At the June 1 meeting Lion Bill reported on two applications for adult glasses which were approved.

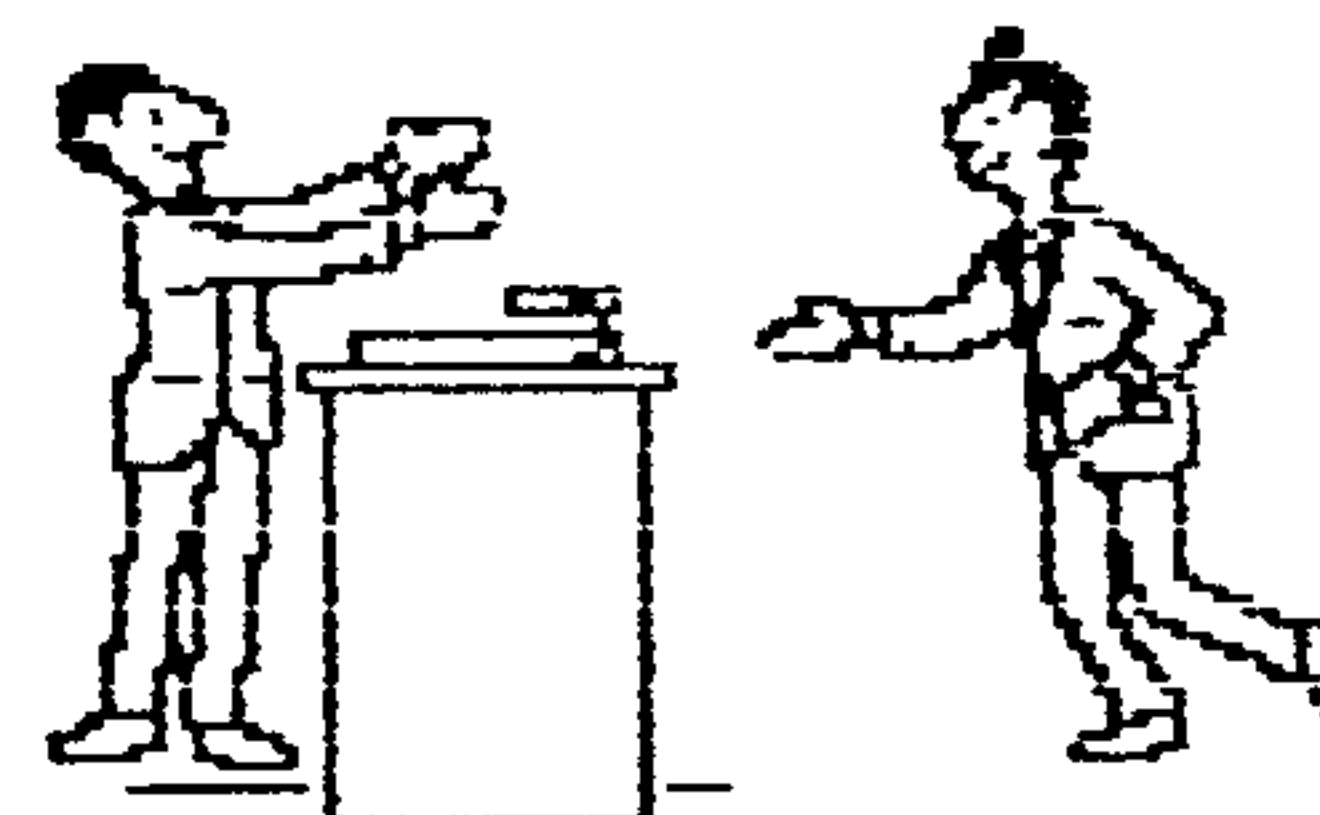
Lion Butch reported he had received a phone call from a person thanking the club for glasses.

New Officers Installed by H. Moffett



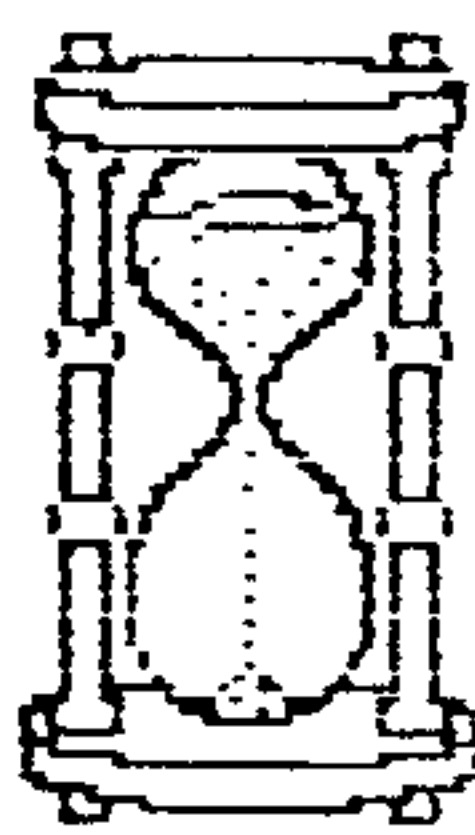


Approval from various school authorities have been obtained for the Lions to set up a pilot program for Lions Quest in Marian county. The Board of Directors of the Fairmont Lions Club have decided that the club should sponsor this program. The pilot program will be set up at Barrackville Middle School and counselor Susan Boone has agreed to attend a training workshop on "Skills for Adolescence" in August. The cost of this workshop is \$975.00 plus travel. However, with this fee the workshop will provide 25 sets of materials for the program. Additional materials (for more students) may be needed at a cost of approximately \$450.00. If the pilot program is successful then the program will be extended to other schools in the county. Although this was conceived as an anti-drug program, it built on the idea of developing self worth positive relationships, leadership and service to others. The Barrackville Lion Club has agreed to help the pilot program with community projects. *****

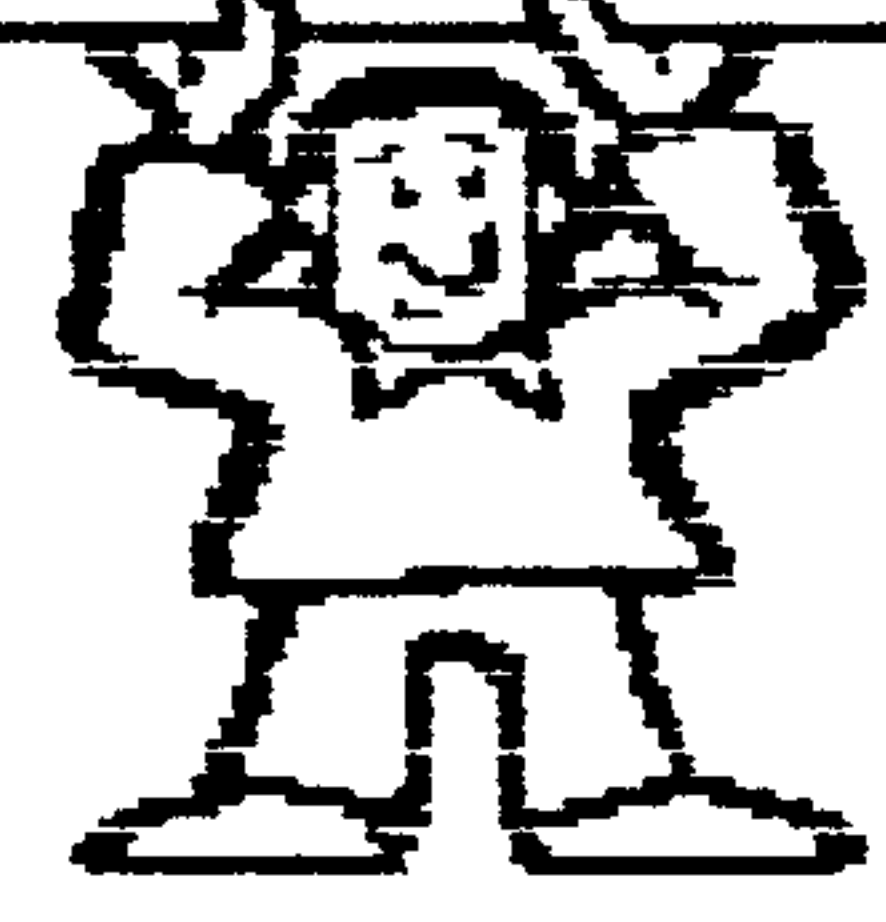
Pres. Thomas Koon Begins a New Year!

