

Notes from the District Newsletter

Club members may subscribe to the district 29-L newsletter, "The District Spirit," by submitting a request with \$6.00 to Mary Rose Yoho, Newspaper Editor, RR1 Box 144A, Proctor, WV 26055. Checks should be made payable to District 29-L.

The Fairmont Lions Club is currently at the top for its category (21-35 members) in the Membership Contest with 2000 points. However, both smaller (Friendly) and larger (Williamstown and Moundsville) clubs have more points.

The Middlebourne Lions Club will hold its Charter Night on Tuesday, August 20, 6:30 p.m., at the Court Restaurant on Main Street in New Martinsville. The Fairview Lions are having a Chicken Roast August 17th near the Fairview Post Office.

Lions Clubs International was formed in 1917. The Charleston, WV Lions Club was chartered September 30, 1921. Initially, there was a single District 29. By 1941-42, the district was divided into 29-W and 29-V. By 1947-48, District 29-A was added. In 1959-60, due to continued membership growth, an additional sub-district was added. At that time, districts in West Virginia included 29-L, 29-I, 29-O and 29-N. This is the structure currently in place. District 29-L consists of the most northern 15 counties in West Virginia. District 29-L is divided into four regions and each region is divided into 10 zones. Editor's note: The Fairmont Lions Club is a part of Region III, Zone II.

New Web Site Launched

Due to technical difficulties that have lasted since June, the Fairmont Lions Club has relocated its Web site to a different server. Bob Moffett, the club's webmaster, is providing some of his space in order to get the club information and the monthly newsletter back on-line. Fairmont Lions Club Approves 2002 Budget

At the September 5th club meeting, the Fairmont Lions Club approved its budget for the year. Of special significance, the line item amount budgeted for eyeglasses was raised by \$1000 to \$3000 for the year. This will allow the Fairmont Lions Club to serve both the east and west sides of the river, now that there is no longer an East Fairmont Lions Club. The total Activities Budget amount for the year is \$8,065.51.

The Administrative Budget, based on receiving ten new members this year, was set at \$2,680.00, a modest increase from last year.

Mayor to Discuss New Entrance to Fairmont

At the September 19th meeting, Fairmont Mayor Nick Fantasia will present the program and discuss the new entrance to Fairmont from I-79 and other development throughout the city.

Fantasia will bring with him the artists renderings of these changes in the city's infrastructure.

Fairmont Lions Challenged by D.G. Amrhein

Paul Amrhein, District Governor of 29-L, discussed his theme, "Highlighting Our Heritage," in his address to the members and guests attending his official visit to the Fairmont Lions Club on August 15th. He used the occasion to charge the members with the "responsibility to ensure the legacy of Lions endures for years to come" and to encourage the Lions to share the story of how we became a Lion. The Lions International focus is on membership and extension with an emphasis on the development of new clubs. Amrhein briefly turned over the lectern to his wife, Phyllis, who presented her thoughts on volunteering as a Lion.

In continuing his remarks, the district governor highlighted several of the ways that the Fairmont Lions Club has been in service to Fairmont and suggested that the membership role has been a "Who's Who in Marion County." He then proceeded to challenge the members to find new service activities, new members, and to share with the community through the newspaper. In describing International President K. Fukushima's theme, "One World, One Heart," Amrhein said, "Peace is not made in documents. It's made in the hearts of men.'

Amrhein noted that LCIF has returned more funds to West Virginia than we (Lions in West Virginia) have sent them in urging support for the Foundation. The WV Sight and Hearing Foundation will have a new Mobile Eye Screening Unit this fall.

The centerpiece, provided by club member Bill Kime, was presented to Lion Phyllis Amrhein and the door prizes were awarded to Lions Wayne Dodd, P.D.G. Pat Julius, Gene Martin, and Vice District Governor of 29-I. Jim Canon.

facing the county in dealing with drugs when she spoke to the Lions on Thursday, October 17th. Cases that she has handled included marijuana (most



Club Addressed by DNR Officer Brad McDougal

Conservation Officer Brad McDougal spoke to the Fairmont Lions at the November 21st meeting at Westchester Village. Fifteen club members were in attendance for the meeting. McDougal, whose role is often thought to be "game warden," discussed the conservation officer's role in enforcement of game and fish laws, boating laws, litter enforcement, as well as assisting the forestry department with issues such as fire and timber theft.

He spoke at length on the need to reduce the deer herd in Marion County and reminded all present that it is illegal to shoot a gun or bow in the city. Residents

aged 65 and over can get a free senior's license for hunting and fishing. This includes the trout stamp and the national forest stamp. According to McDougal, the conservation officer can enforce any state law.

January is Glaucoma Awareness Month

Millions of Americans are at risk of losing their eyesight to glaucoma, a leading cause of blindness in the United States. At high risk for developing glaucoma are African-Americans over age 40, everyone over age 60, and people with a family history of the disease. During Glaucoma Awareness Month in January, community leaders and health professionals are encouraged to provide sight-saving information to those who are at high risk. The National Eye Institute (NEI), one of the federal government's National Institutes of Health, has free materials that Lions clubs can use to plan and conduct successful campaign activities.

More Used Eyeglasses are Needed

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 500 million people world wide are in need of eyeglasses. Last year, Lions collected roughly six million eyeglasses. In the United States alone, approximately 148 million people have corrective evewear that they replace every few years - leaving millions of eyeglasses sitting in drawers unused.
