the election.



China Receiving Assistance Following Earthquake

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has approved a Major Catastrophe Grant of \$250,000 to provide relief for the Zhaotong earthquake in China. These funds will help Lions provide immediate relief and long-term recovery.

Authorities estimate that more than 400 people have lost their lives from the Zhaotong earthquake, with an additional 2,300 people injured across several counties. Even more people are missing. It is estimated that 25,500 homes were completely destroyed, with an even higher number of houses damaged.

The Major Catastrophy Grant allows Lions in affected areas to immediately begin providing assistance: food, water, medicine, blankets and other necessities. Funds will also support long-term reconstruction and recovery.

There are approximately 21,000 Lions members in China and many have been directly impacted by this disaster. Barry Palmer, Chairperson, Lions Clubs International Foundation, encourages Lions to consideer making a donation to the Foundation for disaster relief. He states that, "Donations... can make a real difference in times of need."








Read Aloud WV Event at Library

A Look at the Budget for 2014-15

The Fairmont Lions Club is planning expenses from the Activities Account this year to amount to \$8,215. These funds come from our fund raising efforts. Funds raised from the public through broom sales, peach and nut sales, etc. all are returned in service.

This year, the club anticipates spending about \$4,000 for Sight Services. This includes eye exams and eyeglasses, the WV Lions Sight Conservation Foundation, any eye clinic that we might provide, and support for two guide dog schools, Leader Dogs for the Blind and Pilot Dogs.

We anticipate expenditures

of \$925 for Youth Services. These include sponsoring students to Boys State, Girls State, and HOBY, as well as the Lions Peace Poster Contest in two schools, and the Lions Youth Exchange program.

Community Services include support for the District Car Show, Recreation for blind and deaf students, the Visually Impaired (VIP) Fishing Tournament, Romney School Work Program, Fairmont State Scholarship, Union Mission Christmas Party, Lions Clubs International Foundation, Lions Alert, Read Aloud WV, Humane Society and a little for miscellaneous needs that may occur. These total \$2,890.

Lions Working to Stop Measles

The GAVI Alliance and Lions Clubs International are E LIFE working together in a unique partnership protecting tens of millions of children in the world's poorest Lions Measles Initiative countries against measles, a highly infectious disease that kills an estimated 430 people every day, mostly

in developing countries. Under the partnership, LCI is deploying its network of 1.35 million volunteers to raise \$30 million by 2017 and to improve access to vaccines through the GAVI Alliance, a public-private partnership whose mission is to save children's lives and protect people's health by increasing access to immunization in the world's poorest countries.

The funds raised by the Lions will be matched by the UK's Department for International Development (DFID) and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, bringing the total to \$60 million.

Measles kills about 122,000 people annually, mostly children under age five. Measles and rubella (German measles) can be prevented with a safe and inexpensive vaccine. The measles-rubella vaccine funded by GAVI costs around 50 cents per dose.
