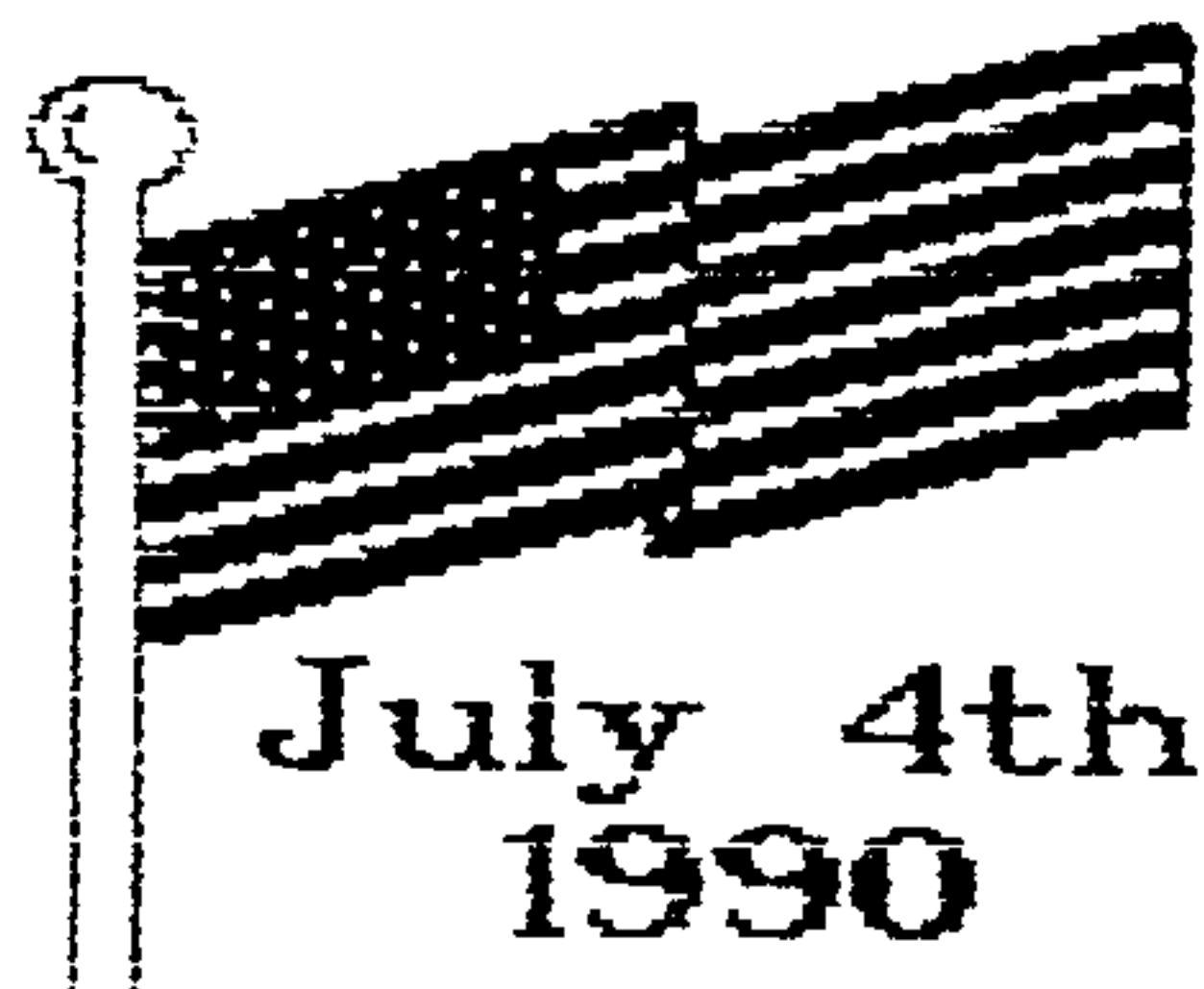


Lion Jim Coleman gave a summary of the past year's activities.

A collection for L.C.I.F. was taken and a check for \$51.00 (a dollar per member.) has been sent to L.C.I.F.

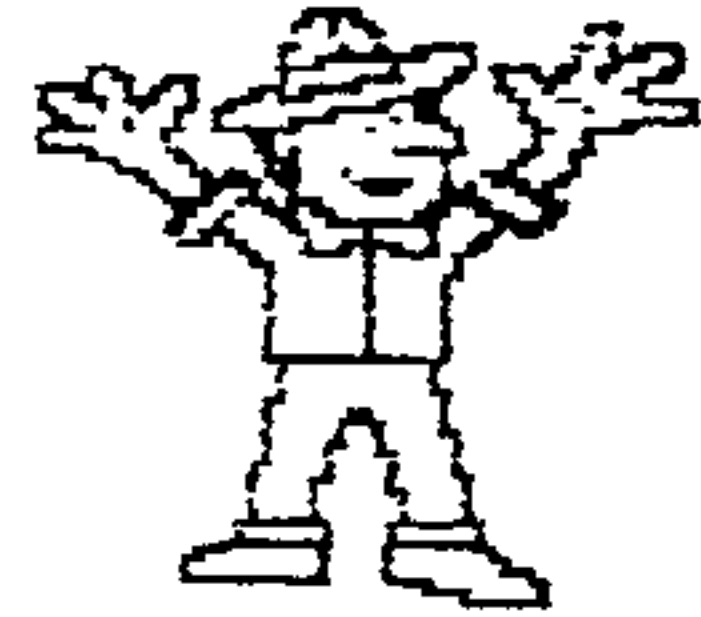

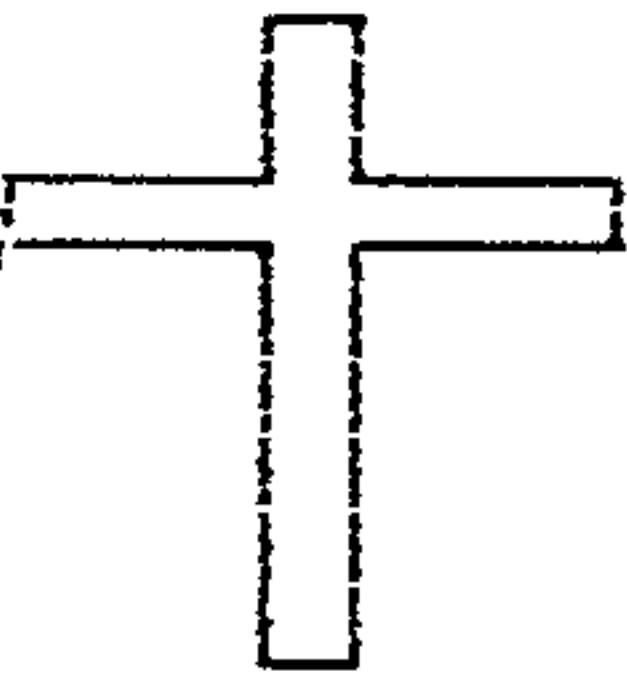


Gerald E. Raikes Speaks on Scouting Program

Meet New Member

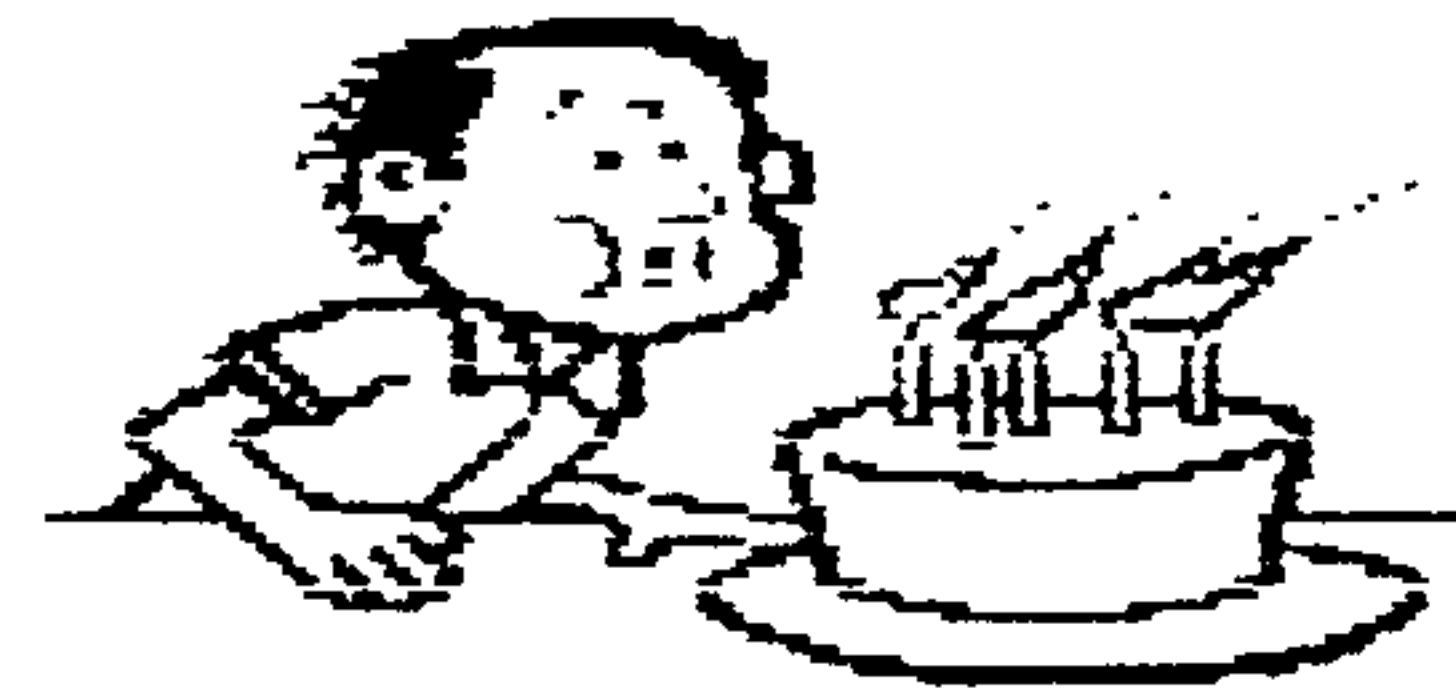

At the June 7 meeting it was good see Lion Romino Back with us. Welcome back!