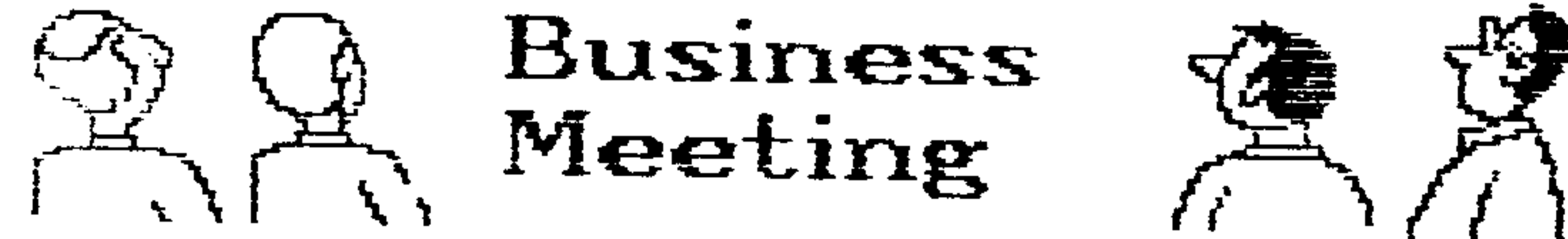
Lioness Picnic is Today!

