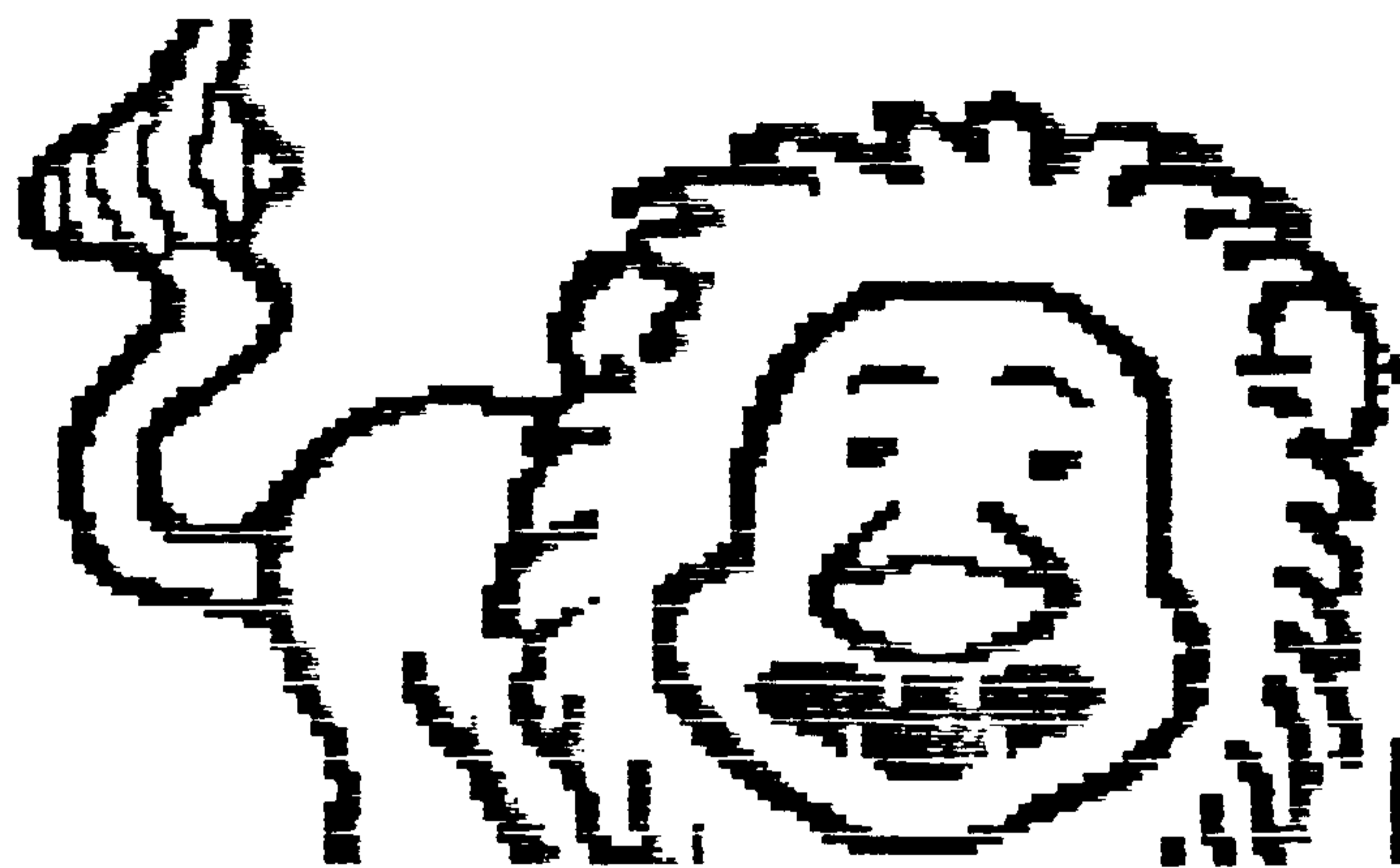

From the Dist. Gov. Newsletter

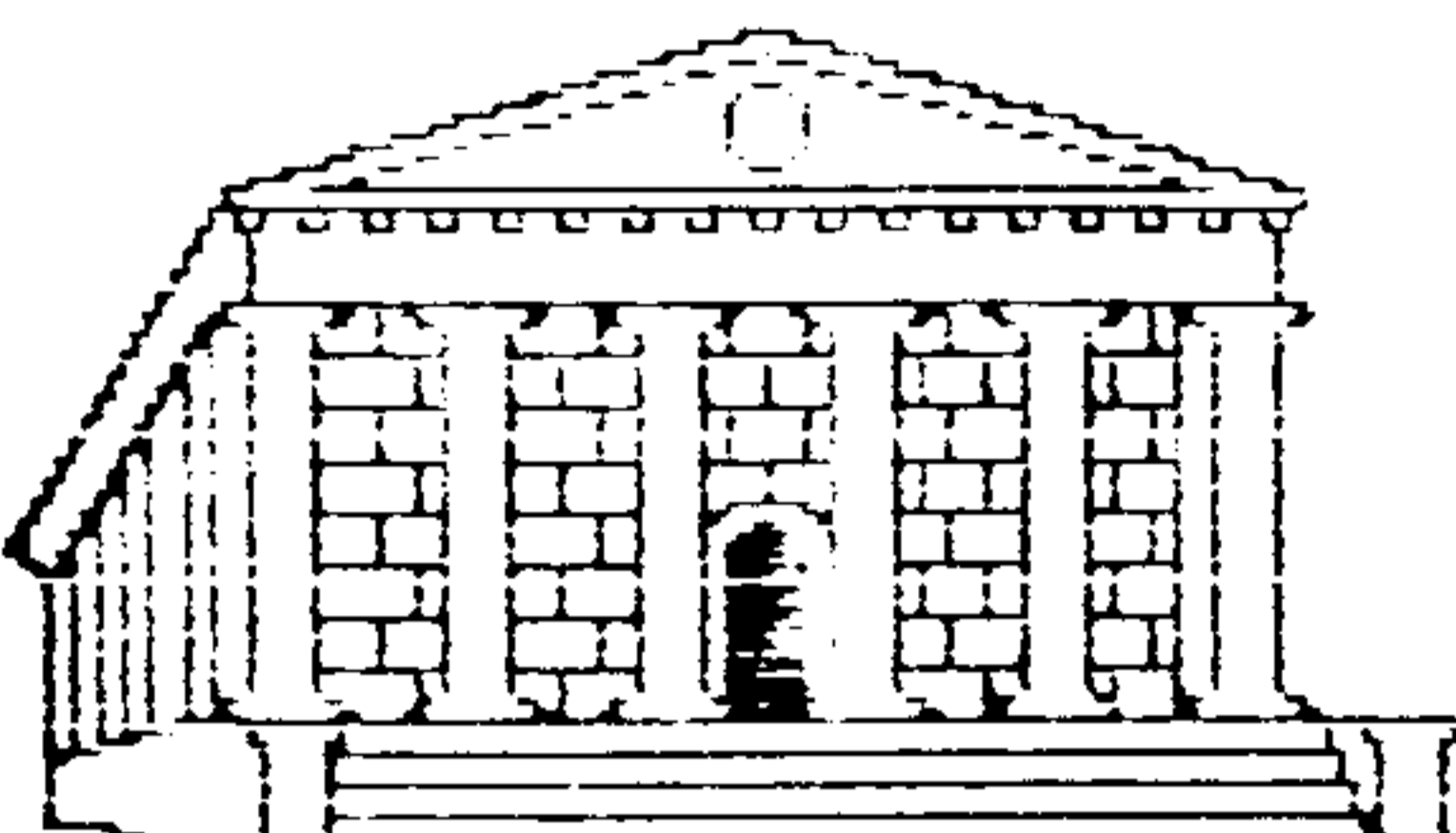
