Club Recycles Used Eyeglasses

Eyeglasses collected at various locations throughout the Fairmont area during the past year were packed up and transported to the District 29L Conference in Parkersburg. From there, and along with glasses collected by the other clubs in the district, they will be taken to the Virginia Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Roanoke, VA, where they will be prepared and shipped to various missions sponsored by Lions and others.

Bob Moffett first picked up 1,400 pairs from Ed Neese. When Keith Long brought boxes with another 1,084 pairs, the decision was made to take a truck to the Conference. 

Club Screens Eyes of 159 Preschoolers

Fairmont Lions Club members Bob Brummage, Aletta Moffett and Bob Moffett visited some of the local preschool facilities to provide free eve screening of the children using the Plusoptix screener provided for use by District 29L Lions Clubs through the West Virginia Lions Sight Conservation Commission. During a two week period in April. children were screened at Sunbeam Early Learning Center, Valley Chapel Child Development Center (two days), and Learning Land Daycare and Preschool. A Total of 159 children were screened at the three sites. Of these 50 (31%) were referred to be followed up by an eye care professional. Of those referred, six children had a screening result indicating a possibility of developing amblyopia, also known as "Lazy Eye." A detailed report sheet (a portion of the report is shown at left) was provided to the parents

or guardians of the 50 children who were referred. There is a good chance that our screening will have prevented future loss of sight in some of these children.

The Plusoptix screener is now being used by other clubs, but the Fairmont club can obtain it again in the future. It is an easy to learn and easy to use device. Any Lion member can be trained in its use.

Chicken Roast Canceled — Broom Sale Scheduled

Pastor Elise Neal Informs Club of ID Need

Pastor Elise Neal, First Presbyterian Church, spoke to the club at the April 14th meeting and addressed the need for providing photo identification cards to low income residents. Connecting Link can provide or direct those in need to assistance, but in many cases a state ID card is required to obtain those services. Many of these people do not have such ID and are unable to pay the costs of obtaining the card. The ID card costs \$5, but requires other documents, usually including a certified copy of the birth certificate, which can cost more, depending on the state where the person was born.



Aletta Moffett subsequently met with Jone Webb of Connecting Link who provided additional information and estimated a need for about 25 cards per year at a cost of \$30-\$50 per card. At the April 28th meeting, the club agreed to provide \$200 to Connecting Link designated to be used toward the cost of photo ID's. President Guy Ward will be discussing cooperation with other area service clubs on this issue.








Club Asked for Help