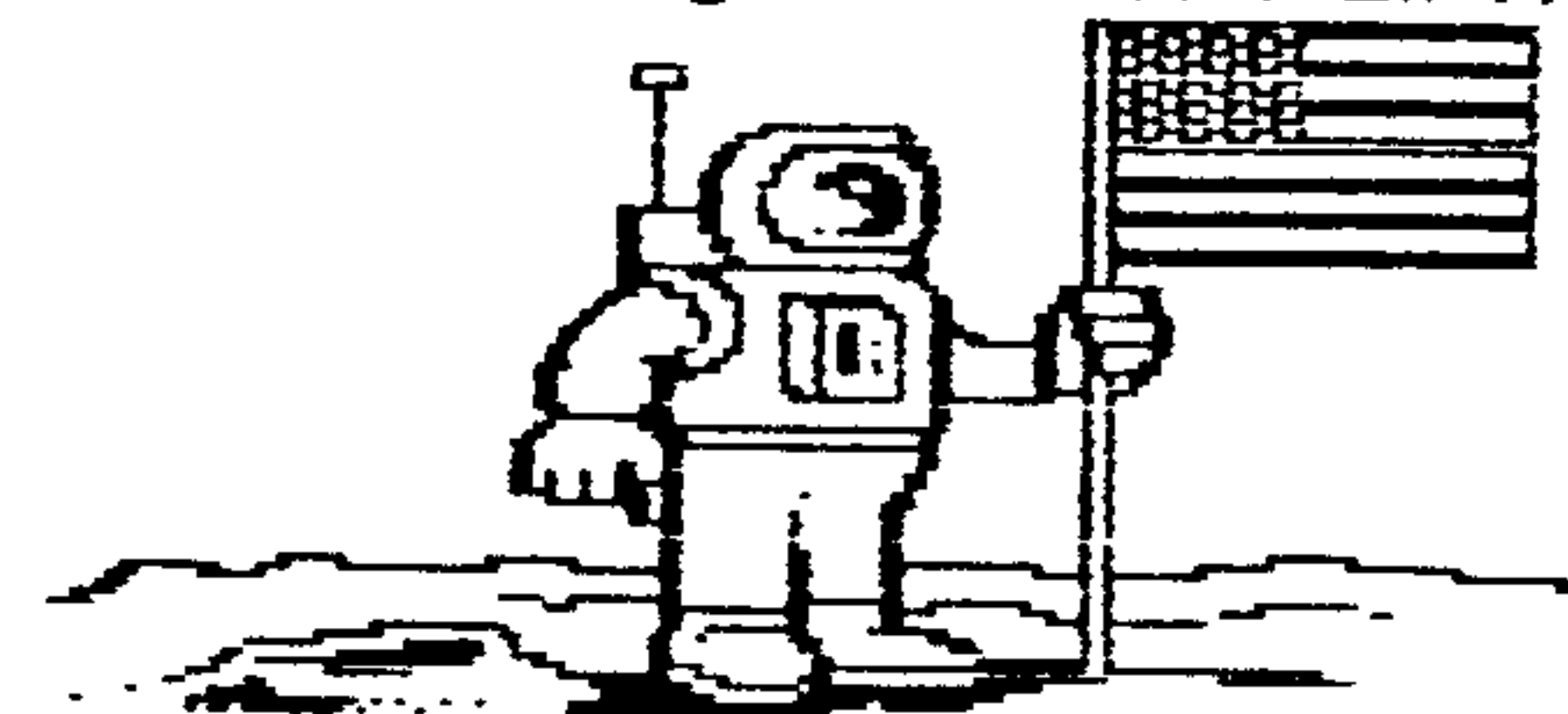

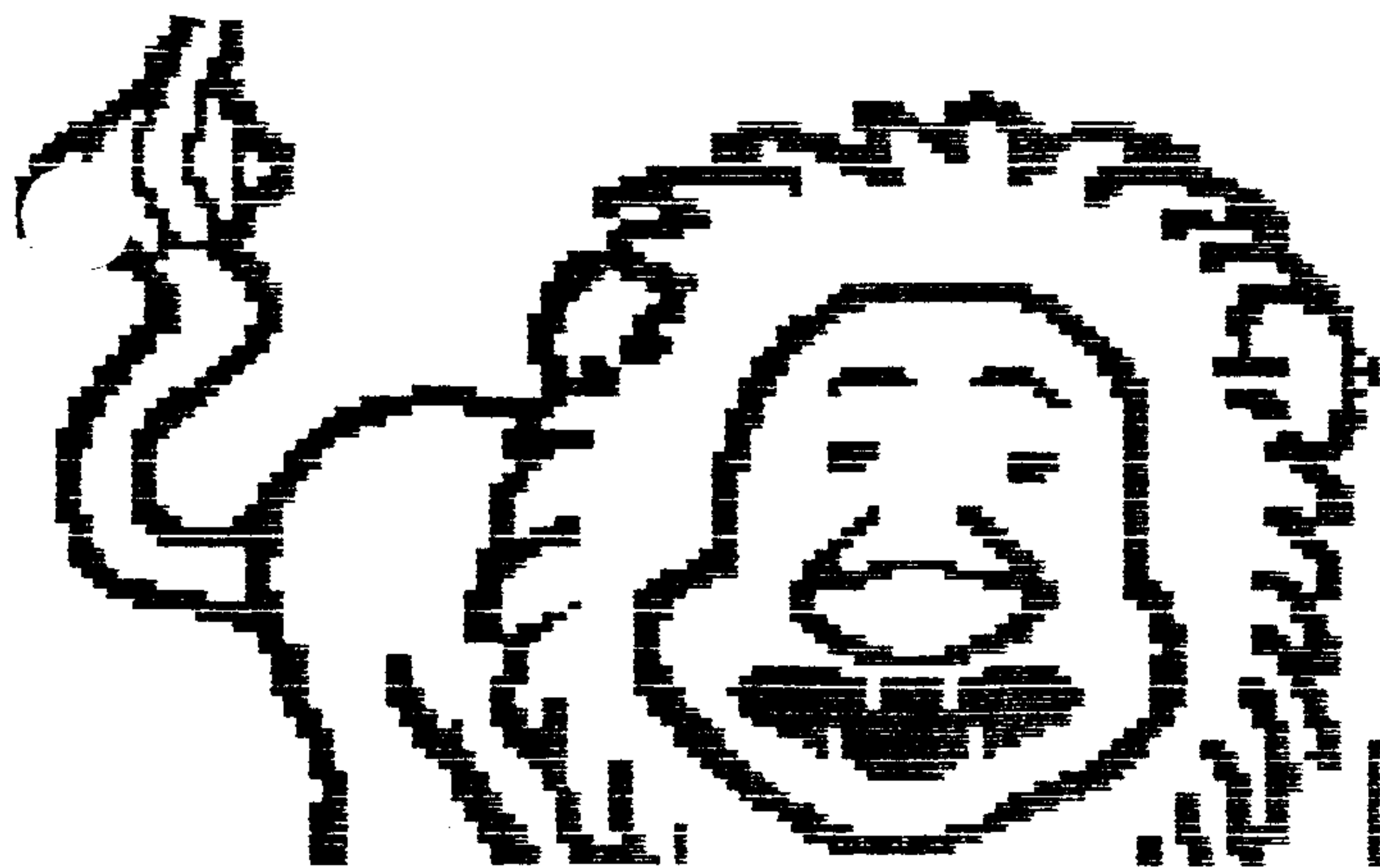

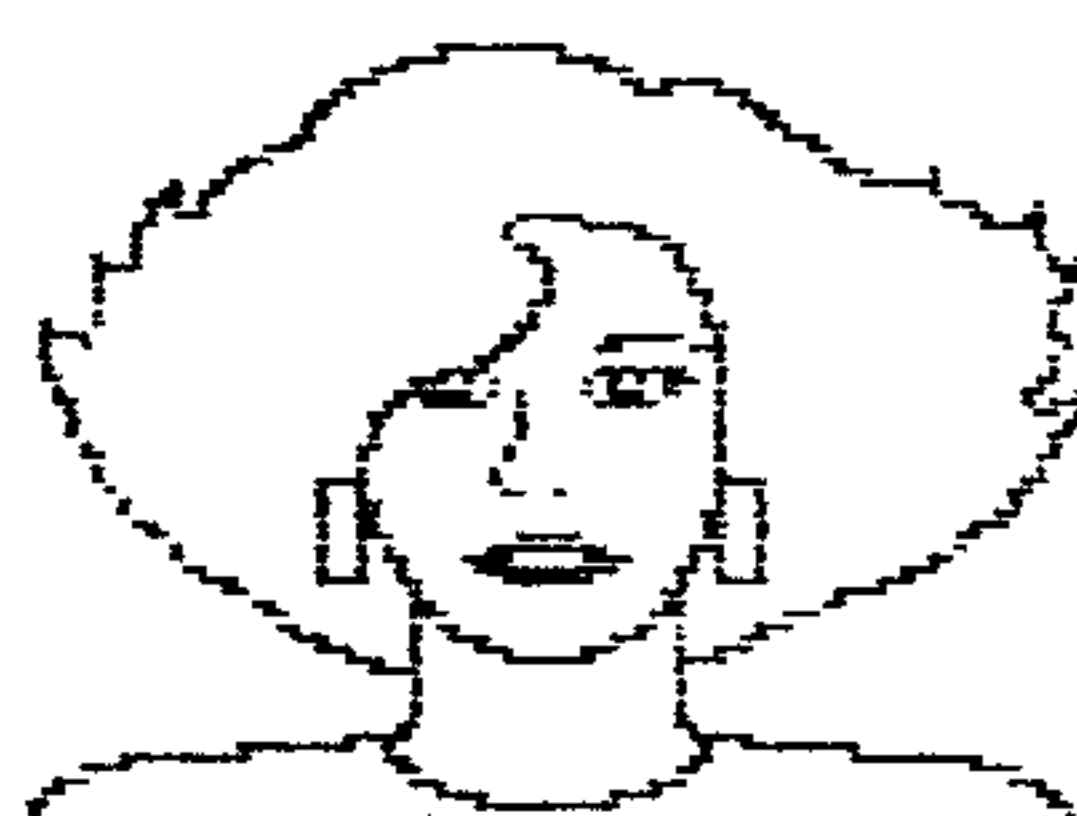
Publicity for the Lions Quest was discussed.

