

Lions Responded Immediately to the Tragedy Of September 11:

Lions delivered 13,000 respirator masks.

Lions provided food to volunteers.

Lions unloaded supplies at Shea Stadium.

Lions helped conduct blood drives.

Lions with special skills volunteered to be available if the need arose.

Lions helped in myriad ways in the days following the tragedy:

 Lions collected surgical masks, socks, rain slickers, T-shirts and eye goggles to aid rescue workers.

Lions on the scene of Ground Zero administered eyewash to workers, assisted National Guard medics in setting up mobile medical stations, assembled wheelbarrows and replenished supplies. One Lion-chiropractor worked on firefighters.

Lions are planning long-term assistance through an Extended Family Program begun by Multiple District 20.

 Lions will mow lawns, build handicapped ramps, provide rides, babysit, purchase toys at Christmas and otherwise help families with their needs.

 Lions will welcome families to stay at their camps to allow them time away from normal routines. Others will allow families to stay at their country homes.

Multiple District 20 is working with local authorities and charitable organizations to decide how best to apply funds donated by Lions. Lions plan to do what they do best: couple their financial assistance with personal, hands-on service.

Note: The Worthington Lions Club has been placed on "Status Quo."



DID YOU KNOW ABOUT OUR SIGHT FOUNDATION?

The West Virginia Lions Sight Conservation Foundation, Inc. was established in 1959. The Foundation is governed by a Board of Trustees. Eight Trustees are elected, two from each district, to serve four-year terms, by the Delegates attending the West Virginia Lions State Convention. Each of the four elected District Governors serve on the board during their term of office. These elected administrators of the Foundation receive no financial compensation. Less than 3% of donations received are used for Administrative purposes.

PURPOSE OF THE FOUNDATION

The Purpose of the Foundation is to meet the sight and hearing needs of the citizens of West Virginia, if other aid is not available. Some services provided are Cataract Removal, Corneal Transplants, Detached Retinas, Crossed Eyes, Ear Surgery, Vision and Hearing Devices. Eye and ear screening and substitutes for sight and hearing loss are also fostered. Each case is investigated by The Sight and Hearing Committee of the individual Lions Club. If the application is approved it is sent to a District Service Coordinator for review. After approval, the applicant is contacted and arrangements made for the surgery. The Foundation pays the bills.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

The Foundation has sight and hearing education programs available for Lions Clubs, Lioness Clubs, LEO Clubs, Civic Organizations, Church Groups, Schools, Business Groups, etc. To schedule a program, contact a Trustee, service coordinator, or District Governor. The Foundation encourages each Lions Club in West Virginia to have a sight and hearing program each year.

Although cases are not accepted, frames with or without lenses are needed and lenses out of the frames can also be used.
