

The Whitehall club would like to have a joint meeting with our club on July 20.


The Board went over the list of committees and revised it.

The Board of Directors will meet on Aug. 13 at 5 % M Glass.




Another member who has been under the weather for some time, Lion Turley, was also present. Welcome back George.



The 50/50 drawing amounted to \$7.00 and was won by Lion Edsel who donated it to the "kitty".




### Placque Presented to Miniale's Restaurant







#### First Lion - Key Award



The 50/50 drawing was won by Edsell Michael. The amount was \$6.50.




Vicky Steele Talks about New Service

Two new Lions were inducted into our club by Lion Cliff. The Lions were:






The Distric Contest will end this year with the March M&A report. For each Lion attending the District Conference 1000 points will be awarded. 500 points for each new member.



Lion Gerald had several communications which he read. He said we need a chairman for the SightFirst Committee. There are still some vacancies for chairmen on some of the committees.



Lion Coleman presented budgets for the year which were approved.




Thanks to whoever was responsible for this.

Also there were complaints that our prices for brooms are too high. The matter will be reviewed when cost information s available.





TO REMEMBER that in building up my business it is not necessary to tear down another's; to be loyal to my clients or customers and true to myself.


WHENEVER a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself.

TO BE CAREFUL with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and not destroy.





Jane Mild Talks about Recycling



It was reported that Lion Cliff inducted new members into the Meadowdale Club on Nov. 9.


Lion Gerald reported that the Salvation Army is asking the Club to provide Bell Ringers. No action was taken until more information is provided.

Friday evening Dec. 17 at 6:00 is the Annual Mission Christmas Party provided by our Club. This meeting will take the place of our regular meeting on the 16.


District Governor Rich Pinkerton to Visit Club

Lion President Gerald presented Rev. Bowyer with a certificate of appreciation.



Diabetes Awareness Chairman's Bulletin Hidden Diabetes: A Major Threat to Health

The most common form of diabetes is type 2 or non-insulin-dependent diabetes. Type 2 diabetes develops most often in people over the age of forty. Obesity increases the risk of developing diabetes. In fact 80 percent of people with diabetes are overweight. Type 2 diabetes usually has an undramatic onset. Its symptoms are normally mild and often mistaken for signs of aging or other disorders. As a result, millions of people have not sought diagnosis. Having 'hidden' diabetes increases the likelihood of vision loss and other serious complications.




### Ralph LaRue is Our Speaker Tonight

Lion Jim gave the Treasurer's report which was approved.






On May 6, Lion President

Mr. Judy served four years in the Army Air Force during World War II. He flew 35 combat missions as a bomber pilot out of Africa and Italy.




Since the space is available, a little reflection might be in order. - - -





Lion President Moffett requests that each committee make regular reports on the work done.







His talk was light and humorous.



Lion Warren read a thank-you note from Dist. Gov. Johnson thanking the club for a pleasant evening and for the gift and flowers.








Joe Licata Speaks


Board of Directors Meet


The Board of Directors met at the home of Lion Moffett on Oct. 13.

Diabetes

Diabetics who control their sugar are much less likely to develop cataracts. Those with diabetes are 4 more times as likely to develop heart trouble.



At the Nov. 3 meeting Lion Woodrum had a report on three applications for adult glasses which were approved by the members.





Lion Coleman gave the Treasurer's Report.



- 5) The president is to contact the Zone Chairman and/or other area clubs to consider the possibility of holding a Zone/City/County "White Cane Day" which could be highly publicized using newspapers, cable television, radio, etc. with proceeds earmarked specifically for the purchase of eyeglasses by Lions Clubs. The city of Fairmont would need to be contacted and the selection of the date would need to be coordinated with them. This would increase visibility of the Lions before the public as well as raise funds. It was suggested that balloons also be available to give to children. Lion Stalnaker sold fruitcakes.



"Appalachian Clean Water Initiative" Subject of Talk Tonight



Mr. Frank De Garmo, a former Lion was a guest at the club on Jan. 5, 1995. Mr. De Garmo is very much interested in soil conservation and in the topic of Mr. Charles Sheets' talk. Mr. Sheets is with the office of Surface Mining and is now working with the "West Virginia Clean Stream Initiative. This program is concerned about the 7000 miles of streams in WV and surrounding states which are polluted by acid mine drainage.

Mr. Sheets illustrated his talk by showing slides. Mine operators are required to take measures to prevent acid mine drainage into streams. Operators pay a fee on each ton of coal mined to pay the cost of preventing such drainage. This fee is paid to the Federal Government which returns the fee to the states The result is that operators, as in the old days, may not walk away leaving a legacy of polluted streams. There was time for questions on this timely topic.

Eyeglass Report


Patti Bowie to Talk on Bricks Walk Tonight


Lion Warren, as Immediate Past President, is chairman of the annual eye clinic. He reported that the clinic will be held the first week in May and will be held at the Mall.






### Ron Swope Talks About the Gypsy Moth






### Board of Directors Meeting

Eyeglass Report






### Mane Growl to be Under New Management !

Chevrons: Carl Miller 50 years, Bob Frye 45 years, Bill Woodrum 35 years, Gerald Warren 30 years.