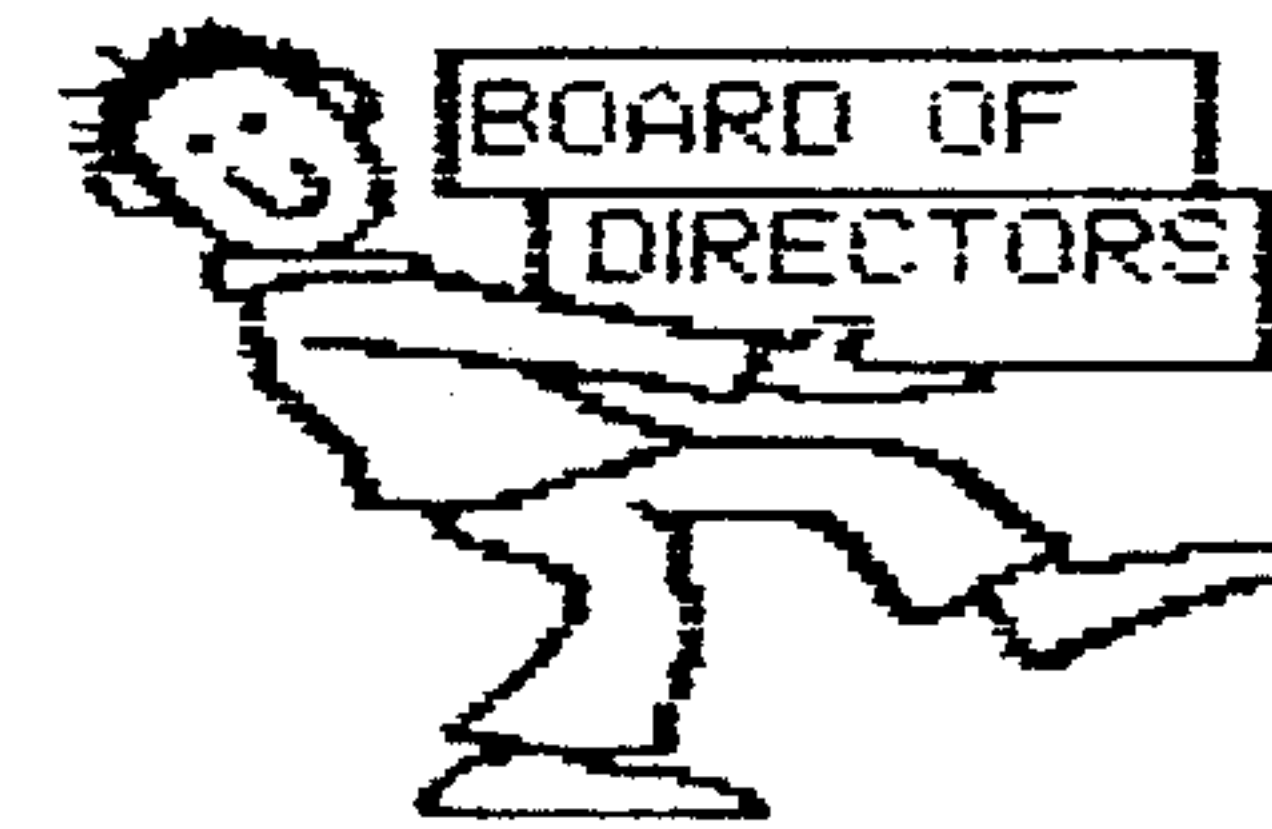

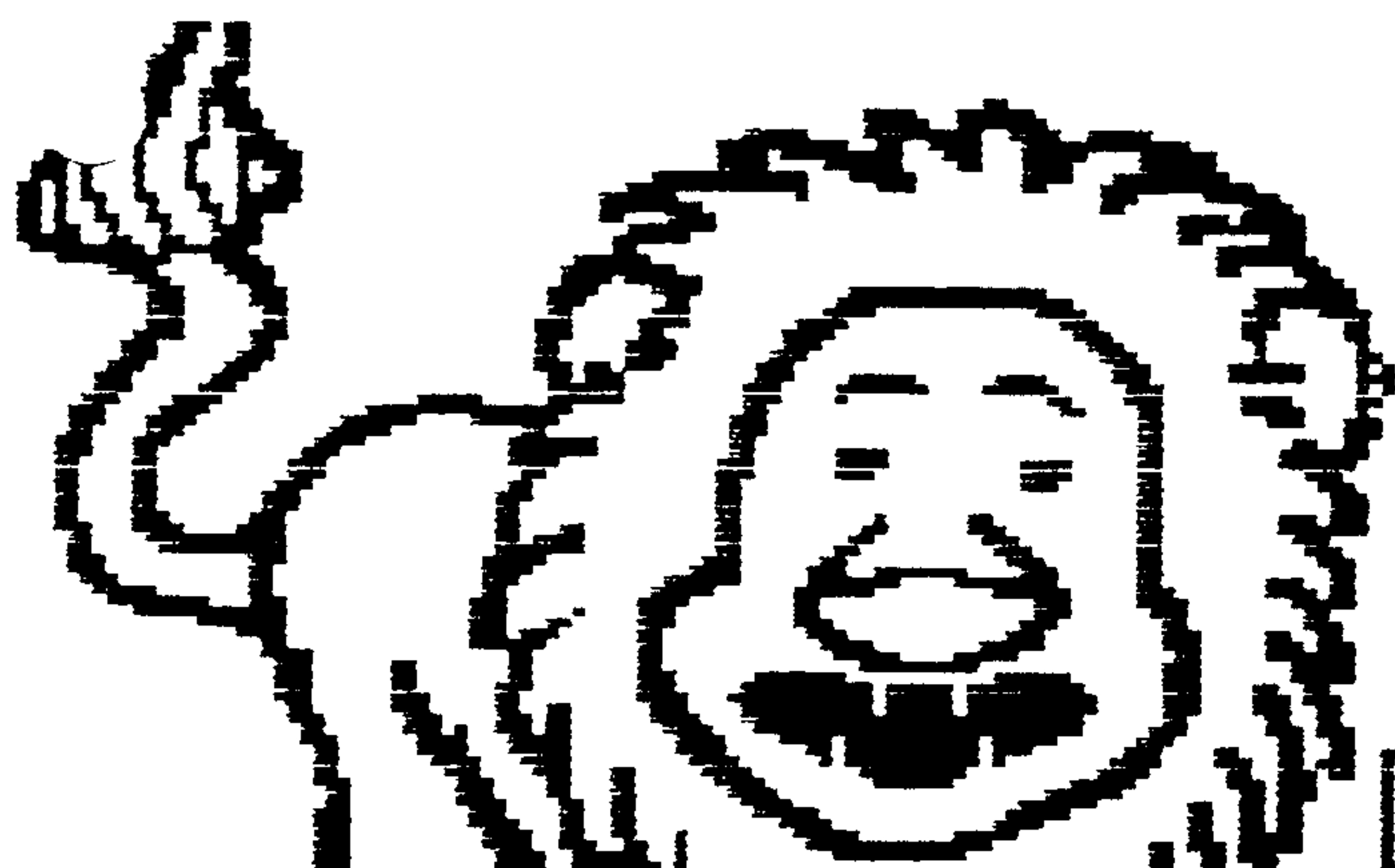
A vote of appreciation was given Lion President Koon and all other officers for having led us through a good 1989-90 year.

Annual Lioness Picnic Aug. 2

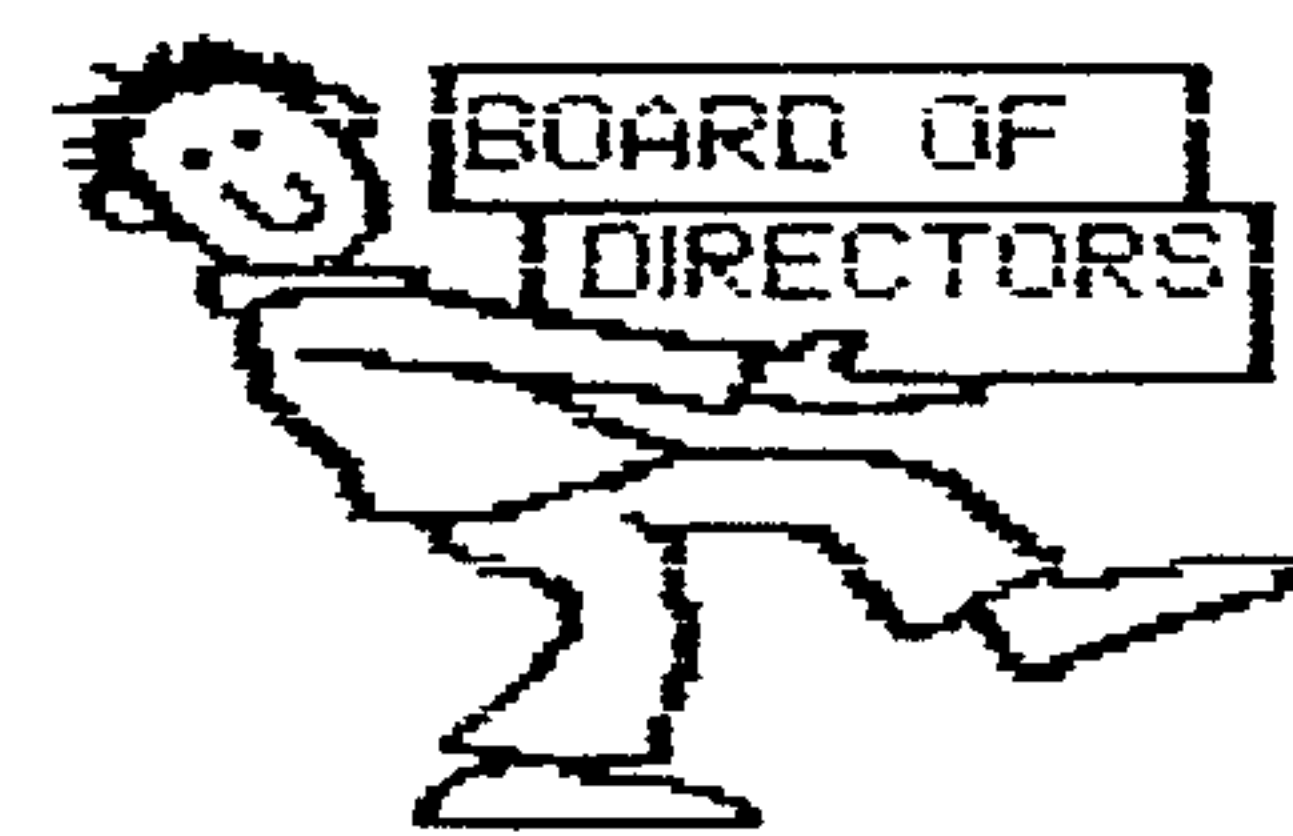

Several fund raising projects were also discussed but no action taken.