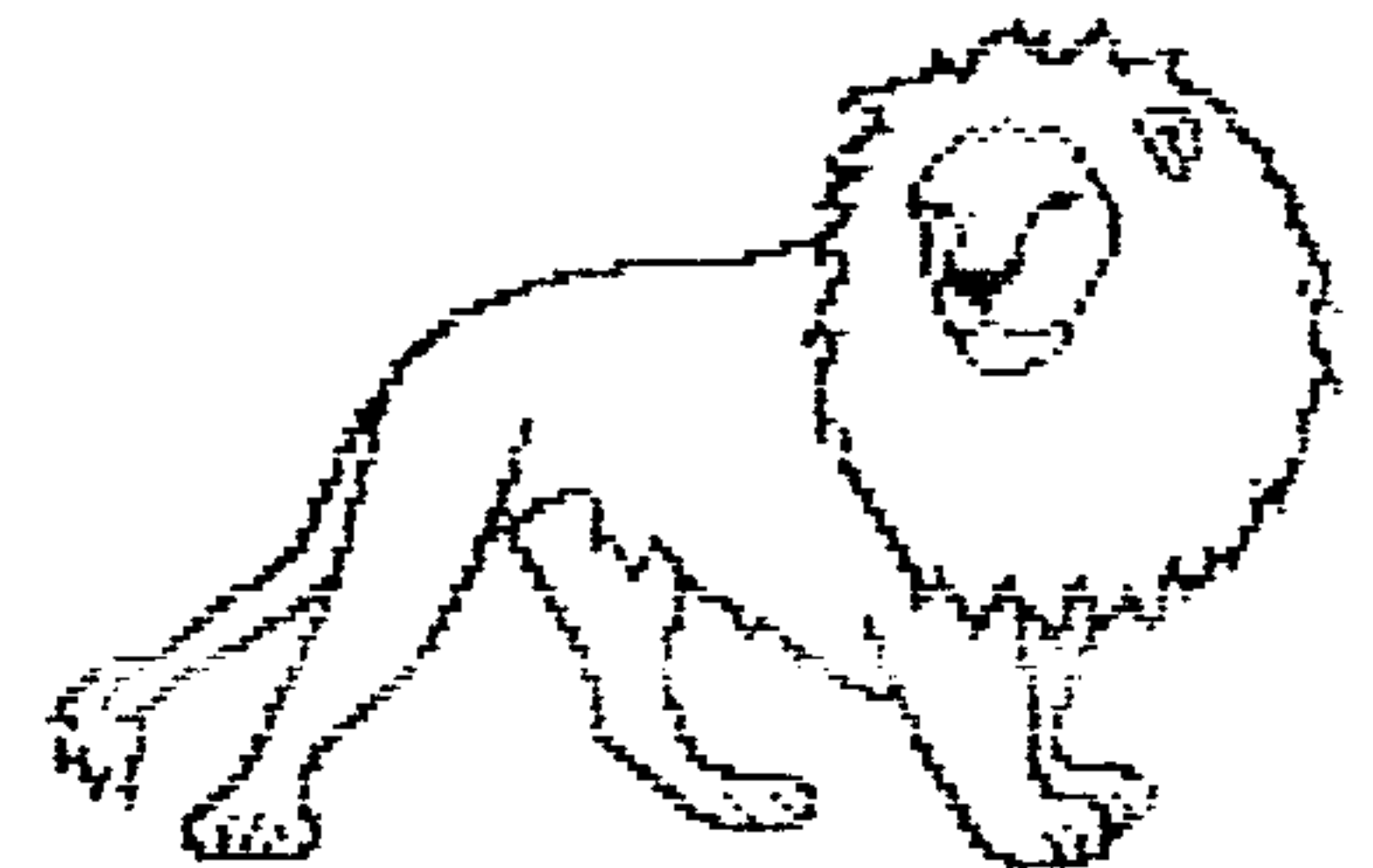

There were other contacts made but they could not contribute even though they would like to for good reasons.

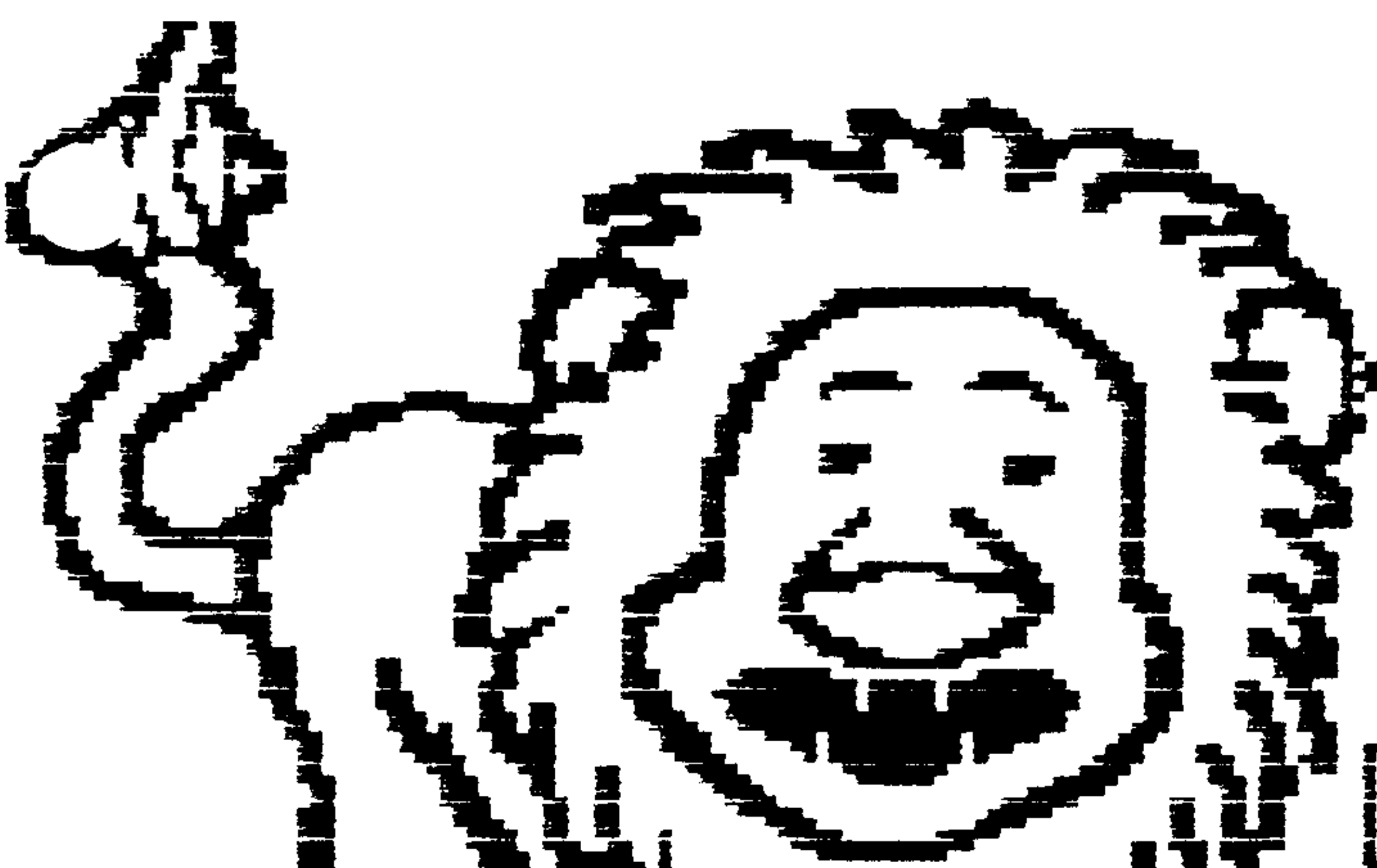
The willingness of these businesses to support the program is greatly appreciated and the efforts of the two Lions who made the contacts deserve a standing ovation.

