127 Children Receive Gifts For over 80 years, the Fairmont Lions Club has provided Christmas gifts to Fairmont's less fortunate children. This year saw a large increase in the number of children served by the club. Virginia Gallion, chairperson for the event, said, "This was the largest group since my mother [Nancy Sickles] has chaired the committee in 30 years." There were generous toy Lions and other volunteers wrap gifts for donations set aside for the Lions Christmas party throughout the year

leading up to the event. The club's allocation of \$866 would not have been sufficient for the number of gifts needed. The club's expenditures amounted to \$504.74.

Volunteers put in 237 hours to make the event a success. Lions worked 189.5 hours while non-Lions pitched in to help for 47.5 hours. Many of the non-Lion hours were contributed by the Union Mission in gathering

and vetting the names of children, moving items to provide working space, etc. Jacci Maier, the Mission's new event coordinator/community outreach person saw that there were snacks, treat bags, music, a craft project and a short Christmas story about the significance of the candy cane for the children.

Eyeglasses and Hearing Aids

According to Eyeglasses Committee Chairperson Keith Long, the club was successful in submitting an application for hearing aid assistance that resulted in an individual being able to obtain the aids. Funding for hearing aid assistance is provided by our WV Lions Sight Conservation Foundation, but the application must be reviewed and approved by the local club—in this case, Fairmont. Long has worked successfully with the Foundation for hearing aids in the past.

Long also reported that the club was providing eye exams and eyeglasses for three individuals for November and three individuals for

December.



Lions Aid Earthquake Victims in Japan When a massive earthquake struck western NDATION Japan, buildings collapsed, fires ignited and tsunami alerts were issued for surrounding

regions. Dozens of people were killed and many more are still missing under the debris. The 7.6 magnitude quake destroyed homes, forced nearly 100,000 residents to evacuate and left tens of thousands of homes without power.

White Hall Ship and More, 13 Opal Drive in White

Hall, is the residential drop off site. Fred Cannon has also picked up items from area businesses including Fairmont Medical Center, Leslie Equipment Company, Industrial Resources, United Security Erie Insurance and Cardinal Tax Service locally, as well as Lakeview Landing in Huron, OH.

The Fairmont Lions Club is using CFK as our primary recycler. For security all hard drives are wiped to Department of Defense specifications.

At the February 8th club meeting, he handed over funds received from the recycling companies amounting to \$1,200. This will be a great boost for the club to help the people of Fairmont through our service projects.



LCIF Grant Helping Youth After Morocco Earthquake

(Oak Brook, Ill., October 20, 2023) – The 6.8 magnitude earthquake that struck the Marrakesh-Safi region of Morocco in September was the largest to hit the country in more than 100 years, and the deadliest in decades. Thousands of people were killed and rural villages flattened. Homes were destroyed, as well as schools, hospitals and other medical and educational facilities.

After emergency needs were met, LCIF grant funds will be used to build prefabricated classrooms and toilet blocks in two hard-hit villages, including 12 classrooms and three restrooms in Amizmiz and three classrooms and one restroom in Mejjat.

"The devastation we've seen as a result of this earthquake is truly heartbreaking and impacted people of all ages," said Lions International President Dr. Patti Hill. "We hope this grant project can bring a small bit of relief to the youth in the region, by rebuilding a place where they can gather to comfort each other as well as continue to learn."

Jim was president of the Fairmont Lions Club in 1984-1985 and received Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) Melvin Jones Fellowship in 2009 followed by Progressive MJFs in 2014, 2016 and 2018. He was presented the WV Lions Sight Conservation Foundation Leoanard Jarrett Award during the 2000-2001 club year. Jim joined the Fairmont Lions Club in January of 1978.

Vision Screening

Sunbeam Early Learning Center was the site for this season's preschool vision screening. Virginia Gallion and Bob Moffett screened 50 children ranging in age from six months to six years old. Two of the children were referred to be seen by an eyecare professional.

Some early childhood vision issues, such as amblyopia, can lead to permanent vision loss, but can be successfully treated if caught at an early age. For that reason, the Fairmont Lions Club has focused especially on the preschool ages, although we screen older children as well, and have conducted screening events for adults in the past.


Aletta and Bob Moffett attended the Clarksburg Lions Club's 100th Charter Night Program



Lions International Dues Increase July 1, 2024

Lions International per member dues will increase for the 2024–2025 club year to \$48.00 per member. There was a \$3.00 increase that began July 1, 2023, this upcoming \$2.00 increase to begin July 1, 2024 and a \$2.00 increase starting July 1, 2025 — a \$7.00 per year total increased gradually over a three year period. The Fairmont Lions Club is billed semi-annually for these dues and for District 29L dues. The club receives a modest additional amount from members to cover costs of club operation that include PO Box rental, an annual fee from the state of West Virginia and other administrative costs. All administrative costs of the club must be paid by members — not from fundraising, as those funds are returned in service.


and were able to speak with many adults about the purpose of the Lions and the new Leo club for area youth ages 12-18.

The Activities Budget is based on carryover funds, fundraising from the current year and inventory totaling \$3,163. Projected expenses are:



E-Waste Recycling Event Saturday, August 10, 2024



Fred Cannon reported that club member Tim Manchin offered his parking lot at 1543 Fairmont Avenue (top of Watson Hill) for the club's e-waste recycling event and the date is set for Saturday, August 10, 2024, 8:00 am – Noon. The club will also be selling brooms at the event. This should be a busy event and we will need as many Lions as can be there to pitch in with

this recycling service project/fundraiser.

Do you have printer inkjet and toner cartridges that you don't have a printer for anymore? Do you have new, unused or used inkjet or toner cartridges you don't just want to throw out? How about old cell phones, iPads, Kindles or laptops that are outdated or do not work? The Fairmont Lions is now recycling small electronic waste to raise funds for our service activities.

We recycle the following items even if they don't work or are broken: New and used inkjet, laser & toner cartridges (including unused printer cartridges you don't have printers for anymore), laptops, iPads, Kindles and cell phones. Our recycler CFK has been a primary recycler in these items since the program was started in 2007. CFK wipes all hard drives to DOD specs. Our experience with them has made them our trusted recycler for these items. We also recycle all types of cables.

Items, including eyeglasses, may be dropped off at White Hall Ship and More located at 13 Opal Drive, Fairmont, during their normal business hours M-F 9:00 am to 5:00 pm or Saturday 9:00 am to 2:00 pm.