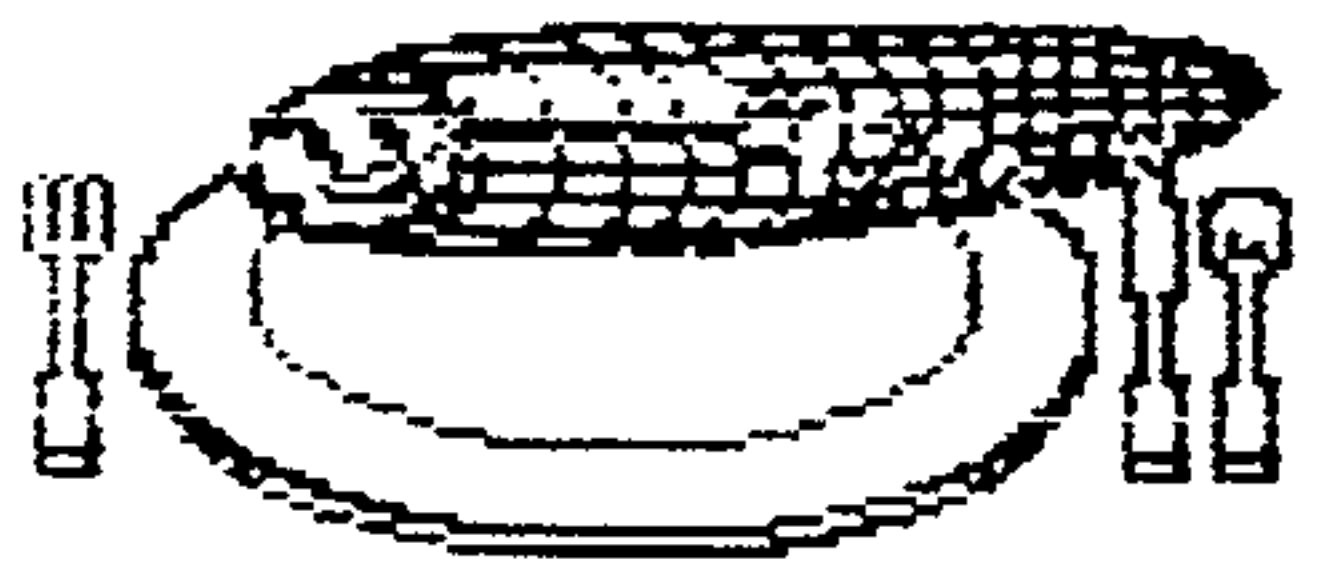


Eyeglass Report


Lions' Corner

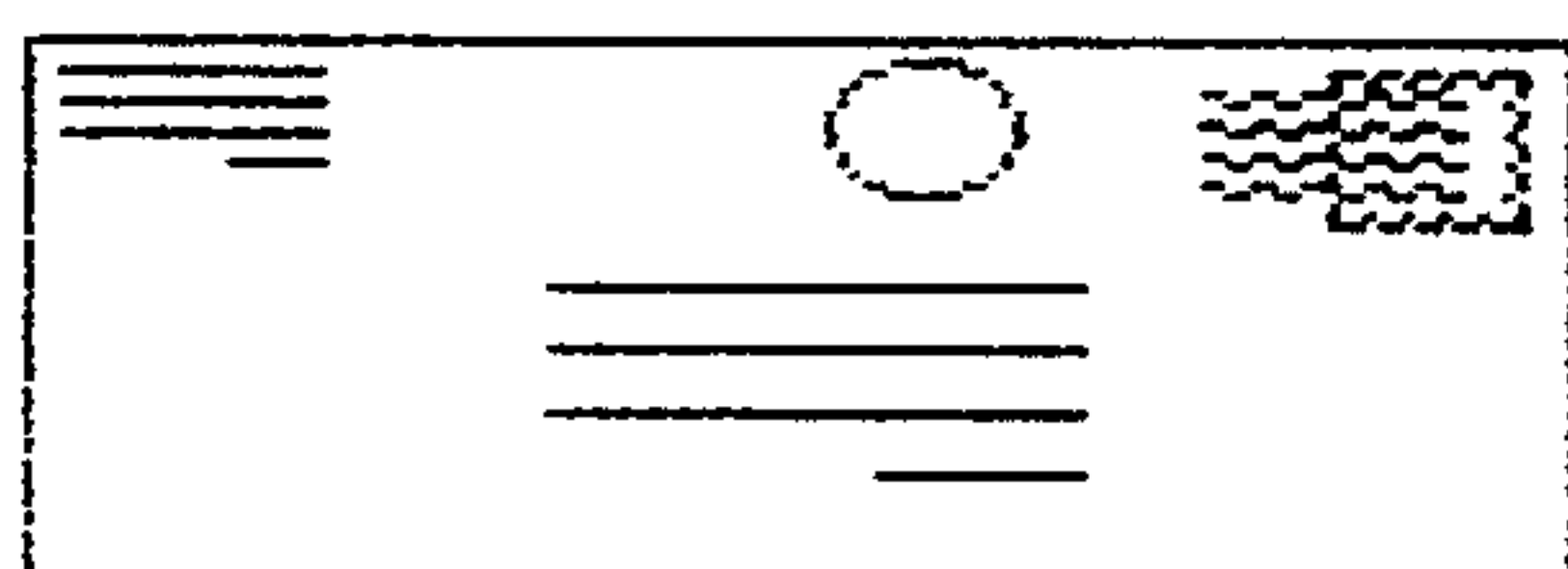
Lion Meadows has purchased the old 6th Street Pharmacy building and is converting it into a pet store. Stop by and see Lee.