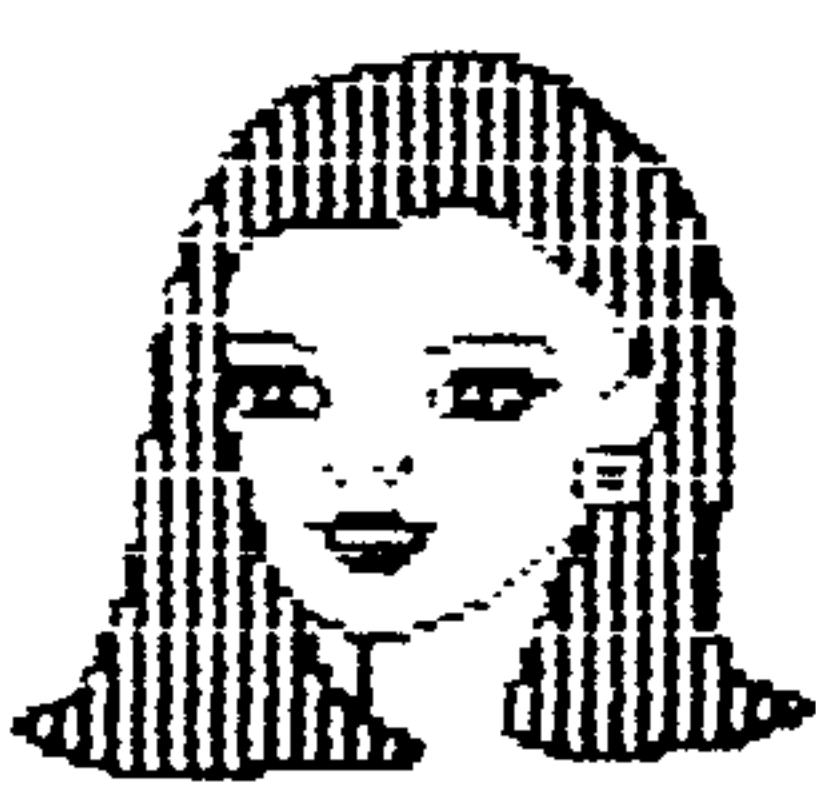

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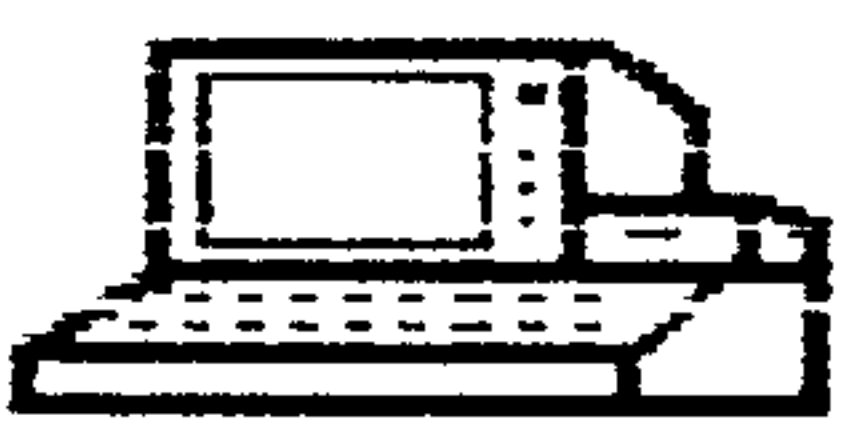

The editor did report that he saw Lion George Corder a few days ago. He is well and sent his greetings and best wishes to the club.

