

members put in 428 hours, donated thousands of dollars and served well


over 3,000 of our neighbors during the past year. Well done!

We did screen two adults and provided transportation for a local pastor to go home to retrieve car keys since his were locked in his car at the park. This project involved 12 volunteer hours.

It was a pleasant day and Windmill Park was filled with people, young and old, enjoying programs, food, activity booths, and even several carnival rides. The club will explore other options to provide screening for the community in the future. Jennifer Troutman thanked us for coming to the Juneteenth Jubilee, and said that, "DSF Stop would love to host your organization in the future."

Members Remove Litter from Rail Trail





Club Welcomes DG Houser Fairmont Lions welcomed and President Bob Brummage introduced District Governor Jay Houser and his wife Amy (Williamstown) at the September 15th club meeting held at the Disability Action Center. President Brummage also welcomed Past Council Chairpersons Al Cox (Clarksburg) and Ken Shahan (Nutter Fort), and recognized Past District Governors Tracy Smith (Fairmont Associate Member) and Bob Moffett (Fairmont). Twelve Lions were in attendance at the meeting.

DG Houser addressed the Lions encourging \$25 donations for LCIF paid to District 29L. In addition to LCIF credit for the donation, donors will receive a T-shirt with DG Jay's logo: "Keep Calm and Lion On" on the front and a listing of District 29L clubs on the back. DG Houser introduced a brief video greeting from Lions Clubs International President Brian Sheehan who thanked members for service during the pandemic and encouraged getting new members through involvement in service projects.

Noting that the Fairmont Lions Club is 99 years old, DG Houser asked members what were the favorite service projects. The answers represented all five of the major service initiatives of LCI. He expressed kudos to the club for "checking all the boxes." He went on to note that Zone 6 (our zone) has a total of 40 Lions and 17 of those are in the Fairmont Lions Club. He asked the club to dream big. "This county needs you." We are looking for leaders, dreamers and workers. "Step out beyond your comfort zones," he said as he challenged the club to start a branch club with five members. He also promoted the "Club Quality Initiative" Zoom training which is open to all District 29L clubs. Club members were then able to join in a discussion of the topics DG Houser addressed.

Club Files Annual IRS e-Postcard

Club secretary Bob Moffett reports that he filed the annual IRS e-Postcard (Form 990-N) for tax-exempt organizations with annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less. Organizations that fail to file for three consecutive years will automatically lose tax-exempt status. It is quite costly to then get tax-exempt status reinstated. Tax-exempt status allows the club to make purchases without paying consumer sales tax.



Club's Christmas Party for Children Returns to Union Mission



The Fairmont Lions Club will once again be providing Christmas gifts to less fortunate children at this year's Christmas Party at the Union Mission, scheduled for Saturday, December 10, 2022. Virginia Gallion has been working with Patty Batten, wife of Rev. George Batten, to make the arrangements. The Union Mission currently has 46 children registered. Patty Batten's employer, United Health Care, is going to provide for 27 of the children, leaving the

club to purchase gifts for the rest. There is an inventory of about 150 wrapped gifts on hand that will be used to fill the gift bags.

At the club's October 13th meeting, it was decided to have the party for the children this year without the Lions club meeting and dinner downstairs, as we have done in the past, since our attendance at the dinners has decreased in recent years. Also, the Union Mission has changed the format so that families can come by the Mission Saturday morning between the hours of 10:00 am and 12:00 noon to pick up their gift bags and other items. Lions will be needed to assist with this and should arrive at the Mission by 9:30 am to get ready. Lions able to assist with gift shopping should contact Virginia Gallion to let her know as soon as possible so that she can provide the bags and child's information.

The Fairmont Lions Club has been busy during October and the first week of November providing vision screening for children. Lions participating were Pres. Are Your Lions Club Dues Due January 1, 2023?

If you normally pay your dues for six months, or if you pay for a full calendar year, then your dues are due January 1, 2023. Fairmont Lions Club member dues are \$39.50 for six months or \$79 for a full year. This includes international dues and district/state dues. The Family Membership Program provides families with the opportunity to receive a special dues discount when they join a Lions club together. The first family member pays full international dues (\$43) and up to four additional family members each pay only half the international dues (\$21.50). The club is billed by LCI and District 29L in January for members on the role on January 1 and July for members on the role July 1 each year.