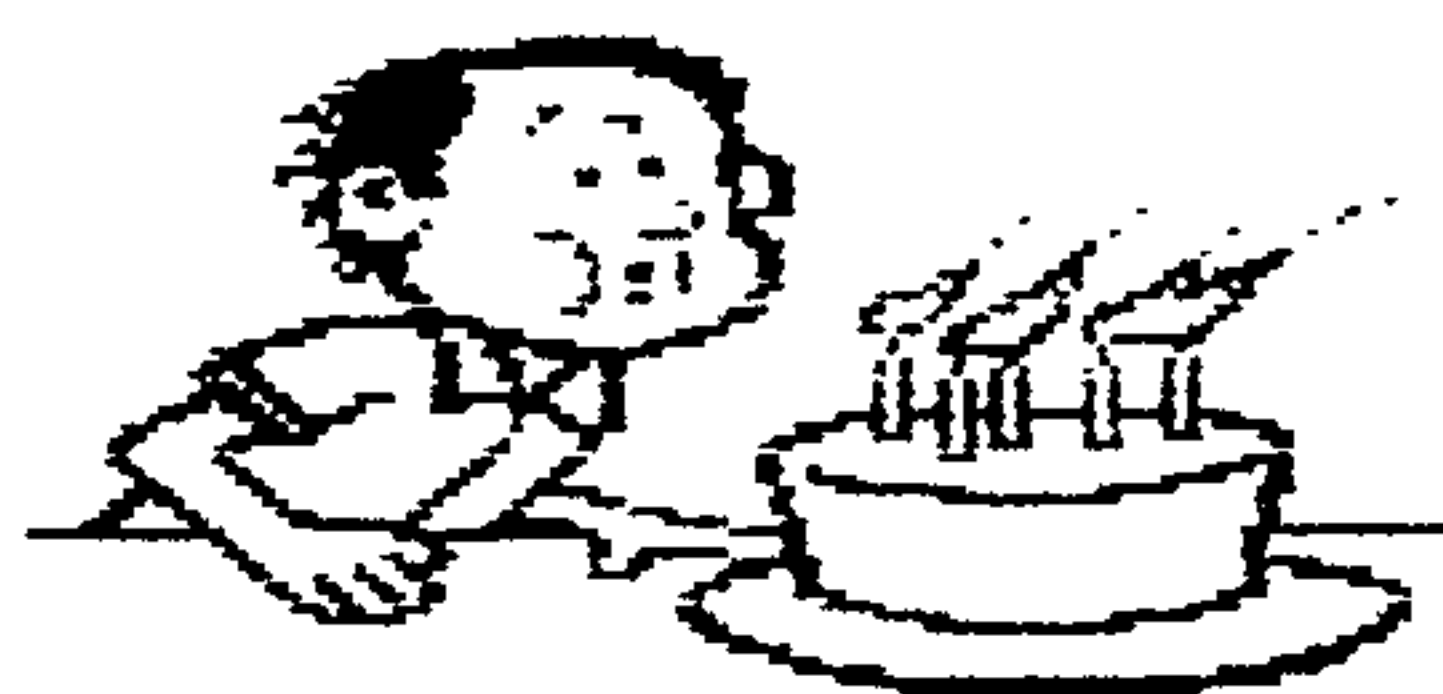

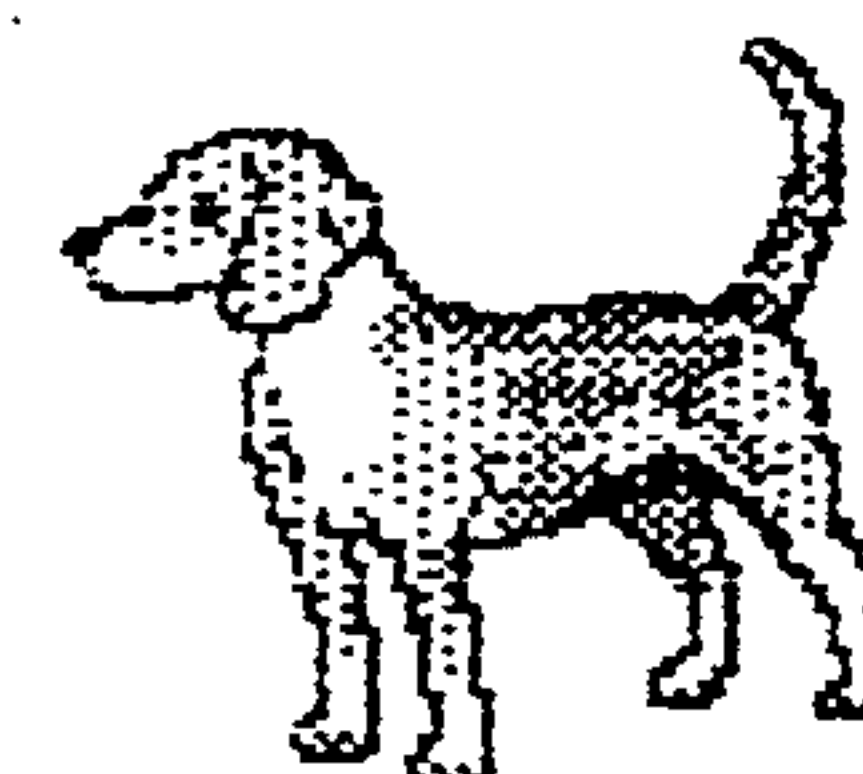

Sight First - New Program

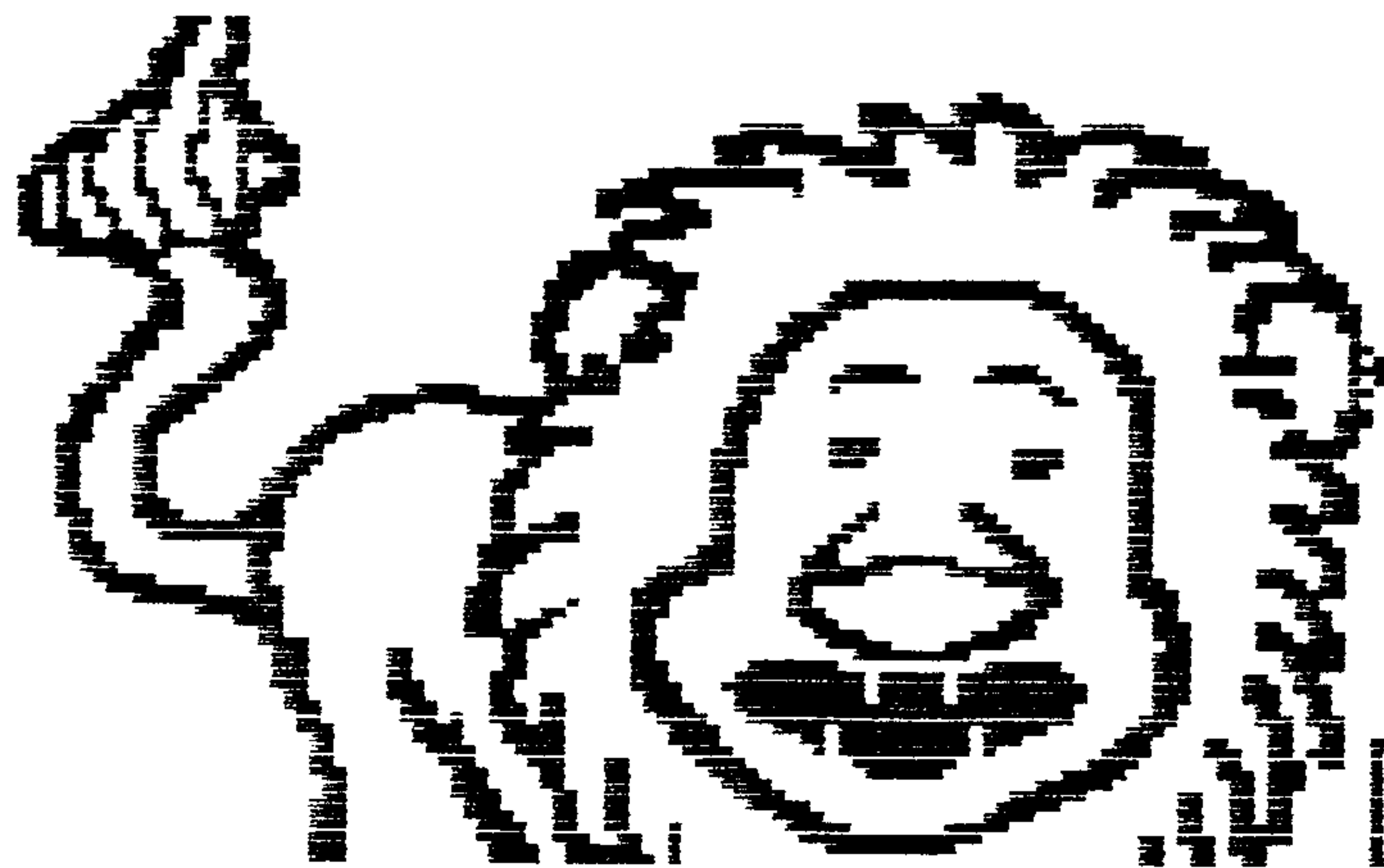
Lions Clubs International has introduced an exciting new program this year called "Sight First". This program is aimed at the prevention of blindness. More information to come later.