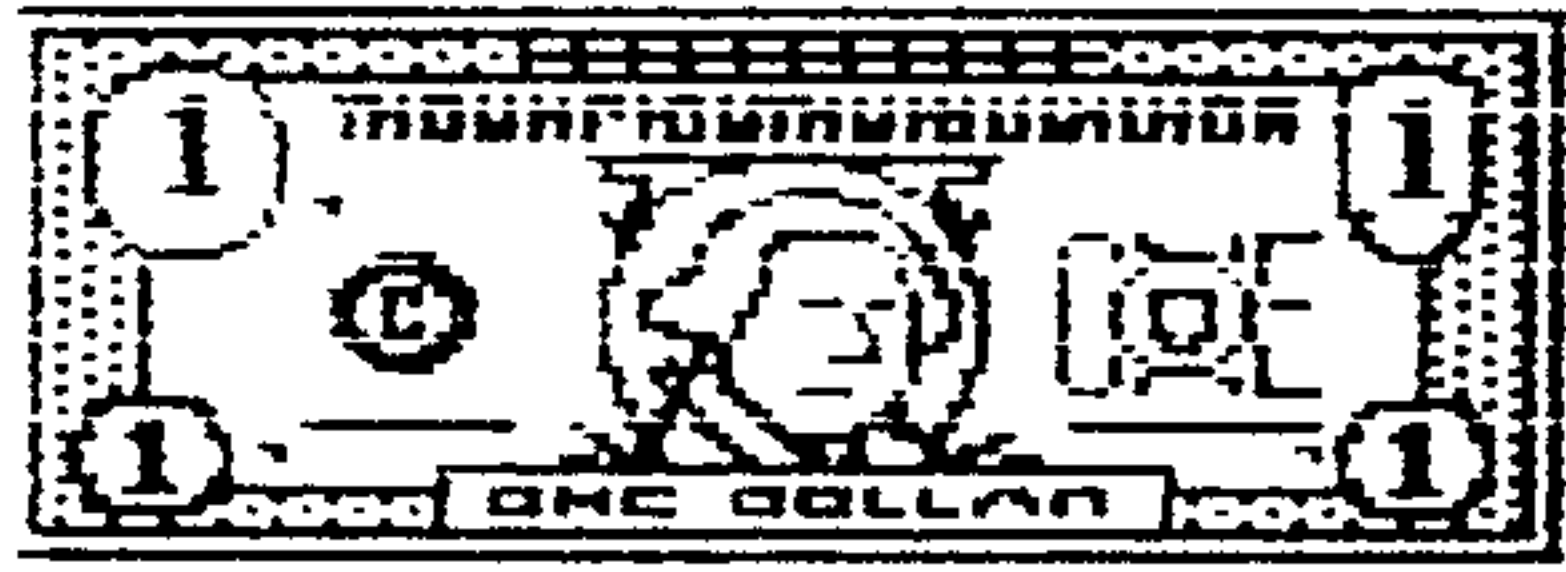
Eyeglass Report

Thomas Kliethermes to Speak about Investments

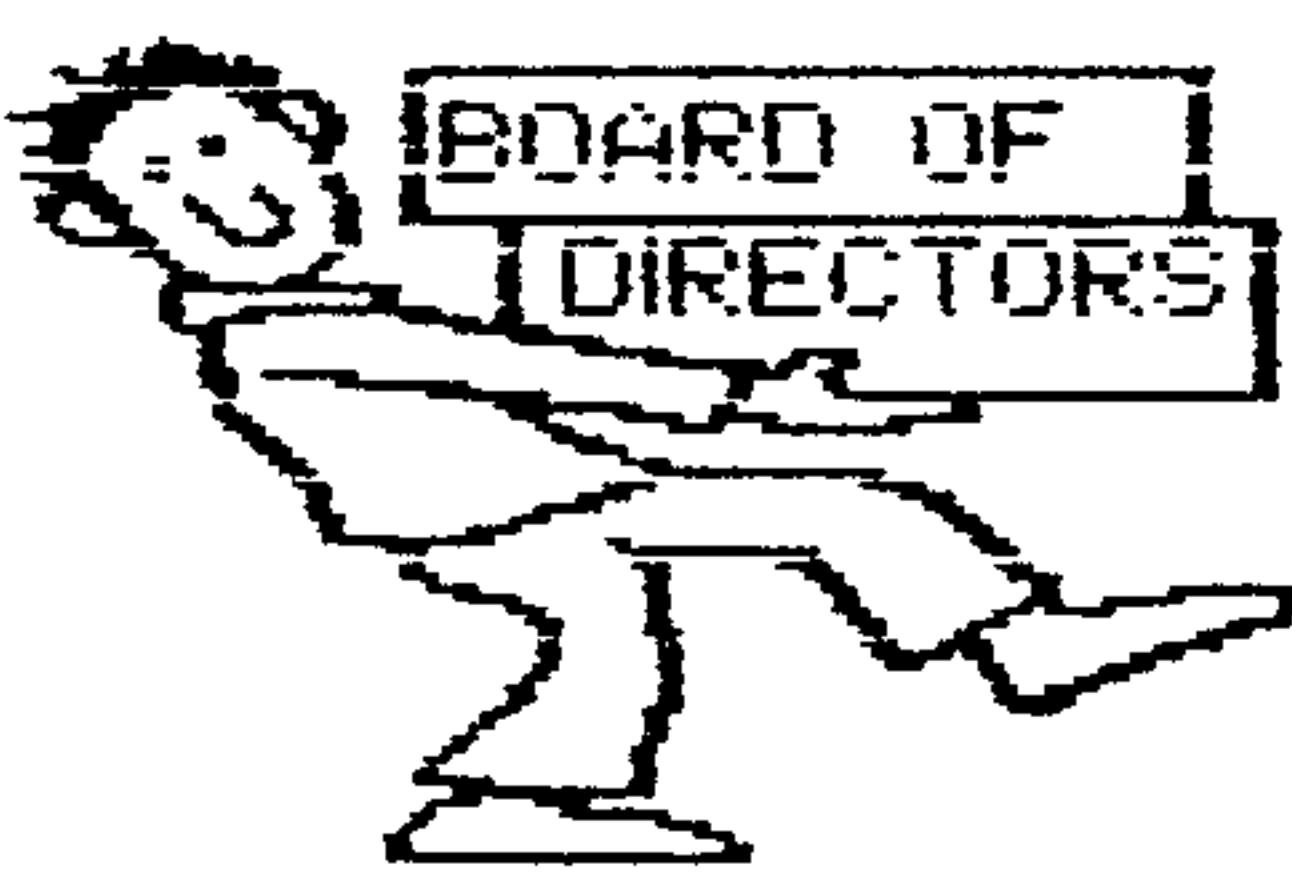

Lion Terry revealed that he had a new fund raising idea but will disclose it to the membership as a whole at a regular meeting.

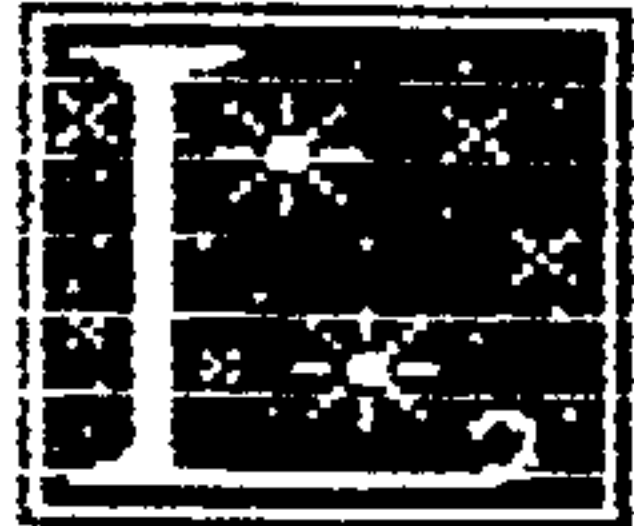
The possibility of inviting women into membership of the club was discussed.

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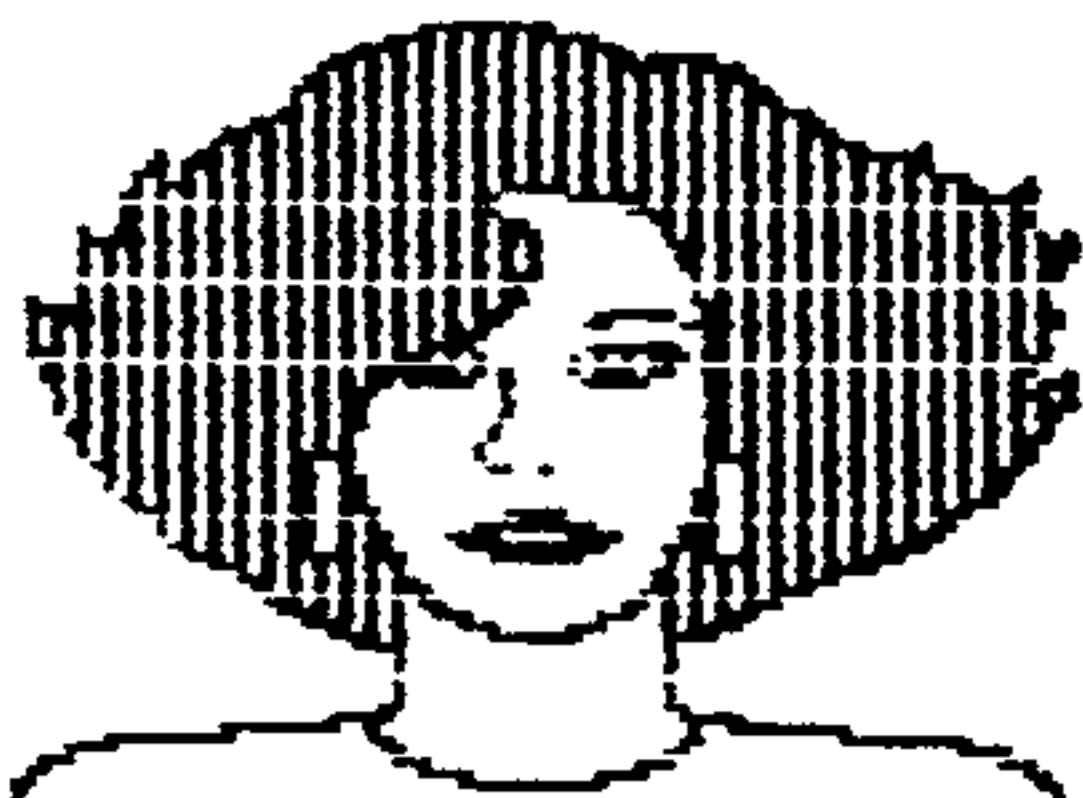
Lions-Quest

Susan Boore Speaks on "Skills for Adolescence"

At the combined meeting of the Fairmont and Barrackville Lions club on Sept. 21 the speaker was Susan Boore, Counselor at Barrackville Middle School. Susan is the teacher that our club sent to a Lions-Quest workshop at Dayton, Ohio in August and who is giving the "Skills for Adolescence" program to the sixth grade students at her school. She said that the program helps kids to develop their abilities. The program is designed to develop self esteem, decision-making abilities and responsibility. She pointed out that one of the strong points of the Lions-Quest program is that it does not apologize for teaching values. The program teaches basic values for which noone should object and which are very important in today's society. The values taught include self-discipline, commitment to a drug free life style, respect for others, learning good judgement and honesty. (Sounds very necessary for our nations' safety.) She also reported that so far the kids have been very excited on the program and have related to it very well. If she can get a similar response from the parents, it should be a very successful program.



