### Looking Back To 1923

It was 1923, and the United States of America had only recently come out of a "war to end all wars." Warren G. Harding was President and Calvin Coolidge was his vice president.

The World War that had raged in Europe only a few years earlier had forced the country from a period of relative isolationism into a growing leadership role the nation was perhaps not quite ready to assume.

In Egypt, the inner tomb of Tutankhomen had been opened just two months before, and reports still were enthralling the world with stories of undreamed spiendor still untouched after 3400 years.

The winds of change were everywhere. Vladimir Ulianov, or Nikolai Lenin as he was known to his Bolshevik compatriots who assisted him in seizing control of Russia, was solidfying his powers and building a new political and geographic nation—the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. In India, still firmly under British colonial rule, Mohandas K. Gandhi sat in prison, arrested on charges of sedition.

Amid labor unrest, West Virginia—still less than 60 years old— was becoming increasingly important to an industrially-developing nation, with its vast oil, gas, and coal reserves. A West Virginian, John W. Davis, was being considered as a viable candidate for President on the Democratic ticket for the following year.

Fairmont, in the heart of West Virginia's growing bituminous coal industry, was a thriving community with over 18.000 people and a county population of 55,000. Downtown Fairmont, with a modern streetcar system that brought residents of nearby communities to the business district, was bustling, and several new commercial buildings had been recently constructed or were under construction. The Fairmont State Normal School had only a few years earlier moved to its new location on Locust Avenue and was seeking permission to grant a degree in education.

It was in this atmosphere, then, that the Fairmont Lions Club was born with the granting of a charter by the international Association of Lions Clubs on April 20, 1923, becoming West Virginia's sixth Lions Club and the first club in north central West Virginia. Lionism was on the move throughout the United States and Canada, with clubs in 42 states and four provinces.

Starting at the YMCA in Fairmont, the Fairmont Lions Club soon moved its meetings to the prestigious Fairmont Hotel, where it held Friday noon meetings until 1935, when it switched to Friday evening meetings to accommodate members from outlying businesses and industries. Then, in 1980, the Fairmont Lions Club said "farewell" for good to the Fairmont Hotel and Friday evening meetings.

### We Serve

During its \*\*75\*\* years of existence, The Fairmont Lions Club has faithfully served the people of Fairmont and Marion County, with particular emphasis on those less fortunate individuals and those with sight and hearing impairments.

From its earlier organizational efforts in March 1923 and subsequent official organization on March 20, 1923, the over 800 men who have been members of the Fairmont Lions Club have put forth a maximum effort to render true service to their community.

The Fairmont Lions Club has purchased over 3,400 pairs of eyeglasses for school children, as well as scores of others for needy adults. In their glaucoma and amblyopia clinics—begun in 1971—the Fairmont Lions Club has helped to check over 10,000 adults for glaucoma and over 3,000 children for amblyopia and other eye diseases and defects. Early detection of these two eye diseases has resulted in early treatment and prevention of more serious visual problems.

The Fairmont Lions Club began a program in 1935 that has continued to this day and has become an annual Christmas tradition—a Christmas party for underprivileged children. For the past 56 years, this program has been held in conjunction with the Union Misson, and some 4,500-5,000 children have received Christmas gifts, clothes, candy, fruit, etc. from Santa Claus and the Fairmont Lions through the Union Mission Children's Christmas Party.

Lions of Fairmont in 1936 conceived the idea of a "blackout warden unit" that was later to become the Civil Defense Police and today the Marion County Auxiliary Police. Lions also have been active in promoting many other civic and cultural enterprises which we take for granted today.

Since 1951, the Fairmont Lions Club members have taken to the streets to sell brooms and mops manufactured by the Industrious Blind Enterprises at Stonewood in order to assist that worthwhile group while raising funds for the club's many civic and charitable projects.

To write a complete history of the service of the Fairmont Lions Club would take a minimum of \*\*75\*\* volumes—one for each year of the club's existence. Suffice to say that the Fairmont Lions Club has contributed over one million dollars to community service activities and members of the club collectively have contributed well over a million man-hours in service to their community through Lionism. And when you consider those 35-cent meals of 1923 compared with the meal of today, that's a lot of today's dollars!