Vision Subject of Tonight's Meeting

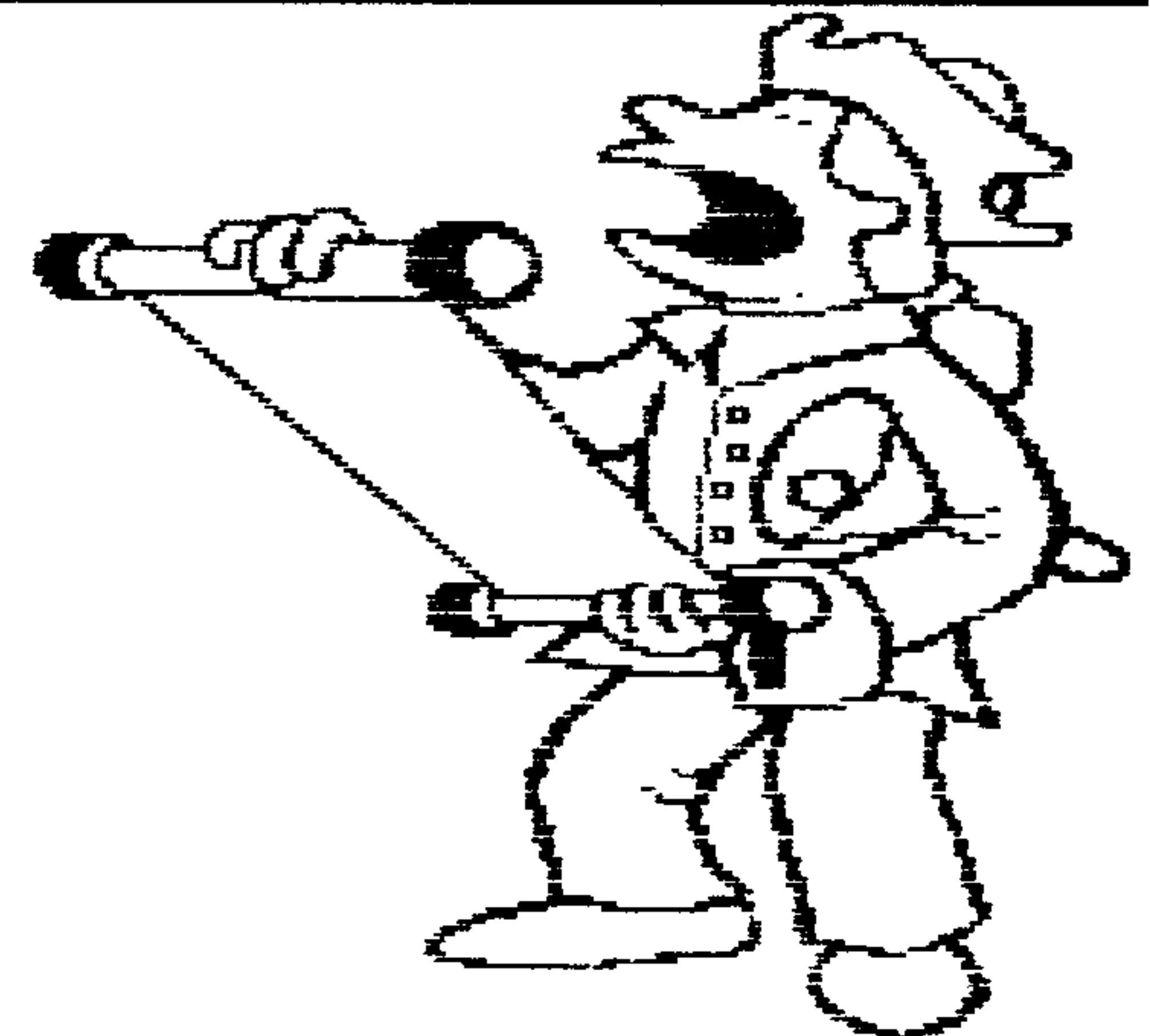

Lions to Support New Eye Center

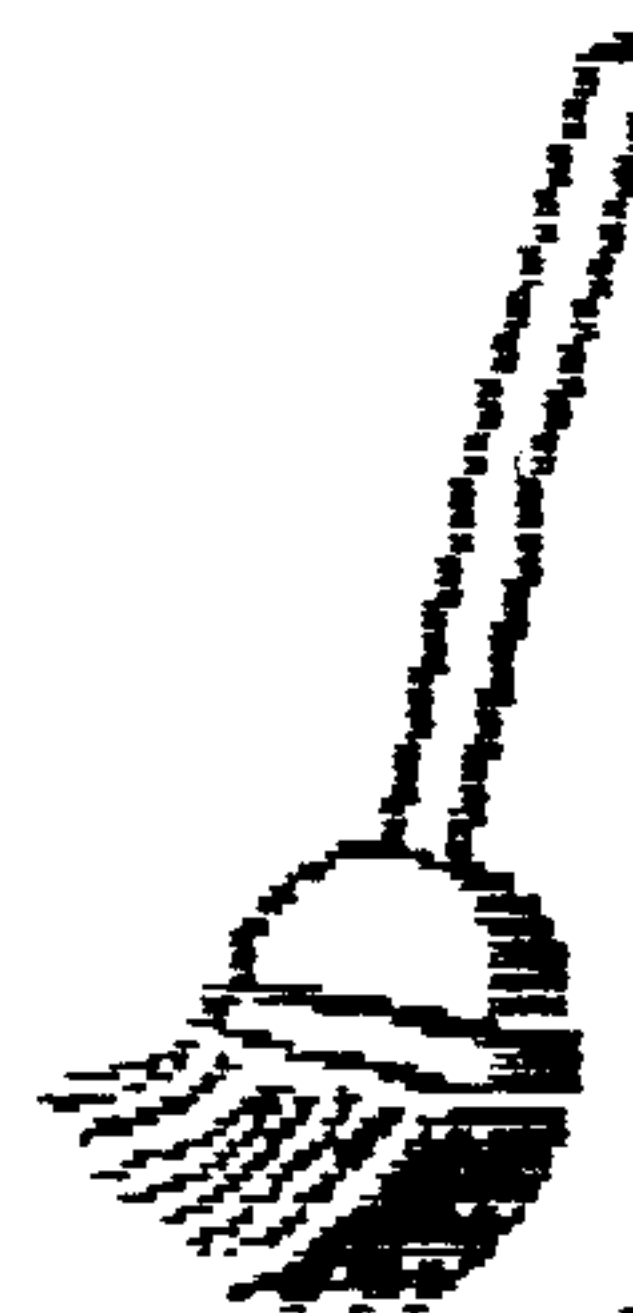




Broom Sale in October

Budgets Presented

At the Meeting on Aug. 16th the 1990-91 budgets were presented by Lion Moffett. Briefly the budget calls for the Administrative Fund to spend \$2,450.00 The Activities Fund to spend \$3,835.00. In order to meet the estimated costs of the activity program the treasurer will have to cash a C.D. in the amount of \$1,586.78 and Fund Raising will only be supplying \$1,810.00. 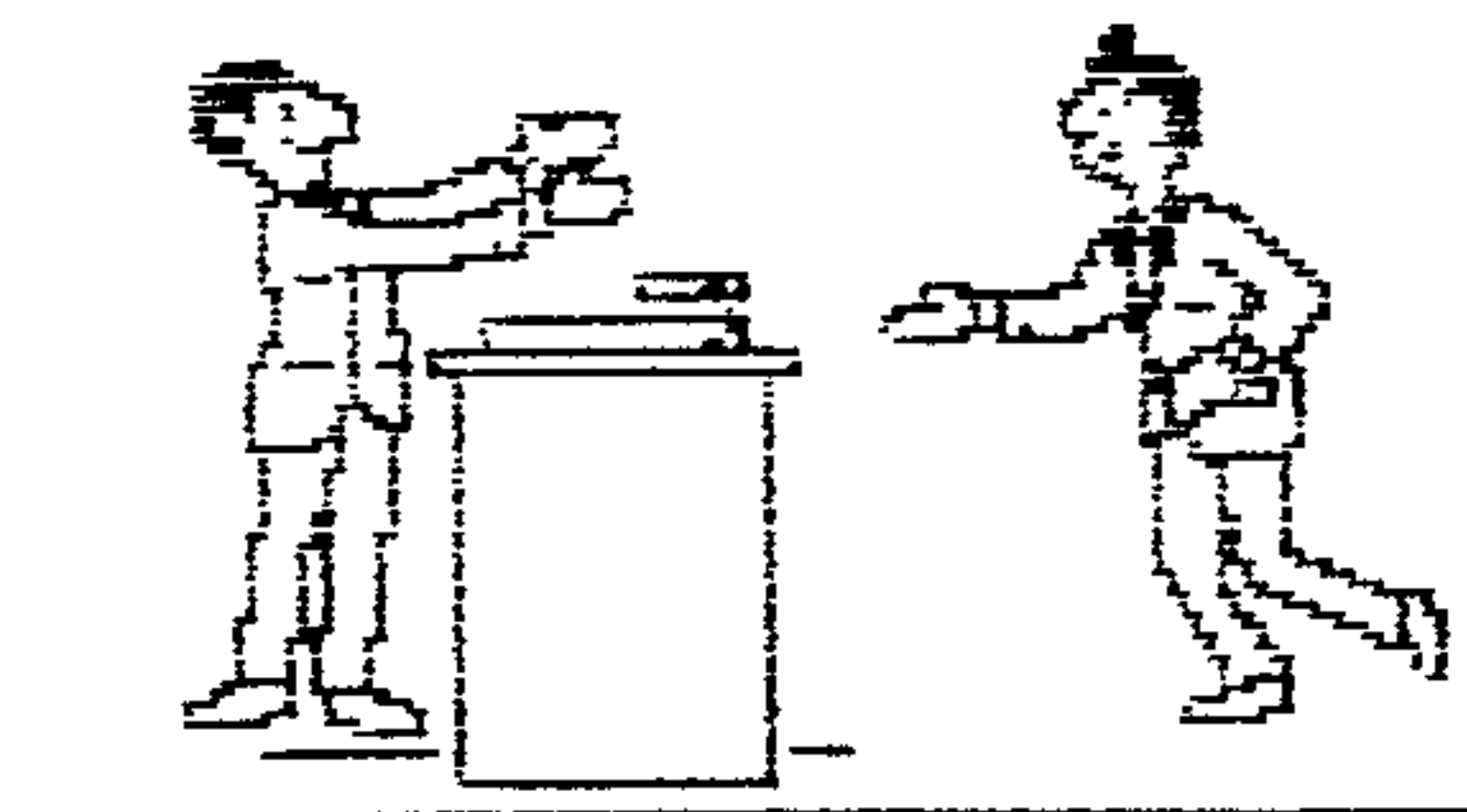


Old Glasses

First concerning collections - Lion Herron reported that the eye glasses

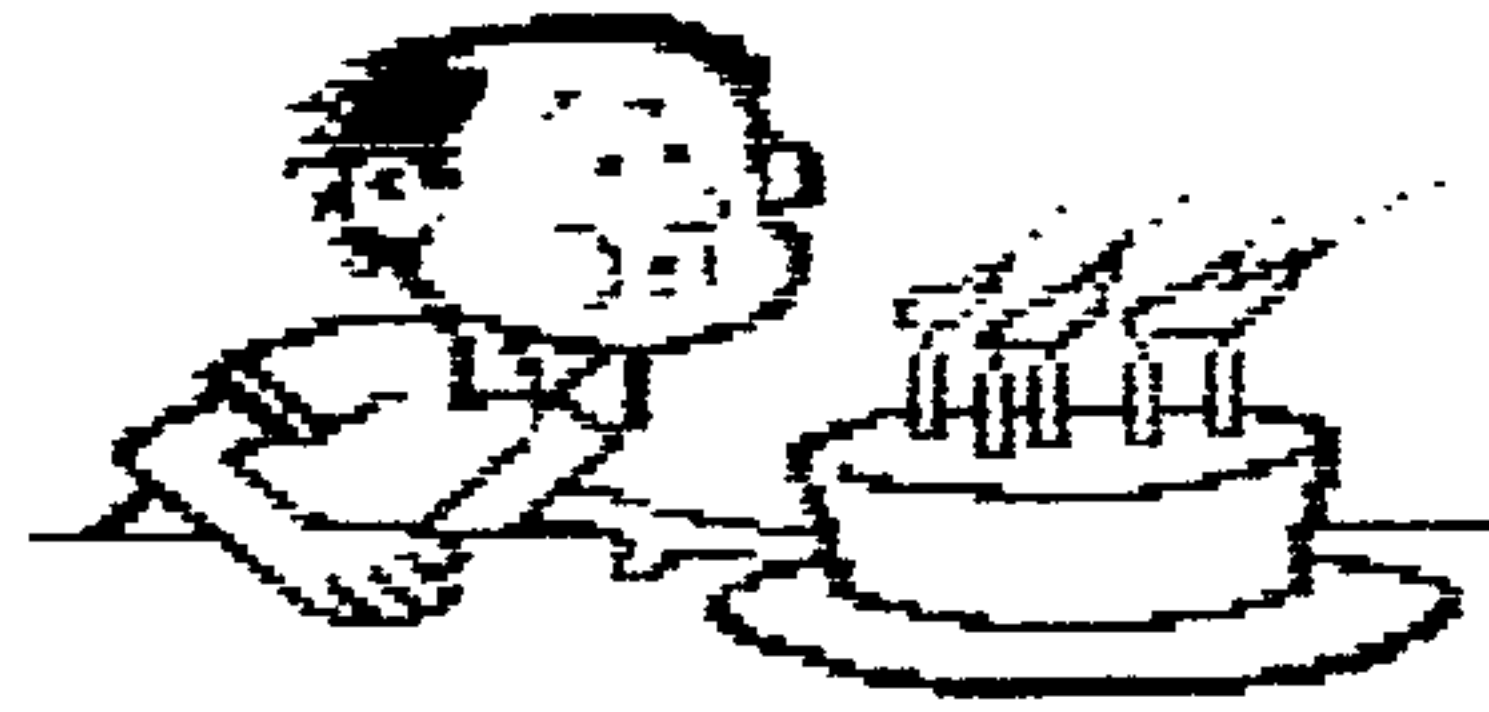

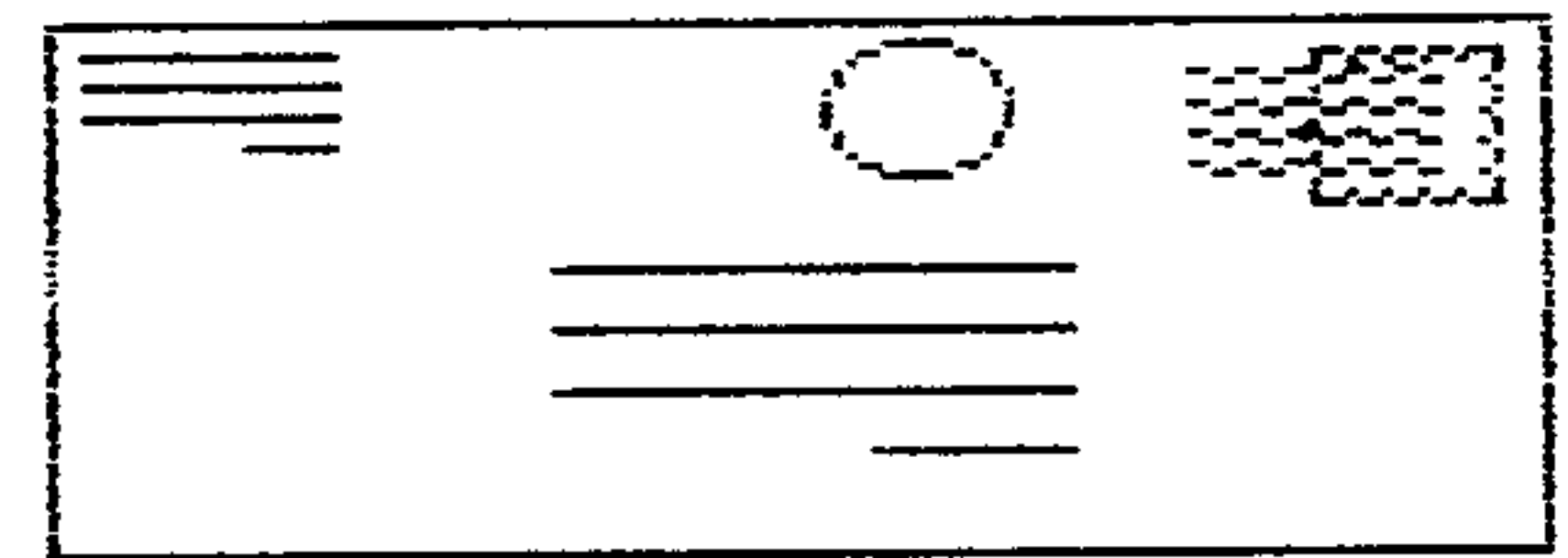

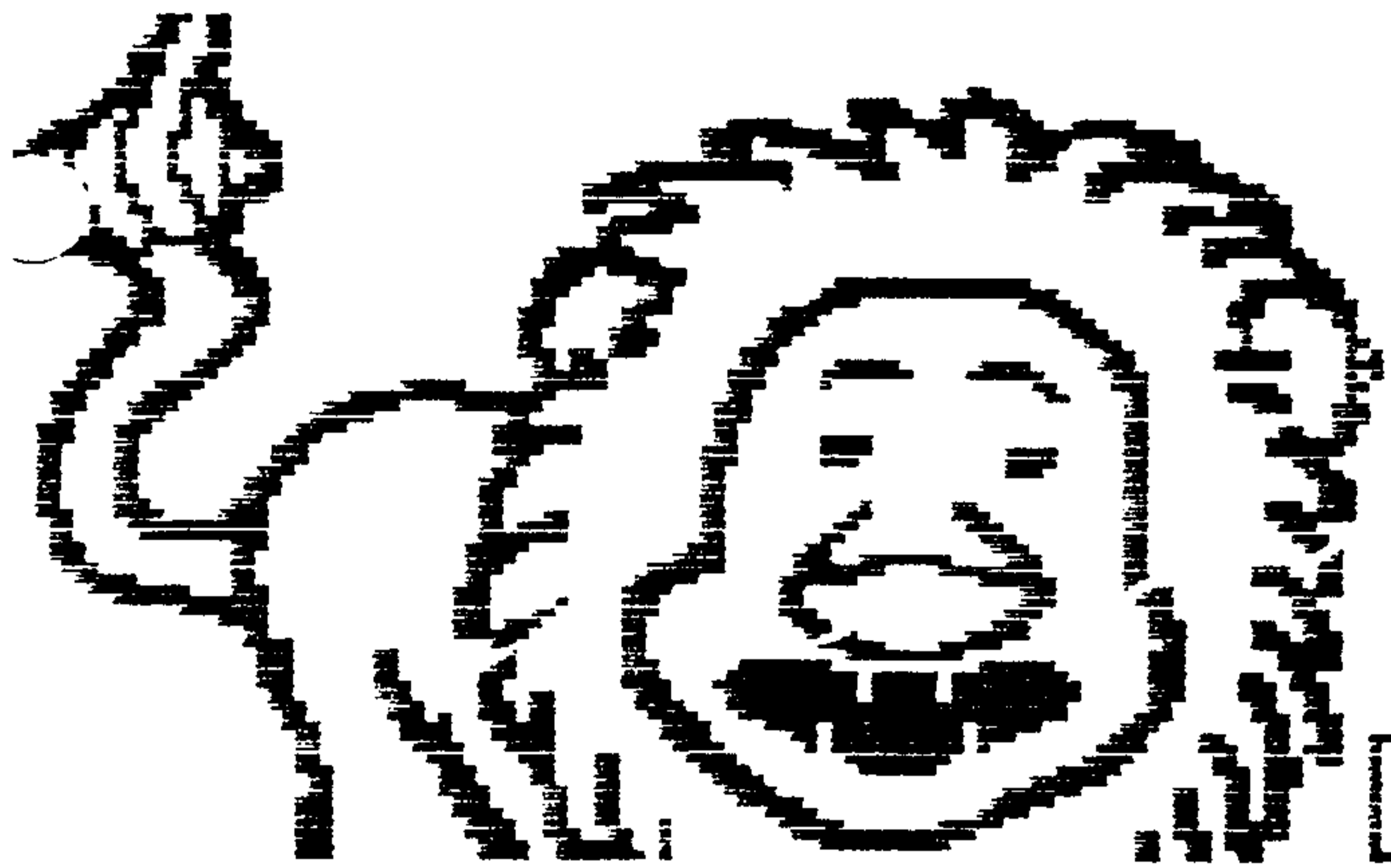

New Eyes for the Needy Subject of Lion Woodrum's Talk

It has often been said that this club has plenty of talent among its members. This fact was shown on September 6 when Lion Bill Woodrum had the program. Lion Woodrum and George Hummel had earlier prepared a shipment of used glasses and sent it to New Eyes for the Needy. Lion Bill did something that no one else had ever done. He sent a letter to New Eyes for the Needy requesting information as to what that organization did with the used glasses it received. A news release was sent back to him giving details of how these used glasses were disposed of. Lion quoted from the news release. Some of the points made were: Provided new prescription glasses to over 5000 Americans, because of the law, the plastic framed glasses are sent overseas to clinics, hospitals, etc. which then distribute them. There are 140 volunteers working at the job of sorting, classifying, etc. They sell frames that contain gold in order to pay for prescription glasses provided here in the United States.

Lion Bill's presentation was greeted with pleasure by many because it was the first time the club had ever had an explanation of how New Eyes for the Needy had disposed of these used glasses. There was time for questions and answers as well as several suggestions for collecting more glasses.

Tonight's Speaker is Mike Hudnall

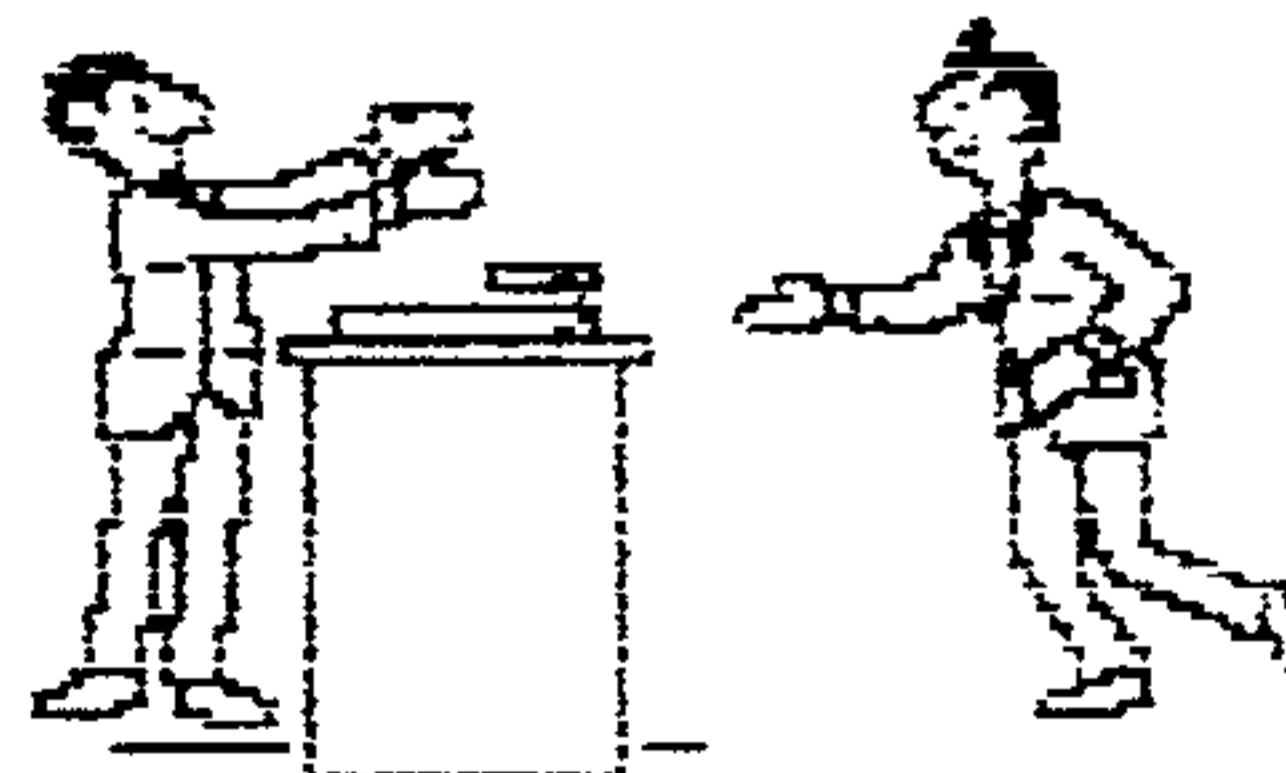

Two specific research projects have been proposed for the center: early diagnoses of glaucoma and the use of an excimer laser to reshape the surface of the eye to correct optical errors.

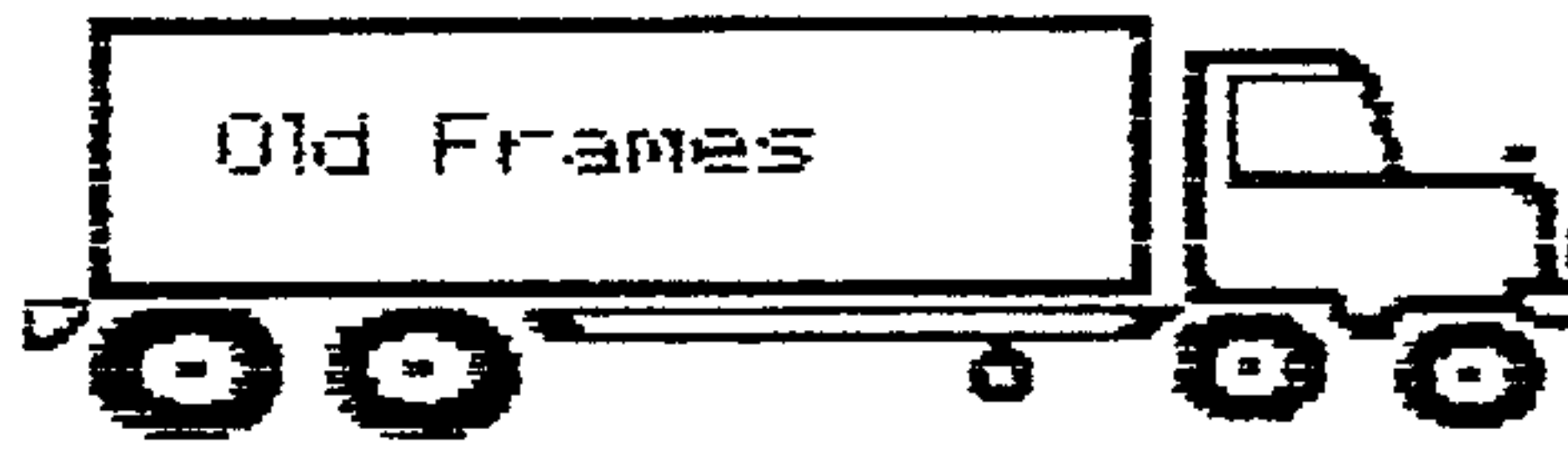

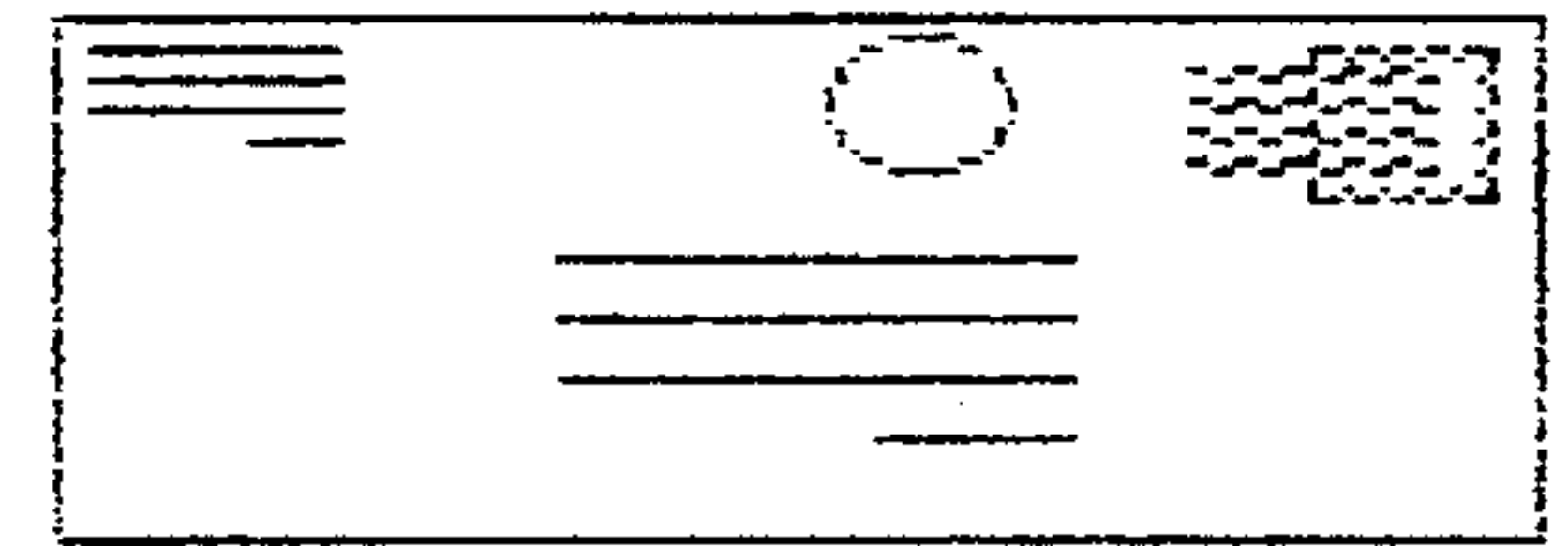

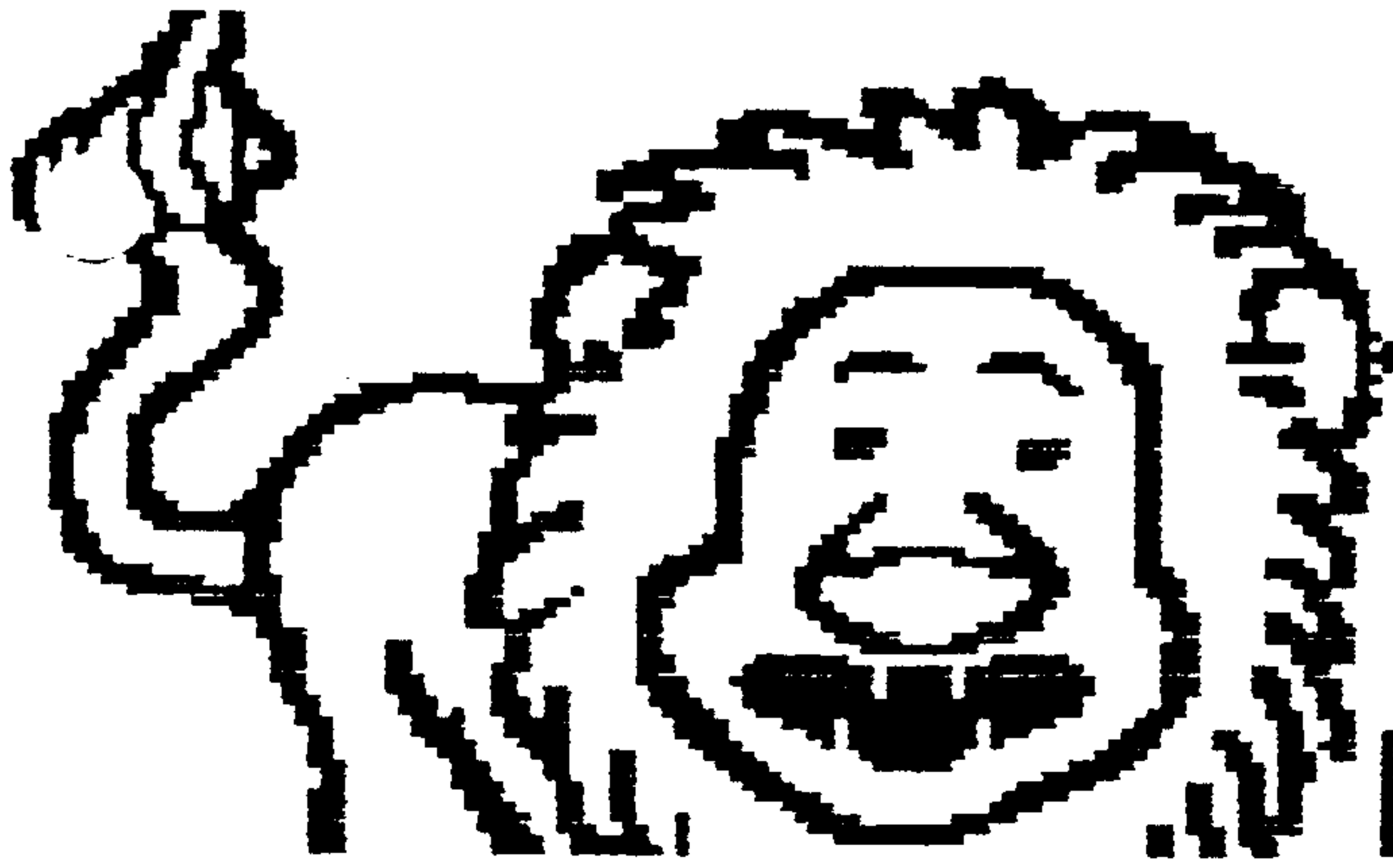

Mike Hudnall Spoke on Banks On Oct. 4th



1st Vice President Brummage presided at the Oct. 4 meeting.