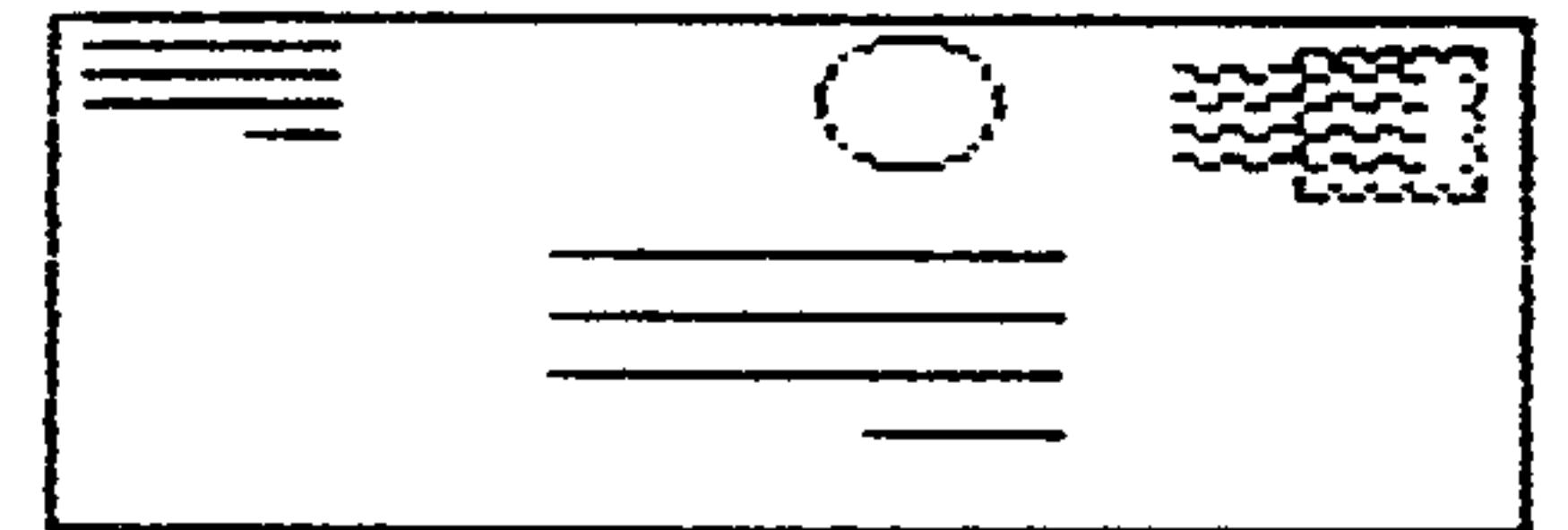

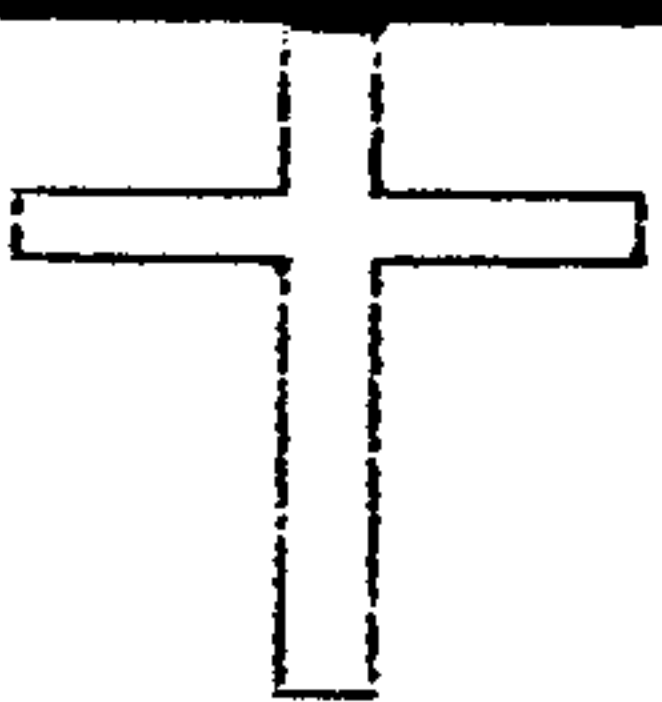
been talking about Indian summer all through the month of October. Does anyone know when Indian Summer begins or is its beginning dependent on the weather in any particular year?

