The blind we shall always have with us. Compassion for the blind also shall always be with us as manifested by the sight conservation activities

of our Fairmont Lions this past fiscal year.

Senator Jennings Randolph attested to this at our January 7th meeting when he stated, "In your action-help programs-especially the sight conservation projects-you are demonstrating a reasoned responsible affirmation of faith in your fellow man. You Fairmont Lions move beyond the abstract love of mankind to a specific help for an individual."

One of the early projects of the 1971-1972 year was a very successful bulb sale in October directed by Lions J. Arthur Cunningham and Ronald A. Garletts. The sale, dedicated to alleviate the plight of needy visually handicapped school children in Marion County, grossed \$2,933.15 for a net gain of over \$1,400, a new record.

Our club provided eye glasses for 54 of these needy school children

during the past fiscal year.

By conducting a free glaucoma eye clinic the following month for persons over 35 years of age, the Fairmont Lions recognized no generation gap when it came to sight conservation. According to sight conservation chairman Clarence A. Brock, more than 1,200 persons had their eyes tested for the presence of glaucoma in less than three hours. Eighty of those tested had positive glaucoma readings and were referred to doctors of their choice for further ophthalmological evaluation.

Our club's second annual free glaucoma clinic is scheduled for November. On December 17, our club held its 33rd annual Christmas Party for Joe

Perry's Sunday School Youngsters at the Union Rescue Mission.

That month, 24 of our members manned Salvation Army Christmas Kettles. The hills were filled with the sound of their bells.

At various times during the fiscal year, our club contributed the following: One hundred dollars to the Fairmont State College Student Loan Fund; \$165 to the West Virginia Lions Sight Conservation Foundation; \$100 to the Logan County Flood Relief Fund; and, \$100 to sponsor a local high school student to Boys' State at Jackson's Mill.

Through the herculean efforts of Lion Walter L. Jordan, our club sponsored the organization of the Cross Roads Lions Club which received its

charter in February.

In April, we sponsored a free amblyopia clinic at Fairmont State College for Marion County 3, 4, and 5 year old children. According to chairman Clarence A. Brock, 9 of the 119 children tested were referred for further ophthalmological evaluation.

May, a good month for spring cleaning, was also a good month for the

sale of Industrious Blind Enterprise brooms and mops.

"As a matter of fact," Fund Raising Committee co-chairman J. Arthur Cunningham said, "we really cleaned up with these brooms and mops."

"Not only that," chipped in chairman Ronald A. Garletts, "we swept clean on mops and mopped up on brooms."

(So help me, that's what they said.)

One can readily see why the brooms sold well. After all, there are no bags to change, no heavy machinery to pull around, and no motor noises when using Lions brooms. "Ah so," said the Chinese seamstress from Alabama.

"This broom sale was the most successful yet," added Cunningham, "we

grossed over \$3,000, netting the club over \$1,200."

Last month, the Fairmont Lions Club received two of four possible 1971-1972 first-place awards at the West Virginia Lions State Convention in Charleston. President Charles R. King accepted the awards for our club during state convention proceedings. The awards were for membership and publicity. Four other Fairmont Lions were also there: H. To what degree is this quotation from Paul the Apostle's Second Epistle to Timothy applicable to the recent Fairmont Lions Club light bulb sales effort? Answer this question for yourself. Here are the facts derived from data furnished by Lion J. Arthur Cunningham who kept the project records for Chairman Paul L. Butler and Co-chairman Ronald A. Garletts:

First night—September 26—Twenty-seven members showed up—38% of membership; Second night—Sept. 27—Twenty-five members were present—35% of membership; Third night—Sept. 28—Sixteen members made it————22% of membership; Fourth night—October 4—Twenty-two members participated——31% of membership. Once again more than 50% of Fairmont's potential light bulb customers were not

contacted! The fiscal results reflect the lack of participation. Last year we grossed \$2,933 for a net gain of over \$1,400; the current project grossed \$2,559 for a net of \$1,006.

The Fairmont Lions who did participate in the bulb sale merit the plaudits and acclamation of our club and our community for many of them had to shoulder more than their fair share of the load. The participants are as follows:
