Help Wanted


Committee Chairs Needed for 2001- 2002



Lions Journey for Sight August 23rd



Summer flooding in many parts of West Virginia left many homes, businesses, and churches devastated. In some areas, roads and utilities were also badly damaged. Relief was on its way quickly from Lions International Foundation (LCIF) in the amount of \$40,000.

The Fairmont Lioness Club purchased \$100 worth of brooms from the Fairmont Lions Club and sent them to the flood ravaged area. The Fairmont Lions Club board of directors, at its August meeting, decided to send \$200 in flood relief, as well.

Eye Examination Equipment Sold

It was reported at the August 2nd meeting of the Fairmont Lions Club that the Senior Citizens of Marion County had turned down the club's offer to sell the eye examination equipment to them. Clyde Judy and Wayne Dodd were requested to pursue selling the equipment elsewhere and an offer was received from Pittsburgh. The equipment was scheduled to have been removed from the Senior Citizens Center as of this time.

Dr. E. G. Cadogan purchased and then gave the equipment to the Fairmont Lions Club in 1996 recalling a community of neighbor helping neighbor. Dr. Cadogan conducted free eye clinics at the Center, but after his retirement, it became difficult to arrange the clinics and the club determined it was best to sell the equipment.

Fairmont Lions Club has paid International and District dues.

Participants can be found through friends, church groups, and other organizations and individuals. Sponsor sheets will be available from club members, MCPARC, and Primo Bike-N-Sport in Bellview.

Several club members have already volunteered to assist the day of the event. Wayne Dodd will take care of radio, television, and newspaper publicity; Bill Linger agreed to work with others providing drinking water along the trail; Ed Garlow and others have also agreed to help. Aletta Moffett, RN, has agreed to provide first aid. Any Lions and family members are also encouraged to participate by walking or riding in the Lions Journey for Sight.

Club Considers Eyeglass Policy

In light of the fact that there are now fewer clubs in the area, the Fairmont Lions Club has seen an increase in eyeglass applications from areas that have formerly been served by other Lions clubs. Unfortunately, those clubs are no longer present in the community. Following deliberations at the August board of directors meeting, President Gerald Warren stated at the August 16th meeting that, "While we sympathize, we can not afford to finance everyone, so we will continue to serve the west side of Fairmont." He went on to say that we would try to assist individuals in finding assistance from other sources on a case-by-case basis. "However," Warren said, "we will take care of children on East Side or West Side."

It was also reported that there is a possibility that Medicare may begin taking care of eyeglasses. It was decided to attempt to find out if that was a real possibility.

The newest LCIF grant initiative, Core 4, is

designed to fund large-scale projects that target urgent needs under the core service commitments of Lionism -- preserving eyesight, combating disability, promoting health, and serving youth.

Club Approves Budget for 2001-2002

At the August 16th club meeting, Jim Coleman, treasurer, presented the budget as proposed to, and modified by, the board of directors. The budget was adopted by the club. The Activities budget is increased to \$5,640.00. This includes a new line item to help match the Core-4 grant for the Eye Institute. It also includes a \$2,065.00 contingency amount. The Administrative budget was set at \$2,560.00. This reflects a slight decrease from last year's budget, but an increase over what was actually spent last year.

October 11 is Lions World Sight Day

On October 11, Lions around the world will celebrate Lions World Sight Day, a day established to recognize the importance of eradicating preventable blindness. This year activities in São Paulo, Brazil and elsewhere will focus on the nearly 1.5 million children in the world who are blind. Over half of the conditions leading to childhood blindness are preventable if discovered and treated early.

As part of the events in São Paulo, International President Frank Moore will announce a \$3.75 million grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation to fund pediatric vision programs in 25 countries that will train professionals to diagnose and treat childhood vision problems. This will be the largest, multifaceted global project focusing on childhood blindness from any organization.

November is Diabetes Awareness Month

The Fairmont Lions Club is conducting a program of Diabetes awareness because diabetes is a leading cause of preventable blindness. Club members have been distributing educational brochures regarding diabetic eve diseases.

Diabetic eye disease may include diabetic retinopathy causing damage to the blood vessels in the retina, cataract or clouding of the eye's lens, or glaucoma which is an increase in fluid pressure inside the eye that leads to optic nerve damage and loss of vision. Although cataracts and glaucoma also affect people without diabetes, a diabetic is twice as likely to get a cataract or glaucoma as other adults.

According to the brochure, finding and treating the disease early is the best way to control diabetic eye disease.

November is LCIF Contributing Member Month

The Lions Clubs International Foundation has issued a grant of \$100,000 to support initial relief efforts and has established a special fund to receive donations from Lions and others worldwide. The funds will support the efforts of New York-area Lions clubs, as well as those Lions in Washington D.C. and other affected cities, to assist the victims, the families and the heroic relief workers following the terrorist attacks on the United States.

Disaster relief has been a major activity of LCIF for more than 30 years. By working with networks of local Lions clubs in the affected areas, LCIF supports both immediate and long-term relief activities. Examples of Lions' response to other recent disasters include: Turkey earthquake - \$2.06 million in LCIF funding was used to develop three modular home villages, medical clinics and to rebuild several primary schools and part of a university; Taiwan earthquake - \$948,000 was used to develop a modular home village in Taichung, to rebuild three schools, and purchase two urgently-needed blood donation busses; Hurricane Mitch Relief in Central America - \$575,000 was used to construct 192 homes, rebuild a nursing home and repair essential public facilities.