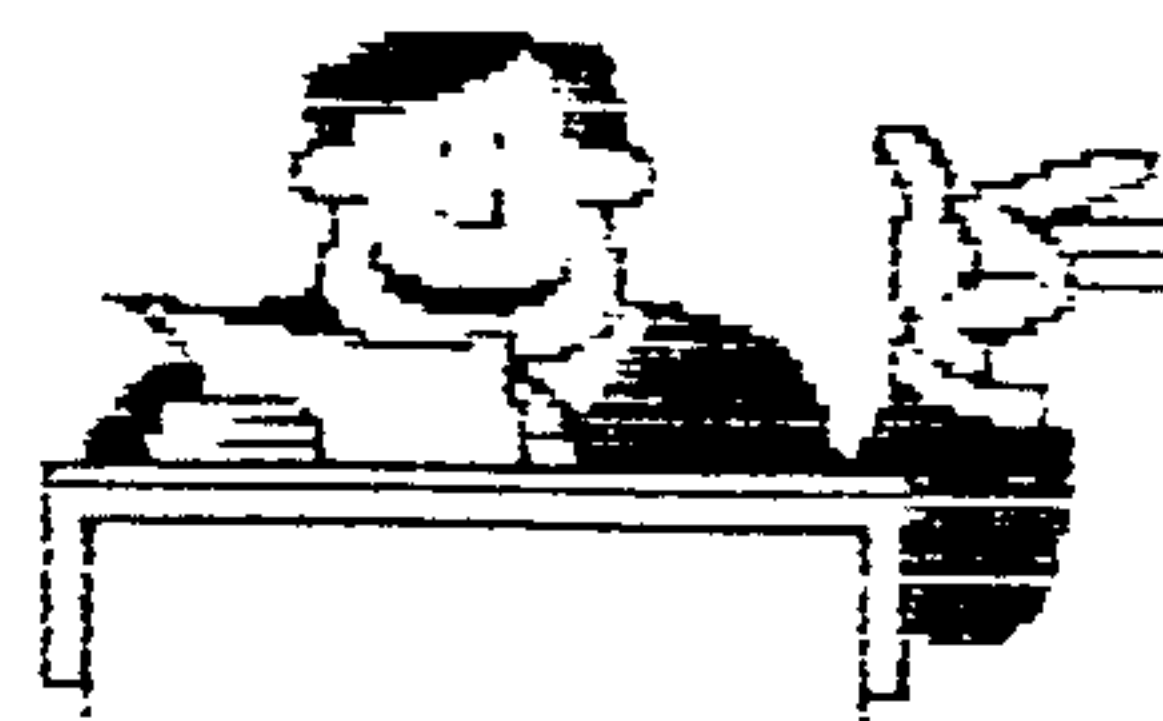
About Old Glasses

Judge and Wanted Man Attend Oct. 19 Meeting

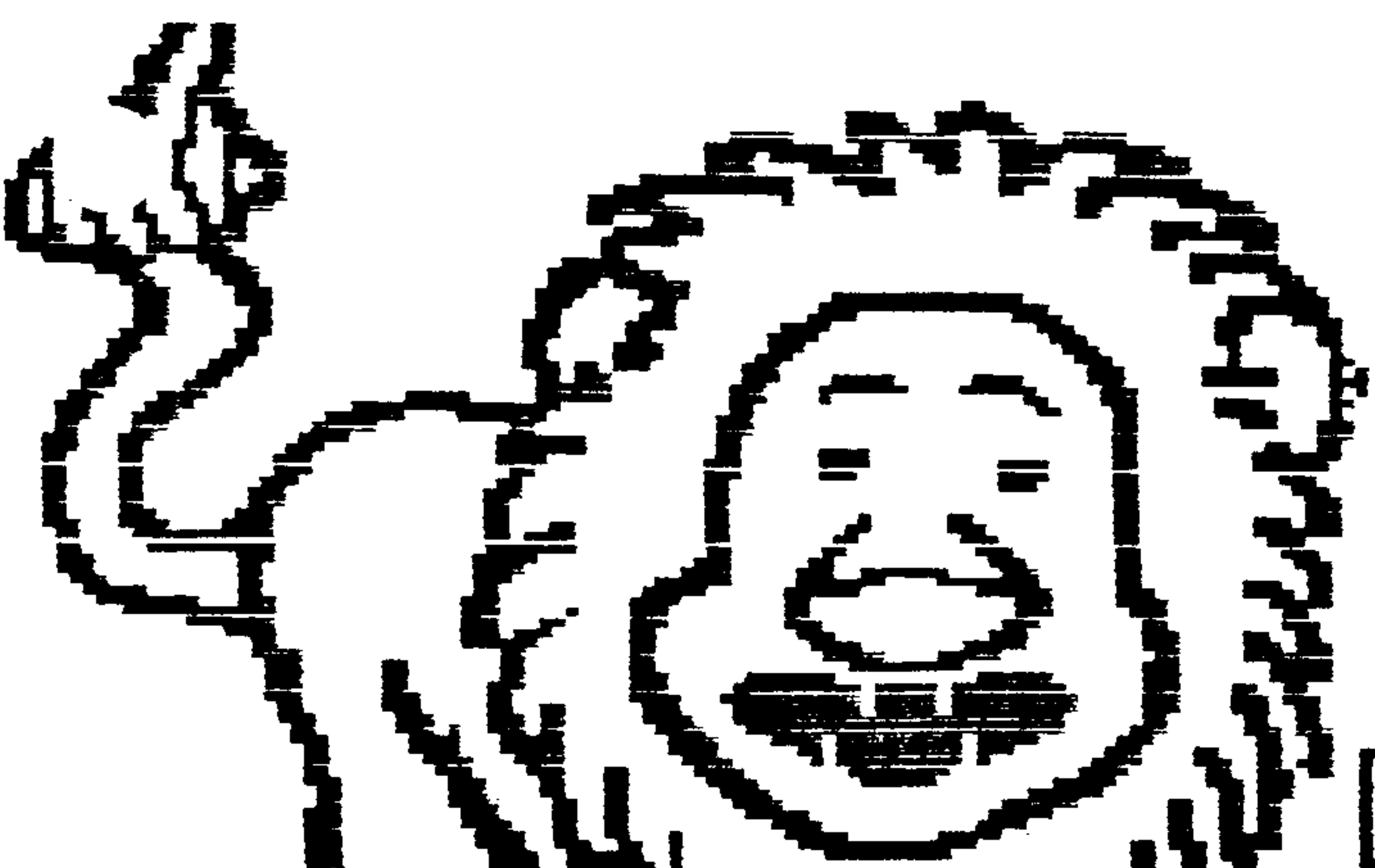
Judge Merrifield was our guest on October 19. He is the son of Lion Carl Merrifield.

The District Governor presented a certificate of membership to new Lion Mulvehill as well as a pin from New Zealand.

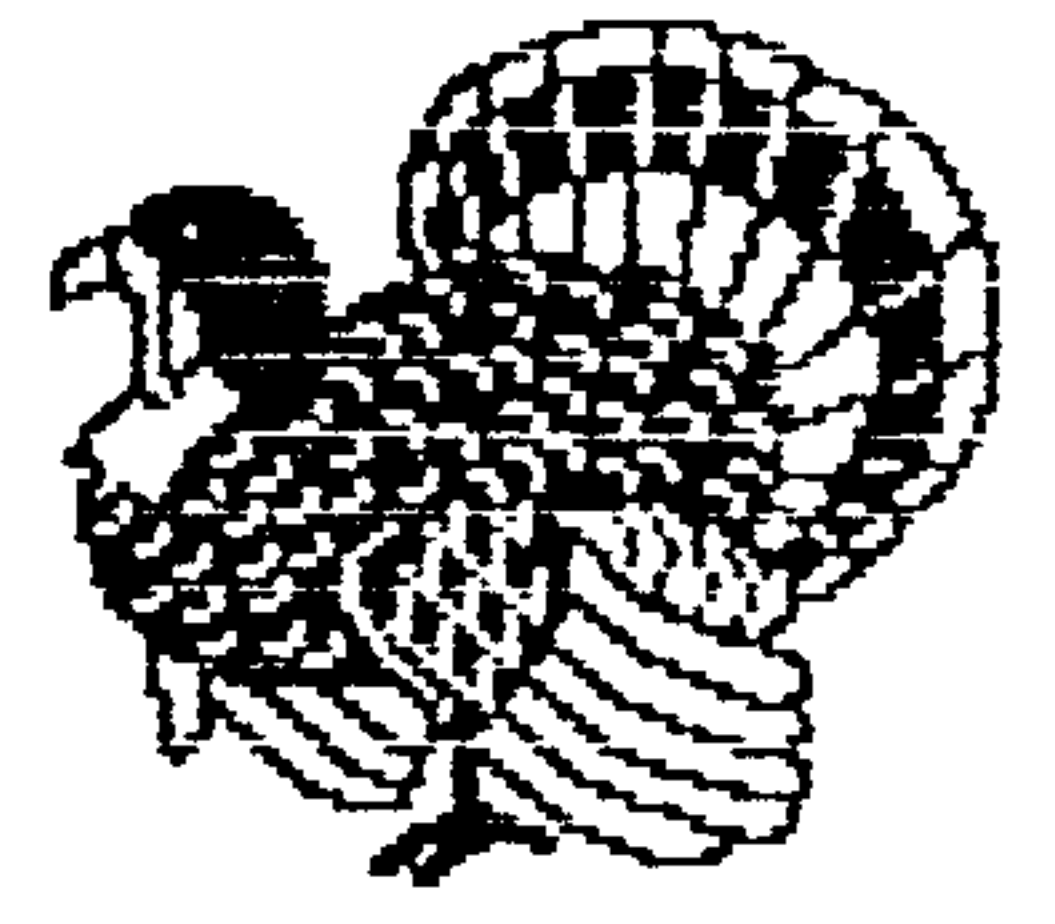
Eyeglass Report