Lion "Butch" presented the program - his boss, Mr. Mike Hudnall, President and Chief Executive Officer of City National Bank.

He discussed the Savings and Loan situation in the nation today. He explained that lack of regulation of the S & L Companies was responsible for their sad state of affairs. They started providing checking accounts in which they lacked experience and made excessive loans in order to increase income. As a result, 42% of S & L accounts are under some kind of government control.

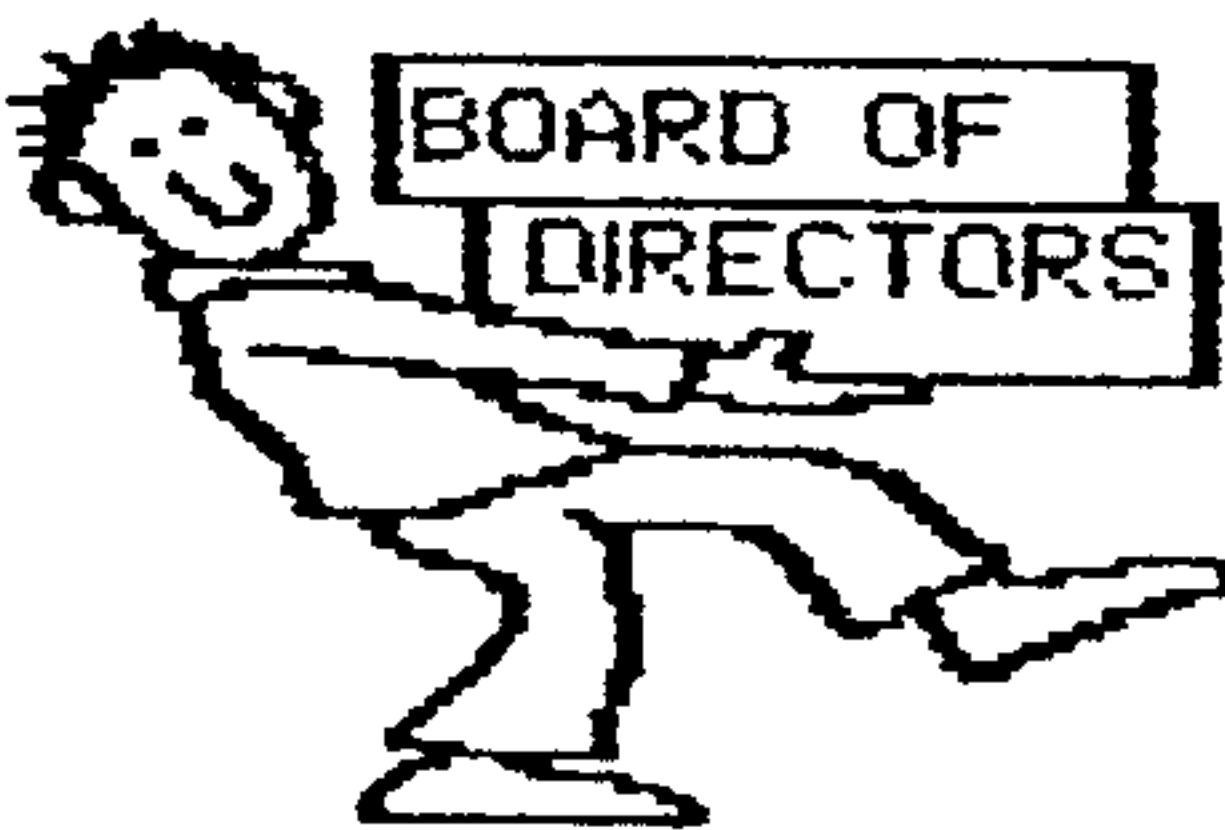

Tonight Our Speaker is a Mystery





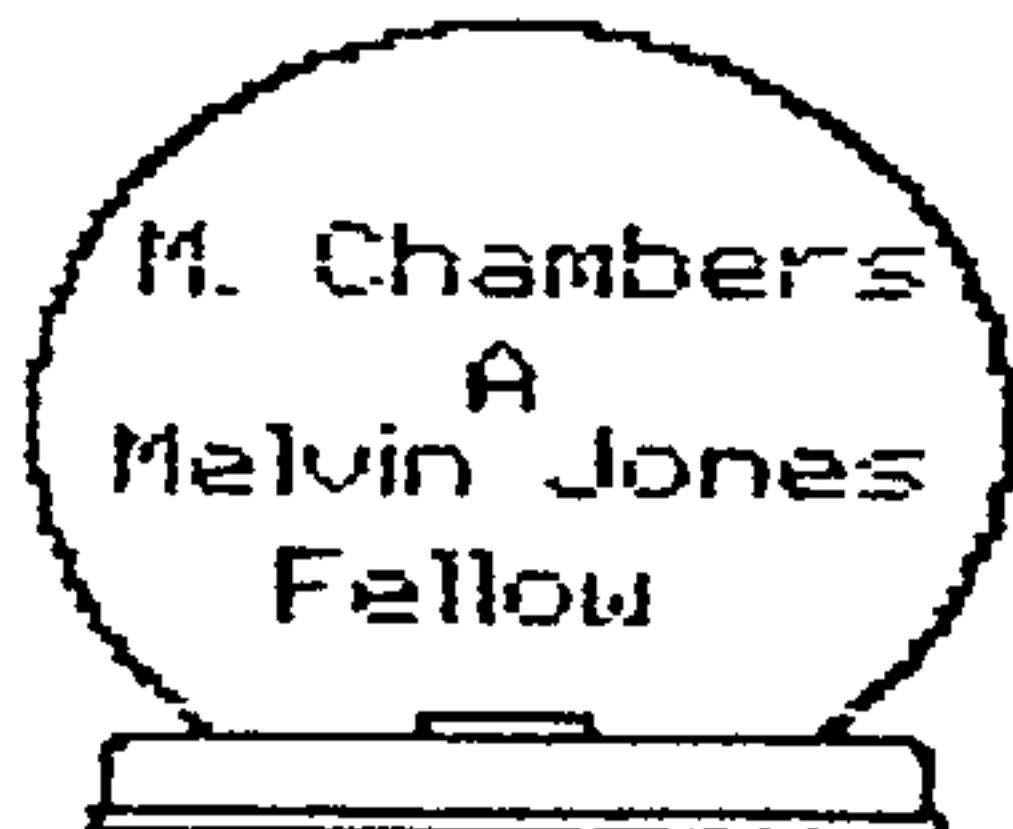

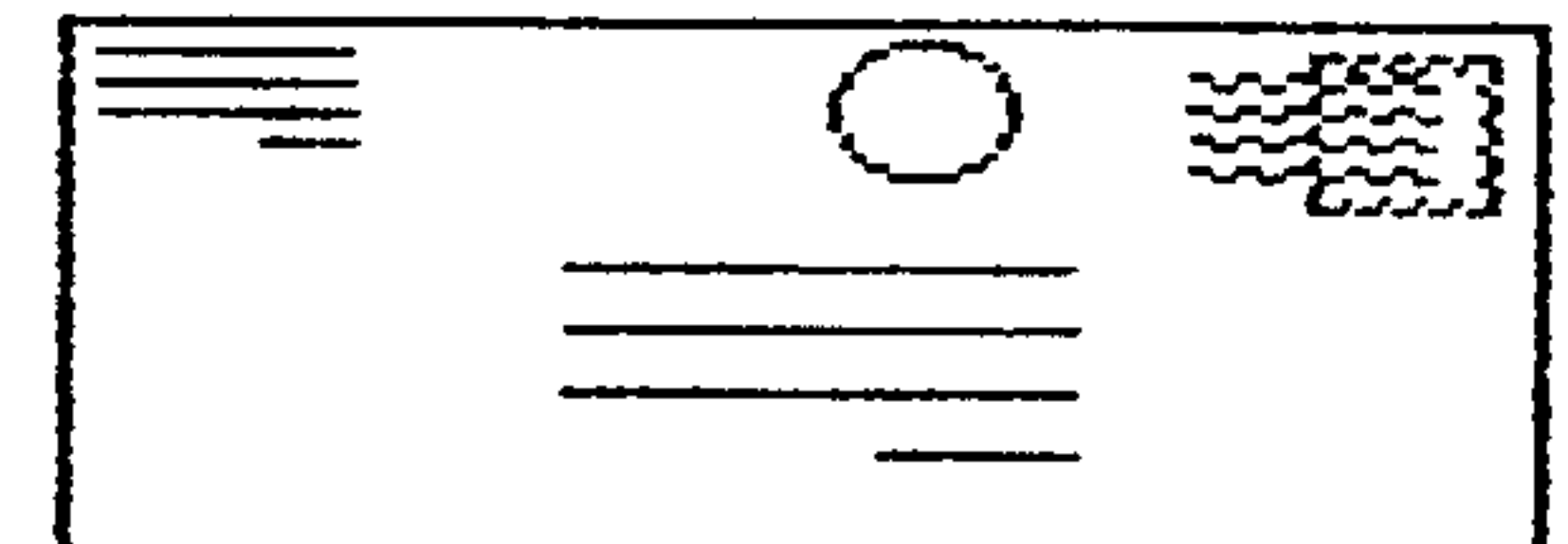
